MELLON'S SCALP IS BEING SOUGHT

(Continued from page one.)

late consideration and forced it over under the rules until Monday, since the chamber is in recess today.

The resolution, which cites evidence relating to "Mellon companies" adduced by the committee investigating the internal revenue bureau, calls for an inquiry to determine whether the secretary is directly or indirectly concerned in carrying on the business of trade or commerce; "whether he owns any sea vessel in whole or in part; and whether he is holding office in violation of statutes cited.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—A disposition to apply the brakes to its public disclosures was apparent when the senate's Daugherty committee resumed its inquiry into the official acts of the former attorney general.

Instead of examining confidential files of the justice department in public, as originally planned, the committee decided to consider them in executive session.

The files in question related to alleged activities in this country on behalf of Mexican revolutionists in lower California and had figured in the correspondence between President Coolidge and Mr. Daugherty resulting in the latter's retirement. W. J. Burns, chief of the justice department's bureau of investigation had been summoned to day the files before the committee, but instead of questioning him, the committee put on the stand Nicholas Cimino of New York, who testified regarding Mr. Daugherty's relations to Howard Mannington and others.

The witness said he had met Will A. Orr of New York, at "the green house on K Street."

Mannington lived at the "green house," he said. He told of "interceding with Mannington to obtain appointment as commissioner of immigration for Philip Giordano, also of New York and of being taken to see Daugherty.

Chairman Brookhart, questioning the witness in the absence of the committee prosecutor, Senator Wheeler, of Montana, who was kept at home by illness, asked if Mannington had asked for money.

"Nothing was ever said about money," Cimino replied.

He had acted on behalf of Giordano as a candidate both for immigration commissioner at New York and for commissioner-general of immigration the witness said.

Chairman Brookhart took up the New York bootlegging conspiracy. The witness said he had supported Mannington, because everybody seemed to be getting something out of it, and Mannington "told him to go over to New York and see what I could do."

Asked if he remembered a whiskey deal, "where Mortimer got \$100,000," the witness replied:

"I overheard a conversation where one of the fellows said Mortimer got \$100,000 from a party in Pittsburgh."

"A man named Grant was mentioned," Cimino went on, "as having been double crossed by Mortimer in the \$100,000 deal." He said he understood the money was to be paid by a "certain party in Pittsburgh."

Cimino then told also of having heard of a \$50,000 deal, in parcels from a federal penitentiary but could give no details.

Reverting to the stenographic contracts, Senator Ashurst, democrat, Arizona, asked whether Price and Moore, the two stenographers, were not to make notes of grand jury proceedings and "change the notes of the proceedings when rich people were examined."

"No sir," Cimino exploded. "There was no such understanding."

None of the money he got from Price was passed on to Mannington or Orr the witness said. He insisted he got the money to cover "expenses" and sought to intercede with Daugherty and other Washington officials only in his capacity as a party "ward captain" in New York. That, he said, was legitimate political work.

Former Senator Chamberlain, Mr. Daugherty's lawyer, cross-examined Cimino.

"You know Mannington was from the same state and possibly the same town as the president of the United States?" Chamberlain asked.

"Yes sir."

"You came down once with a committee to see Mr. Mannington and he took you to the White House?"

"Yes sir."

"The committee was composed of prominent Italians who endorsed Giordano for appointment and there was no money payments of any kind thought of."

"There was nothing out of the ordinary then in your conduct?"

"No."

Cimino said the New York liquor deals he had mentioned, "had to do with permits," but when he was asked to tell just what the deal was, he answered:

"I don't know."

"Did you have any understanding with the attorney-general or anyone connected with his reference with the whiskey deals?"

"None."

Asked if he had ever been prosecuted in connection with a liquor raid on his restaurant in New York, the witness said, "I don't remember."

"You carry in your head, your transactions with Price, but you can't remember if you were ever prosecuted?" demanded Senator Ashurst.

"I can't remember," repeated Cimino.

"I surrender," said Senator Ashurst.

"Were you ever prosecuted in any court for any offense?" asked Senator Jones, republican, Washington.

APPROPRIATION BILL PASSES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, March 29.—The new appropriation bill carrying \$226,000,000 was passed today by the house and sent to the senate.
Of the total which is \$16,000,000 less than last year's appropriations and \$3,000,000 less than the budget estimates, \$27,250,000, would be available for river and harbor improvements during the coming fiscal year.
An unsuccessful attempt was made in the house today to include in the army appropriation bill a request to the president to negotiate with other nations for a conference to discuss limitation of land armaments.

"No sir," Cimino answered and was excused.

Chairman Brookhart then recalled H. L. Scaife, former army officer and department of justice investigator, whose story of aircraft fraud investigation was left unfinished Thursday. He described the wartime airplane manufacture program and subsequent inquiries into it by congress and the administration.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—Taking only a passing notice of Harry M. Daugherty's disappearance from public life, the senate's Daugherty investigating committee today tried to piece out details of one \$100,000 deal and heard hints of another.

B. H. L. Scaife, a former department of justice agent, the committee was told that investigation into the Mitsui Aircraft case, in connection with which Gaston B. Means has testified, was blocked by A. F. Meyers, a special assistant to the attorney-general, after it had been discovered that the company owed the government many millions.

Scaife said he had been told by Guy Goff, then assistant attorney-general, that Meyers received his appointment through former Attorney-General George B. Wickersham, whose law firm, he said, was retained by the Mitsui company.

The references to the second \$100,000 transaction were made by Nicholas Cimino, a New York restaurant man, who testified that he had overheard a conversation in a hotel here about a "whiskey deal in which Mortimer got \$100,000 from a party in Pittsburgh." He knew none of the details, and when committee members put him through a course of questioning "to test his memory," he said he couldn't even "remember whether he had been prosecuted in New York for a liquor law violation."

WASHINGTON, March 29.—Selection of Judge Kenyon as attorney-general was urged on President Coolidge today by Representative Dickinson, republican, Iowa and Addison Parker, of Des Moines, as a means of "restoring confidence in the department of justice."

THREE MEN TRAPPED BY MINE EXPLOSION

CLARKESBURG, W. V., March 29.—Three men are known to have been entombed today when an explosion of gas wrecked a section of Penshaw Mine number 1 on Bigam Creek, near Shinnston, W. Va. Other miners may have been trapped in the workings it was said.

RECEPTION GIVEN DEPARTING PASTOR

The Ladies Aid Society of the Presbyterian church Thursday night tendered a reception in the church parlors to Rev. and Mrs. Quick whose resignation as pastor of the church goes into effect April 1st.

Between 300 and 400 people were present. The large crowd speaks for itself of the respect and esteem in which brother and sister Quick are held by the church and community. It could be seen in an instant that but one thought pervaded the entire crowd. That is a deep regret to lose from our midst one whose spirit-filled and exemplary life, and ability as a spiritual leader has counted for so much in this community during Brother Quick's short stay in Roseburg.

During his 3 1/2 years pastorate Brother Quick has taken his turn with the other Protestant ministers in preaching on Sunday afternoons at the Green school house. The people of that entire community deeply regret his going from them as expressed in the following words:
Our departing friends we'll never forget,
Nor shall distance eternally sever,
They'll linger in our memories yet,
And in our hearts they'll live forever.
More than 50 people from Green attended the reception.

A cafeteria supper was served by ladies of the church at 6:30 p. m. The crowd lined up by brother and sister Quick, followed by the pastors and their wives of the sister churches, were served a wonderful repast which showed the hospitality and the great ability of the Presbyterian ladies in serving a crowd.

The supper was followed by a short program. Mrs. T. A. Stewart gave two recitations which were greatly enjoyed by all. Mr. Wayne Ackers rendered two violin solos, accompanied on the piano by Mrs. Lintott in a very able manner. Mrs. Strang, accompanied on the piano by Mrs. Lintott, sang two vocal solos which were greatly applauded.

Mrs. John R. Howard in behalf of the Union Sunday School of Green made some very appropriate remarks telling of Brother Quick's work in the community, and the high esteem in which he is held there. She said "There are people who may leave a community after having lived in it for years, yet they will not be missed by any one because they have been merely human sponges, absorbing all they can get but never giving out anything. Again, there are people who may stay but a short time in the same community, and on their leaving, their loss will be felt by everyone, because their influence has been for good, and they have exerted themselves in helping and uplifting all with whom they come in contact."

Brother Quick has lived such a life among us, and it is on this account we so deeply regret his departure," Mrs. Howard also spoke of his extraordinary ability as a teacher. His knowledge of God's word, and his wonderful tact in teaching the word has made impressions which will be lasting. Even the children have looked forward to his sermonettes with eagerness.

She spoke of Brother Quick's frequent allusion to silver as a symbol of purification and salvation. She said the people of Green would never again open their Bibles without thinking of his teachings on Genesis to Revelation. At this time she presented Rev. and Mrs. Quick and Miss Lulu May with a silver token from the Union Sunday School of Green, with the wish that it might be used every day as a reminder of the love and esteem of the people of Green for them.

The different departments of the church were then represented by a speaker. Mrs. Shoemaker represented the Ladies Aid Society. She told of the work of the society during Brother Quick's stay among them, and she spoke very feelingly of the loss they will feel in his going away. In behalf of the society she presented Brother and Sister Quick with a substantial gift, and a prayer that God's blessing may attend them as they go to their new field of labor.

Mrs. Fred Fisher then spoke in behalf of the Woman's Missionary Society. She said "at this time we do not want to hear funny stories or humorous things for a feeling of sadness comes over us at thought of losing Brother and Sister Quick. We will all miss Brother Quick, some for his wonderful sermons, some for his Bible teachings, some for his Friday afternoon meetings, and some of us who have been healed and helped by his prayers for the sick."

Miss Doris Day in behalf of the Christ team Endeavor Society spoke of Brother Quick's work among the young people, and spoke of the inspiration he has been to them while here, and of their regrets in his going away.

Honorable A. C. Marsters then in his remarks voiced the sentiments of all who were present. Among other things he said, "We who believe in the higher ideals of life and Christian living all regret losing Brother Quick from our midst. He lives most who best lives in his daily life the life of the Master, and by his living points those about him to the Master. Brother Quick has lived this life among us. His life has not only affected his own church but it has been felt by the entire church, and by those outside of the churches."
