THE THRILLING FLIGHT.

The United States feels pride in the spirit manifested by those army aviators who a few days ago rose from Santa Monica, California, on the adventurous attempt to circle the world. Those fellows, if they had been alive in 1492, would have been signing up with Christopher Columbus to hunt for an unknown continent. As all continents have been explored, the field for adventure is narrowed. Still aviation offers abundant thrills. Those who start out on such ambitious attempts as this qualify for positions in the history of progress comparable to Columbus and his followers. Human progress has been largely due to this spirit of willingness to take risks for the sake of achievement. If people had been willing just to settle down and be content with "sure thing" activities, we would still be living in huts and hunting wild beasts for a living in the forests of Europe.

Arthur Brisbane says, "Each of five Paris newspapers has a million or more circulation because all parts of France look to Paris for news, while in this country only one daily circulates a million copies because Americans feel the real newspaper is one in their own neighborhood. That is good for America." The Manufacturer had said on many occasions that no country as large as the United States could ever have been developed with all its people in every nook and corner fully informed on local, state and national questions without the 14,000 country daily and weekly newspapers which give immediate information to rural communities on all subjects. America's country newspapers are the safeguard of its democratic institution.

CANDIDATES FILE FOR HIGH OFFICES

SALEM, March 31.—Representatives of the nation in a big, patriotic, two-fisted manner, is the slogan George L. Baker, of Portland, has selected to use in his campaign for the republican nomination for United States senator. His declaration was filed today with the secretary of state. Mr. Baker's platform follows:

"If nominated and elected, I will, during my term of office, stand for protection and advancement of American ideals, principles and institutions; administration of national affairs in a clean, businesslike, patriotic manner; promotion of improvements and appropriations due Oregon from the federal government; upbuilding of shipping, trade relations and new foreign markets; adjusted compensation for ex-service men; all necessary protective tariffs for protection of our own industries; restriction of immigration; national department of free public education; development of Oregon resources by private and federal aid; upbuilding of all issues based upon moral and industrial progress and betterment.

Other who filed were: Henry S. Westbrook, Portland, for republican nomination for justice of the supreme court. Sloan, "preserve the home from unlawful search; uphold jury verdicts; oppose non-suits; award justice."

Some things covered in his platform are: "Favor liberal consolidation of Workmen's compensation act for injured workmen and family; oppose delays in judicial procedure; permit no man to go above the law; resolve every doubt in favor of the people; give the Jew and gentile, Catholic and Protestant, rich and poor, black and white, equal justice; stand on every question four square to every wind that blows."

George S. Sizemore, Burns, for democratic nomination for district attorney of Harney county.

R. A. Hercher, Dillard, for republican nomination for representative in the legislature from Douglas county, fourth representative district.

Walter B. Jones, Eugene, for republican nomination for district attorney for Lane county.

Gus C. Moser, Portland, for republican nomination for state senator from the 15th senatorial district, comprising Multnomah county.

J. M. Ezell, Klamath Falls, for republican nomination for representative in the legislature from the 21st representative district, comprising Crook, Deschutes, Jefferson, Klamath and Lake counties.

SALEM, March 31.—William Grant Webster of New York today filed with the secretary of state his request to have his name printed on the republican primary ballot in Oregon as a candidate for the republican nomination for vice-president of the United States.

COLIN DYMENT HAS A STRANGE DISEASE

After being home only three days, Dean Colin V. Dymont, of the college of literature, science and arts, had a relapse yesterday morning and went to bed once more, says the University of Oregon Emerald. His condition is complicated by a severe cold, but he hopes to be up again on Monday.

Dean Dymont is no better than when he left for Carmel-by-the-Sea, California, February 17, but on his way home, in an effort to ascertain what was pulling down his strength, he went to Dr. C. A. Kofoid, at Berkeley, a noted physiologist of the University of California, who since 1918, has devoted nearly all his time to a study of a malady with which he found numbers of overseas men had returned. This malady was a form of amoebiasis.

In his treatise, entitled "Amoeba and the Man," Dr. Kofoid relates that he found about 13 per cent of the men whom he examined at the point of debarkation in New York city after the war infected with amoeba, but in his opinion, a considerably larger portion of the overseas army had contracted it.

It was by the amoebic infection that after several days' experiment in his laboratory Dr. Kofoid found Dean Dymont to be affected. All of the 51st division, whom he visited in San Francisco were either being treated for it, or had undergone treatment and had been cured, Dean Dymont stated last night.

The organism was undoubtedly spread over France by troops called in by English and French from tropical regions of Asia and Africa—notably the Senegalese, Moroccans, Algerians and others.

The United States Veterans' Bureau, which Dean Dymont visited in San Francisco, has handled many hundreds of the cases. The infection has usually been supposed to be indigenous to the tropics, but Dr. Kofoid has succeeded in demonstrating that the organism can thrive in a temperate zone.

Dean Dymont expects to leave for Berkeley in about two weeks to undergo treatment for the infection, which will extend over several months. Two or three medical specialists around the bay are having success in eliminating the infection, after which complete recovery and restoration to normal strength follow.

During a bedside conference last night, with Major A. B. Richardson, a member of the staff of the United States Veterans' Bureau in Portland, Dean Dymont urged the institution of laboratory facilities to look for the infection among Northwestern overseas men. Major Richardson is commander of the first battalion of the 364th infantry of the 91st division, and served overseas, until wounded by a rifle bullet, September 28, 1918.

U. S. CENSUS BUREAU ISSUES NATIONAL WEALTH STATISTICS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, March 31.—The wealth of the nation is \$320,803,862,000, more than one half of which is real property and improvements. The per capita wealth is \$2,918.

Statistics of the country's wealth as of December 31, 1922, issued today by the census bureau, revealed that the total wealth increased 72.2 per cent and the per capita wealth 49.6 per cent in the ten years from 1912.

All classes of property increased in value in the decade except livestock, which decreased 6.09 per cent to \$7,807,104,000.

Taxed real property and improvements were valued at \$155,908,625,000, an increase of 60.9 per cent in the ten years.

BRIDGES BLOWN UP

BELFAST, Ireland, March 31.—A number of bridges on the main road between Londonderry and Athlone, in central Ireland, were blown up last night and the roads were blocked with felled trees. The republicans disclaimed responsibility for the destruction.

Residents of the country districts around Mullingar, county Westmeath, were awakened at midnight by a series of loud explosions. All the roads in the district were either blocked or blown up.

An attempt to blow up a bridge on the Dublin road failed. Great excitement prevails in the affected area.

WARRANT ISSUED FOR GASTON MEANS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, March 31.—Federal Judge Garvin today ordered a bench warrant issued for the arrest of Gaston B. Means, former agent of the department of justice, who is under indictment for conspiracy to violate the Volstead act.

When Judge Garvin called the case of Means and his former secretary, Elmer W. Jarnecke, both named in the conspiracy indictment, J. T. McGovern, counsel for Means, asserted his client was in Washington and would not be able to appear here because he was under subpoena by the senate committee investigating the department of justice.

Hiram C. Todd, assistant deputy attorney-general, moved that Means' bail of \$15,000 be forfeited and that a warrant be issued for his arrest. Judge Garvin granted the motion. The government attorney asserted Means twice had failed to appear for trial, and had given illness as his reason. He said the district court here took precedence over the senate committee.

The indictment against Means returned October 18, contains four counts, the first alleging he entered into a conspiracy to obtain the release of 12,000 cases and 12,500 barrels of whiskey from the government warehouses.

The second involves 55 barrels of whiskey; the third 88 barrels and the fourth charges conspiracy and use of the mails to defraud in connection with an attempt to obtain \$75,000 from a man in Chicago for the release of liquor from government warehouses.
