RAILROAD CASE MUST END TONIGHT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, April 1.—With the railroad case only partly completed, the hearing here before Warren H. Wagner, examiner of the interstate commerce commission, must close tonight, leaving to an indefinite future date the taking of further testimony on behalf of the defendant railroads to show that they should not be required to provide Central Oregon with transportation lines connecting with the outside world. The examiner has other engagements elsewhere which must be filled. Six days were set apart for the hearing of this case in this city.

There is no economic need for any additional railway transportation facilities in western Oregon in connection with the Union Pacific's uncompleted across-state line from Crane to Odell, according to the testimony offered this morning by F. L. Burckhalter, assistant general manager of the Southern Pacific. He discussed the policy of common user of the Eugene-Klamath Falls cut-off by the Union Pacific as a rival by saying the Southern Pacific would interchange traffic with it at Odell but would not consent to short haul itself on traffic which could be carried by his system's own lines to the east.

Referring to the narrow gauge line from Hackstaff, Nevada, to Lakeview, Oregon, Burckhalter said the Southern Pacific had no desire to acquire and standardize it and that the Southern Pacific wishes Robert E. Strahorn well in building from Klamath Falls to Lakeview and northerly to Bend, Oregon. As to the Modoc Northern, projected by the Southern Pacific to shorten the route from Klamath Falls to a connection with its San Francisco-Ogden line in Nevada, he said it has not been abandoned.

To show the trend of traffic to and from western Oregon, J. H. Mulchay, assistant freight traffic manager of the Southern Pacific, commenced testifying just before the noon recess.

BAR ASSOCIATION HOLDS MEETING

The Roseburg Bar Association met this morning to discuss a number of matters pertaining to the activities and welfare of the organization. It was announced that the state bar association is to hold its annual meeting at Eugene on May 2, and Roseburg attorneys were asked to indicate whether or not they expect to attend the banquet and meeting which will take place at that time.

Resolutions were also adopted placing the association on record as being in favor of the National Oath-taking contest now in progress as a means of creating a better understanding of the constitution. It was stated by several attorneys that the association should encourage a study of the constitution and should support any movement which has as its purpose the fostering of a study of the principles and particularly the history of the great principles embodied in the constitution. A resolution stating the attitude of the association and expressing a willingness to aid in any efforts or activities in the way of contests or patriotic programs, was ordered prepared and forwarded to the principals of the high schools of the county.

It was also ordered that a committee previously appointed continue the preparation of plans for the reorganization of the bar association so that its aims and work may be more effectively carried out.

State Commander Fred Kiddle, State Adjutant Harry Nelson, R. J. Chary, representing "The Pacific Legion," official state legion magazine and many other veterans from Portland and other towns up north, were here today to meet with the Douglas county ex-service men. No meeting was held this afternoon and the boys were all taken to the golf links of the Roseburg Country Club where they knocked the pill around and swapped stories of the old days of '18.

Tonight at 8 o'clock all of the vets will gather at the armory. A short parade of the main streets will be held and the American Legion Drum Corps will lead the line. Following the parade the boys will return to the armory to enjoy a banquet and a meeting with the state officials. A fine program has been arranged and the "Blue Devil" orchestra of 14 pieces will provide the music. The meeting will be a big event and all vets are urged to attend. The streets of the city were beautifully decorated with flags today and presented a gala appearance.

SCHISSLER CHOSEN TO COACH AT O. A. C.

SALEM, April 1.—Paul John Schissler coach at Lombard college for the last three years, was today elected by the board of regents of Oregon Agricultural college as football coach to succeed Dick Rutherford. Lombard College is located at Galesburg, Illinois.

Schissler was elected out of 90 applicants. He comes highly recommended by such men as Commissioner Griffith of the Big Ten conference and Coach Rockwell of Notre Dame. He is said to have established himself as one of the best coaches in the middlewest. The board of regents segregated the coaching position from that of physical education. Schissler will be head coach and will be mentor for all the major sports and have charge of intramural athletics. His salary will be \$5500 a year and he is employed on a 12 months' basis. Schissler is 31 years old.

Heretofore the coach at O. A. C. has also been director of physical education, but today the board elected W. A. Kearns of Oakland, California, as director of physical education and to have charge of all gymnasium work. He is recommended as one of the ablest men in the United States. He is 39 years old, is 6 feet 3 inches tall and has a family of a wife and five children.

STATE BONUS FUNDS PUT INTO BONDS

SALEM, April 1.—State Treasurer Jefferson Myers has invested \$51,500 of state bonus commission funds in bonds. The following purchases were made:

School district number three, Morrow county, from Ladd and Tilden \$3500 at 5 per cent.

Klamath county bonds, from Roberts and Ewing, \$30,000 at 5 per cent.

Oregon highway bonds, \$5,000 at 4 1/2 per cent.

Baker county bonds, from G. E. Miller and company, \$3,000 at 5 per cent.

Hood River school district bonds, from lumbermen's trust company \$3,000 at 5 per cent to yield 4.95.

School district number 2, Deschutes county \$8,000 at 4.95.

PORTLAND, April 1.—Forty-five boys have been suspended from Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and Franklin high schools here and further suspensions are expected, according to school officers, on voluntary admission of membership to Greek Letter fraternities.

Thirty-one of the boys have been reinstated following their resignations from the fraternities and the process of resigning and reinstatement is going steadily ahead. At the meeting of the school board Wednesday night, school officers expected to be able to report that the situation has been cleared up with all the students reinstated in their schools.

FRANK SEVER FOR STATE TREASURER

SALEM, April 1.—Frank Sever, who was deputy state treasurer under the late O. P. Hoff, said this morning that he expects today to file his declaration as a candidate for the republican nomination for state treasurer. In his platform he will point out that his experience of two and a half years as deputy treasurer has given him a thorough knowledge of the state's financial affairs and also of the duties and responsibilities of the state treasurer as a member of the state board of control.

MUMPS CAUSE DELAY OF TRIAL

PORTLAND, April 1.—A case of mumps on the part of the defendant, was today the cause for the postponement of the trial of J. J. Overhart of Bend, charged with using the mails to defraud in connection with the soldier's bonus appeals. When a physician decided that Overhart, who was reported ill when court opened had the mumps, Federal Judge Wolverton set the trial over until April 11.

TARIFF MEASURES TO BE STUDIED

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Tariff provisions of the McNary-Haugen agricultural export bill will be studied by the house ways and means committee to determine whether they would dislocate present rates on farm products and whether it would give too wide powers to the president and secretary of agriculture.

PENALTY ON STATE TAX TO BE ABATED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, April 1.—At a meeting of the state tax commission today it was decided to abate the 5 per cent penalty on delinquent state income tax payments up to April 1.

The reason was that the law is new and the people not yet well educated to its provisions.

Earl Fisher, state tax commissioner, said the mail bringing in income tax returns this morning was about twice as heavy as that received on any previous day. About \$400,000 has already been turned into the state treasurer and it is estimated that today's mail will add another \$100,000. Yesterday was the last day for filing returns, but these received today are not delinquent for the reason that they were in the mail yesterday. Fisher stands by his estimate of yesterday that when all returns are in the total will be not less than \$1,500,000.

BUSINESS OUTLOOK IS OPTIMISTIC

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Reports of favorable business condition at the opening of another season of business activity were laid before President Coolidge and his cabinet. Secretary Hoover told the president the steel industry was going ahead in a favorable way and that building permits for the spring and summer, were larger than at the same time a year ago when a new high record was attained.

The president believes that an impetus will be given all business as soon as the tax bill is passed by congress and feels that should a measure based on the Mellon plan be enacted an improvement would be noted within a month or six weeks, with money piled up in the banks diverted to creative enterprise.

BENCH WARRANT FOR MEANS IS VACATED

NEW YORK, April 1.—Federal Judge Garvin vacated today the bench warrants issued yesterday for Gaston B. Means and his secretary, Elmer W. Jarnecke, when they failed to appear for trial on indictments for conspiracy to violate the Volstead act in the wholesale withdrawal of liquor from warehouses. The court also remitted the \$15,000 bail each was ordered forfeited yesterday.

FASTER GAMES WANTED

LOS ANGELES, California, April 1.—Circular letters addressed by Harry Williams, president of the Pacific Coast league to all managers, umpires and players asks for faster games in the league this coming season.

Williams in the letter expresses himself as opposed to visiting between rival players; the handshaking player and stalling. He asks that every man play the fastest ball possible, hustling until the last man is called out.
