The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce rightfully takes exception to the prominence given the California products and has written a letter to the editor of the magazine inquiring where Mary "got her dope." It is not charged that the writer was subsidized for this discriminatory way of advertising California fruit but Mary undoubtedly will receive the heartfelt thanks of the Californians Incorporated for her efforts to boost California prunes and cherries over the superior produce of Oregon. We do not doubt Mary's ability to concoct an appetizing salad but we do declare that Oregon prunes and cherries embellish a dish as well, if not better, than does the fruit from the southern state. It is high time that the Oregonians stick their finger in the pie and put a stop to this "sickening" way of putting over the California crop. Oregon prunes have been sold under California labels long enough. Let's tell the world in no uncertain tones that our prunes and cherries are of a top notch variety. Let's tell "Mary Louise" and all of her clan that Oregon prunes and Oregon cherries make good salads.

SHASTA TO HAVE
NEW STEEL DINERS

Southern Pacific to Use All-Steel Dining Cars With Increased Capacity—Kitchen and Locker Space Larger.

The Southern Pacific has just placed new all steel diners in the Shasta it's fast train between Portland and San Francisco.

The ordinary diner seats but 30 passengers and in order to increase the capacity from 30 to 36, it was necessary not only to enlarge the dining room space but to increase the kitchen, locker, range and refrigerator space.

The cars are 77 feet in length, the dining room is 37 feet in length and the interior finish is in mahogany. These cars are of the very latest model and represent the last word in dining car equipment.

These new steel diners, as fast as received, are being put in service on the "Shasta", the Overland Limited and the Sunset Limited.

In order to keep a plentiful supply of foods in the best of condition each car is provided with seven refrigerators, two of which are suspended beneath the floor and reach through trap doors.

The water system which is under pressure, consists of two 140-gallon tanks suspended from underframe and one overhead hot water tank in kitchen with 53 gallons capacity, making a total of 433 gallons of water carried on the car.

Kitchen and pantry were designed with the greatest care and consideration for the saving of time in the preparation and serving of meals. The kitchen has an eight foot range, a steam table, two sinks and large counter space under which are located ice trays and vegetable bins. An outside kitchen door facilitates the stocking of car with supplies at terminals.

Special attention was given to the springs under these diners to insure the greatest riding ease for the comfort of passengers. Five ceiling fans, equipped with rotating deflectors, will provide an evenly distributed cool breeze in warm weather.

The cars have been supplied with silverware of new design. The familiar water bottle has been replaced with a new silver topped glass pitcher.

YOUNG PRINCE TO
SIT IN REICHSTAG

BERLIN, April 2.—Prince Otto von Bismarck, grandson of the iron chancellor, will sit among the German nationalist deputies in the new reichstag. The prince, who is 27, has been living in retirement on the family estate at Friedrichsruhe near Hamburg.

He made his political debut at the German nationalist convention yesterday in Hamburg where reactionary spokesmen introduced him as the "headliner" who is to lead the patriotic German youth into the monarchist's camp in the coming election.

TWENTY-SIX KILLED
IN THEATRE PANIC

MEXICO CITY, April 2.—The short circuiting of an electric wire in a movie theatre at Tacubaya city, a suburb of the capital, last night caused a fire and subsequent panic in which 26 persons are known to have been killed and at least 50 injured. The wire, carrying high voltage, dropped from above and hung neck high in the main aisle, bringing death to those touching it in the mad scramble for the exits. Many were seriously injured or trampled to death under the feet of the stampeding crowd.
