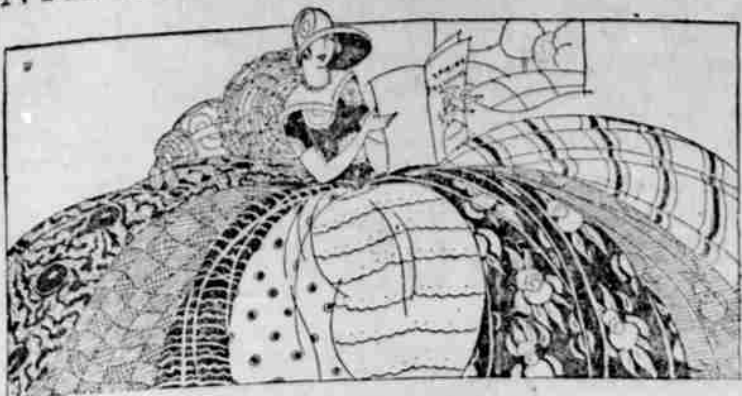

DIRECTORS HOLD
BUSY SESSION

Chamber of Commerce Officials Discuss Many Items of Important Business.

OFFICE TO BE MOVED

Quarters Will Be Moved From Present Location in Barker Building to Douglas Abstract Building.

The Board of Directors of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce met in regular session yesterday evening, all members of the board except Dr. Sether and O. C. Baker being present. The meeting was called to order by Vice-President W. J. Weaver.

The monthly bills were audited, allowed, and ordered paid.

The secretary made a report on the dinner meeting of the Chamber held March 26. The total receipts of the dinner were \$154.50, while the expenses were \$143.50, leaving a balance of \$11.00 in the treasury.

There was a general discussion as to the methods to be pursued in securing the balance of the members needed for the proper financing of the Chamber. It was brought out that a number of prominent and well-to-do men in the city were not members, and that an effort should be made to secure their cooperation, both in a moral and financial way.

The secretary was instructed to notify all the other towns of the county that when invitations were issued to officers and directors of this Chamber to attend dinner meetings that these officers and directors would pay for their own meals, and not add any burden to the arrangement committees of these events. The idea of the directors is to be of the utmost service to the other towns of the county, and in doing this it seems only fair that they pay their own way.

A communication was received from the Umpqua Park promoters, but it was felt that this was not a matter for the Chamber of Commerce to handle, and upon motion the matter was tabled.

Directors Hochradel and Ness reported upon the success of the Drain meeting March 31. A local Chamber of Commerce being organized at Drain was the outstanding feature of their report.

Director Dexter Rice reported on the success to the meeting of the business men of Yoncalla on March 27, stating that he had attended the meeting in company with Secretary Holbein, and that all arrangements had been made to have Yoncalla represented on the county unit directorate.

The secretary was instructed to notify all towns in the county that the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce wishes to be of the utmost service to them in any meetings that they may hold in the future which have as their object the boosting of the county.

The house committee, composed of Directors Crocker and Hochradel reported that they had interviewed Messrs. Pargeter and Barker and recommended that the directors accept the proposition of Mr. Pargeter. The house of the chamber on the Barker property expires June 1, and the house committee was informed by Mr. Barker that he would only lease the room to the chamber for one year at a time, and any improvements to be made to the quarters would have to be made by the chamber. Mr. Pargeter offered to furnish quarters in the Douglas Abstract building at the same rental as Mr. Barker asked for the coming year, with heat furnished, and all improvements necessary made in advance. He was also willing to make a three-year lease to the chamber at this same rental.

The house committee therefore recommended that the directors accept Mr. Pargeter's proposition, which was done. The new quarters will be modern in every way, and there will be sufficient space for a comprehensive exhibit of Douglas county products at all times. It seems that Mr. Barker had been offered more rental from a mercantile concern than the chamber felt it could pay. It is the desire of the directors to make the new office a model business office in every way.

SAYS TARIFF BILL
HARD TO ADMINISTER

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Chairman Marvin of the tariff commission, appearing today before the house ways and means committee declared the McNary-Haugen agricultural export bill, as introduced, would open so wide a field of government supervision and control that it would be "exceedingly" difficult to administer.

Mr. Marvin said he had been informed, however, that the house agricultural committee proposed to amend the measure to limit its scope and eliminate some objectionable features. He testified particularly about the tariff provisions. Mr. Marvin said the tariff committee recognizes that an emergency exists in agricultural but has had no opportunity to fully analyze the tariff features of the pending bill.

Cleveland, but others thought this view too optimistic.

Taxes, immigration and farm relief were the principal topics touched upon. The executive was told that the tax measure would be reported to the senate next week and in view of assurances given in debate in the senate yesterday fairly prompt action was predicted.

The president was informed that there is a disposition to press the immigration restriction measure in the near future. Some senators favor bringing it up immediately, but Senator Hiram Johnson was requested that action be deferred until his return to Washington.

Further farm relief legislation was gone into rather fully but there was no decision as to the character such legislation should take. Several bills are pending.

SCIENTISTS SEEK
PINK HEADED DUCK

NEW YORK, April 2.—Undaunted by the failure of the expedition to find a pink-headed duck in the wilds of Siam, a party of scientists sails tomorrow to explore the valley of Amazon in the quest of a bird that breaks rock with its bill, swims and resembles a bat.

It is called the hoatzin, says George Couderc, a photographer who is to accompany the party of explorers. Couderc said he was equipped with special paraphernalia for photographing the queer specimen. A good specimen, he said, was worth \$20,000.

HEARING HELD TODAY
BEHIND CLOSED DOORS

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The house committee which is investigating charges against Representatives Zihlman, Maryland, and Langley, Kentucky, republicans, resumed its hearings today behind closed doors. Committee members said it had not been determined whether open hearings would be held.

Representatives Zihlman, who is chairman of the house labor committee today, as was Elias H. Mortimer who testified before the Chicago grand jury investigation veterans' bureau charges.

A report of the Chicago grand jury was looked into by the grand jury which found no ground for action against Mr. Zihlman. Mr. Langley, however, was indicted on charges of conspiracy to violate the prohibition law through illegal withdrawals of liquor.

The committee plans to take up the Zihlman case first.

Sneldon, the serious injury of Fireman J. G. Gravatt and the shelling up of a number of passengers. Eight coaches and the locomotive left the rails.
