FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

Foot and mouth disease is an acute and highly communicable infection which occurs chiefly in cattle and other cloven-hoofed animals. The virus of this disease is of historic interest, since it was the first to be defined as filterable and ultra microscopic. This means that it will pass through pores of the finest of filters, and scientists are not able to demonstrate the organism under the microscope. It is essentially a disease of cattle, but it also attacks sheep and swine. In cattle it causes small, fine blisters in the mouth and on the skin between the hoofs. There is a characteristic "slobbering,"—a licking and smacking of the lips as though the animal were attempting to rid itself of foreign material adhering to the side of the mouth. Lameness frequently occurs. The animal suffers a loss of appetite, emaciation and a marked diminution in the quantity of milk. More rarely the eruption appears on the udder, and it is this localization that is chiefly responsible for the virus in the milk. The time that the disease appears after infection is from two to six days. The disease has a very low mortality, generally from 1 to 3 per cent, but its highly infectious nature makes it of the highest economic importance. The attack lasts normally from ten to twenty days, but has been known to continue for a year. It has been demonstrated in the recent epidemic in California that this disease is not easily controlled, and radical measures, therefore, must be taken to stamp it out. The disease is extremely prevalent in European countries and carries great economic loss.

The virus is found in the contents of the blister, in the saliva, discharges from the eyes, in the milk, and in excretory material. Infection takes place directly, as by licking and sucking, or indirectly through infected manure, hay, utensils, drinking troughs, barnyards, etc.

Human beings are not frequently infected, although it is by no means rare for children to contract the disease through drinking raw milk from diseased animals. It may also result from the transference of other secretions or exudations to the mouth. After two to five or even ten days the characteristic eruption develops in the mouth, on the skin, hands, and feet, with swelling, burning and numbness. The secretion of saliva is increased and the little blisters break down and form ulcers. The disease is self-limited and the ulcers heal, leaving no scar. Fortunately the disease is rare in man, and there are no permanent untoward effects.

Health authorities are advised to use every precaution to prevent the entrance of the infection into their state. All shipments from the infected area should be passed on by the state veterinarian and the local health officials. This precaution should be especially observed by those living in ports of entry. Report all suspicious conditions to the State Veterinarian, Salem, Oregon, or the State Health Officer, Portland, Oregon.

When we have such good advantages as we do find in the scenery of our surroundings, it is our duty to improve our "city" itself. It being the county seat of Douglas county and most important city it should be kept beautiful and attractive. It is situated on the Pacific Highway and many tourists pass through each season. Each person should keep up his lawn, plant roses and shrubs. It is not only our front yards that need beautifying, but our back yards and little used side streets as well.

In our parkings are trees, shrubs, small flowers and weeds all mixed up. How much prettier it would be if all the parkings on one street were planted to Maple trees, another street to roses, another to flowers and etc. and none to weeds.

To take care of the vacant lots divide Roseburg into three districts, one for each school. Divide these districts into three parts for the boys of the eighth, seventh and sixth grades. Appoint a man from the Chamber of Commerce or council to direct each of these groups. On Saturday clean the lots.

We need parks where the men and women can go and enjoy themselves and play grounds where the children can play so that they will not have to play in the streets. All cities of this size have one or more parks and play grounds and I feel that Roseburg should have all of these things that help to make a city of its size beautiful.

All loyal citizens should feel it their duty to help. One alone can do very little along this line but all working together in harmony can make Roseburg one of the most beautiful cities along the Pacific Coast.

BAKER SPEAKS TO
PENDLETON VOTERS

PENDLETON, April 3.—Pledging his support to the McNary-Haugen bill as a temporary measure of relief for farmers, promising to lend all his energy to the upbuilding and development of the resources of the state of Oregon and pledging himself as unequivocally in favor of strict law enforcement and particularly for enforcement of the prohibition law, George L. Baker, mayor of Portland, addressed a large audience here last night in the Alta Theatre in behalf of his candidacy for the republican nomination as United States senator. When the speaker, accompanied by Mayor J. A. Fee of Pendleton, entered the theatre shortly after 8 o'clock practically every seat was taken and several dozen people were standing in the back of the house.

The Portland man held the close attention of his audience for the hour that he talked, and his remarks were applauded repeatedly.

PACIFICISM IS
BOLSHEVIK TOOL

INDIANAPOLIS, April 3.—Extreme Pacificism extended to movements among women and children of America is being used as a tool of Bolshevism and Radicalism, Garland W. Powell, director of the national Americanism Commission of the American Legion declared here today.

Powell warned legionnaires against a national anti-war campaign directed by the Women's Peace Society, enrolling young and old by signing pledges "not to aid directly the United States government in the event of war." The women's peace union of the western hemisphere and the fellowship of youth for peace organization or other bodies seeking similar ends, it was said. Mr. Powell asserted the movement is finding fertile field among school children and in bible classes and urges every American to attend the meetings and present the patriotic side of the question. Leaders of these movements, Mr. Powell said, "are tools of the Bolsheviks, the revolutionary radicals and communists."
