STEPPING WITH THE MARCH OF PROGRESS.

One of our families has had trouble with mice recently. They played tag all over the kitchen and pantry. They were cynically indifferent to the invitations of the family mousetrap. That venerable contraption, inherited from a previous generation was seductively baited with fresh cheese. But the sophisticated mice just winked knowing eyes at it. Finally it occurred to the mistress to try what a new trap would do. So she wended her way to one of the excellent stores of Roseburg and purchased thereat one of these household safeguards. It was built on about the same principle as the old one, but it was fixed up with fresh staining, and the wires were new and shiny. She was amazed to see what a difference it made. The first day she caught three, and the next two, and soon the pests were exterminated. Rather suggestive of life. Somehow when you try to catch people with the old ideas, they do not respond. There is just a faint aroma of antiquity about it that prejudices people. But just a little touch of modernity about your plans, and it makes a world of difference. Leaders of business, of civic effort, of politics, have to learn that lesson. It applies just as much to those who seek to capture human attention for legitimate and beneficent purposes, as to those who entrap people by deceptions to undo them. If people fail to keep in touch with the times to read the newspapers and mingle with the people and get the lingo of today, they are set aside as belonging to the last generation. But let the business man advertise his goods in the style and manner of the current year, let the politicians and civic worker emphasize ideas the world is talking about this year, and the people flock to them.

Man was made to live outdoors. Nature did not invent base burners, steam-heated apartment houses and factory buildings. Man designed those things, and man must make the best of them. But let's not overlook the necessity of getting as much good, clean, wholesome fresh air in our systems as we can. The diseases most common from unwholesome air are influenza, pneumonia, bronchitis, diphtheria and tuberculosis. And colds. Colds are the most prevalent ailment and the most easily avoided. It isn't the cold wintry air that gives you a cold, it's your clumsy efforts to dodge it, the doctors say. Those other diseases usually grow out of colds. It is because we allow the germs to be introduced into our noses, mouths, throats and lungs, and then don't get enough good air to kill them. Employees of the United States pension bureau in Washington lost 18,736 working days a year through illness. A ventilating system was put in the building, and the days lost were cut down to 10,114 a year. Five hundred employees of a New York factory did the work it had taken 600 to perform after fresh air was introduced as a factor in efficiency. Maybe those figures don't mean much to you. What does mean a great deal, however, is your own health, and that of your family. Guard it. It is easy. It merely means that you should sleep with a window open every night—even the coldest nights. You should have some air circulating in the room wherever you are, and as soon as you go out doors you should not hunch down into your coat or furs, but throw up your head, take a deep breath of the crisp, fresh air, and put disease to flight.

Who is it that always delights the mothers by chucking their youngsters under the chin, and who never fails to have some peppermints in his pockets? Why, the bachelor friend of the family, of course. Yet you never hear his praises sung. There is a Mother's Day, and a Father's Day, but there is no day for unwed uncles, natural or acquired. Every bachelor is a potential uncle to very kid. Every bachelor responds when Johnny trots out his shiny new jig bank. When daddy can't find a penny for sister, the old back who happens to be there sticks his hand in his pocket, remarks that he believes he has a little chicken-feed, and presents sis with a big nickel—invariably. Married folk are entirely too fond of running down the bachelor. Maybe the poor fellow does occasionally need a button, and perhaps he's not just as careful as his friends' wives think he should be. But goodness knows we all have faults. If you think a man never amounts to anything until he gets married, just consider some of the notable bachelors of history. Michelangelo, the artist, was unmarried, as was Voltaire, the philosopher. Then there were Chopin, Beethoven, Charles Lamb, Pope, Henry James and Swinburne. Add Petrarch, Kitchener, Cecil Rhodes and President Buchanan to the list and you'll agree that the bachelors have a little Hall of Fame all their own.

There are several excellent reasons why people should run a vegetable garden during the coming summer. It is a money-saving proposition, if you do your own work on it. Not much saved perhaps if you hire much work done. But good vegetables cost money, and you can get returns for your own labor and elbow grease. DATES ARE SET FOR CLEAN-UP

Mayor Rice Sets April 14 and 15 for Removal of Rubbish From City.

ASKS FOR CO-OPERATION

City Will Haul Away Cans and Rubbish Free of Charge and Asks Assistance of Citizens

Mayor Rice has set the dates of April 14 and 15 for the annual spring cleanup for Roseburg, and at that time expects to see all rubbish, ashes, tin cans and the like, removed from all the yards and lots of the city. The cleanup has been scheduled in compliance with the custom long established here to get rid of all unsightly trash in the early spring.

"It has been the custom to notify people of the city that all rubbish will be removed free of charge by city wagons, if the residents themselves see to it that all cans, ashes and any other kind of rubbish or trash is properly placed in sacks or boxes and placed on the curbs," said the mayor this morning.

"We have set these dates so that they will come on Monday and Tuesday. In this way the children may do the work on Saturday when they are free from school and have it ready on Monday morning. We are asking this year, however, that no sacks or boxes be placed on the curbs until Monday morning, because of the unsightly appearance over the day of Sunday. Any receptacle is all right for the rubbish and the only thing necessary is that it be placed where the city teams can get it. We expect to hire a number of extra teams of horses for the work and do it up in proper fashion.

"The action is by no means an ordinance, and I will not issue any formal proclamation to that effect, but we are requesting that all the people of this city take enough interest to cooperate with us in a good cleanup."

The Women's Club of the city is starting a campaign for cleaning up the vacant lots, which will also assist in getting the city in shape for the coming of spring. With the work of the City Beautiful Commission and all other civic clubs working in the interest of a city beautiful a good showing should be made before the summer tourist travel sets in.

CONVENTION IS ON IN WENATCHEE

for us to answer. The republicans of this state and of the Cleveland convention, should with sound reason, in conference with the boys themselves, determine the correct solution of the question. God knows patriotism is not a part of America. And we know that avidity is not a characteristic of our men.

"At this time, the agriculture of our nation are marching out of time with the other industries and activities of our country. Equalization of commensurate proportions and of stable import must be applied. Hysteria and guess work will not suffice. Scientific engagement of common sense is needed now if equal opportunity is to be afforded to our people as a whole.

"The immediate employment of a just and fair income tax law, such as recommended by Secretary Mellon, to replace the one now in force is another obligation due the people, but which is going unheeded by an obstinate majority in congress.

"A constitutional amendment to enable the passage of a law which will prevent the issuance of non-taxable securities is an immediate necessity. A constitutional amendment to enable the passage of an adequate child labor law is a pressing obligation in the interests of the youth of our land.

"The perpetuity of our nation like all others depends upon the character of its electorate. The new immigration law proposed by Congressman Albert Johnson of this state, is the most timely suggestion ever presented to congress, and should be immediately passed.

"Since the beginning of our history some of our presidents have had exceedingly trying situations to overcome, but none of them has ever occupied the chair under more testing circumstances than our own Calvin Coolidge. If the American people had been authorized to select a man for this one particular situation, they could not have chosen better, and I am confident that I speak the sentiment of the majority. It behooves us, then, as patriots, to stand solidly behind him.

"To the shame of our fair nation there has never been a time when gossip, slander, acrimony, aspersion, defamation or calumny has brought such a high price in Washington.

"Fair play and a 'square deal' are
