CALVIN COOLIDGE
FILES IN OREGONPetition Bearing Over 8,000
Names Presented Today
by Senator Patterson.

UNIQUE FILING IS MADE

Two Methods Can Be Used
by Candidates, but Petition
With Signatures Was
Chosen.

SALEM, Oregon, April 5.—With more than eight thousand signatures, the nominating petition of President Coolidge was filed here today with Secretary of State Sam A. Koser by Senator I. L. Patterson, Oregon campaign manager for the President.

There are and will be received at State Headquarters in Portland about six or eight thousand more signatures, Mr. Patterson declared. Candidates names may be placed on the ballot at the primary nominating election by one of two methods: first by paying a fee and second by a petition signed by one thousand voters of the State. Mr. Patterson declared he had chosen the second method for a particular reason, and that he went about the matter of securing signatures on the petitions in a manner that was just a little bit out of the ordinary.

"Instead of employing persons to circulate the petitions for signatures," Mr. Patterson said, "I sent petitions out to voluntary circulators throughout the State as a test of the Coolidge sentiment in Oregon. The expense of this was confined entirely to postage, and the office work of addressing and compiling and printing."

"I requested that the petitions be mailed to the Coolidge Headquarters by April 8 but am filing three days earlier. In one instance I received a letter stating that the enclosed petition fully signed had been received just twenty minutes before it was being mailed back to me. From some counties alone we received enough signatures on our petitions to place the name of the president upon the ballot."

Mr. Patterson further stated that this was an almost unheard of experience in the circulation of such petitions. "It demonstrates," he said, "better than any other means the earnest and deep respect of the people of Oregon for Calvin Coolidge and does more than anything else to show the real demand for his nomination."

Many counties, Mr. Patterson said, returned more than enough signatures to complete their quota. The laboring men, the women voters, the business and professional men, the farmers and veterans were represented in almost equal numbers.

No one particular class or distinction was paramount. It was a general gathering together of the people of the State in an unsolicited testimonial of good faith in Calvin Coolidge, their voices assenting as to the man in whom they had full confidence, and an assured prediction of his carrying the State of Oregon at the primaries on May 16.

"In the correspondence relative to these petitions and their signing," Mr. Patterson stated, "there has been a strong indication from every quarter that the people will have no other man. There does not seem to be any factional fight in any locality. The general feeling displayed in a quiet, decided tone of the most exemplified confidence. No fire-works, no unusual display of enthusiasm, but just the calm, definite, straightforward and to-the-point attitude that Calvin Coolidge is the man the people want, and the man they are going to have for their president next November."

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, April 5.—The mysterious legend "Byob" inscribed on invitations to a dinner to be held in New York Monday night under the auspices of former army officers, stirred up something of a commotion today in prohibition circles here. The anti-alcohol league interpreted the inscription to mean "Bring Your Own Booze" and W. B. Wheeler issued a formal statement calling on congress to "oust" army officers who violate the liquor laws.

BRIDGE CONTRACTS
ARE CANCELLED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, April 5.—The county commissioners in an executive session here today annulled the contracts for the construction of three bridges across the Willamette river, following an opinion submitted by District Attorney Myers holding the contracts illegal.

Mr. Myers gave two reasons for his opinion: That one contract was let to the highest bidder and the manner in which it was let was a "gross abuse of discretion." "In view of the present condition of the county finances the contracts would create a debt in excess of the constitutional limitation."

AUTO COLLISION
RATES UPHELD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, April 5.—H. O. Fishback and Will Moore, insurance commissioners of Washington and Oregon respectively have jointly issued an order upholding for this year reduced automobile collision rates established by a conference of insurance companies. A protest against the rates was made by mutual and reciprocal companies with the result that a hearing was held at Olympia. The insurance commissioners hold that the rates were not established for the purpose of precipitating a rate war, and that they will be allowed to stand this year, after which time they will be subject to such changes as may be deemed necessary.

EVANGELIST GIVEN
PRISON SENTENCE

TACOMA, April 5.—"Three-fingered Jack" Goodwin for several years an evangelist worked largely in logging camps of the west, was today sentenced from eight to fifteen years in the state prison by Superior Judge M. L. Clifford. Goodwin was convicted of a statutory crime against a 13 year old girl who is his relative. Judge Clifford refused the plea of the evangelist's attorneys that a minimum sentence of five years be imposed.

POLITICS CHARGED
IN PRISON PROBE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) ATLANTA, Ga., April 5.—Counter charges that J. B. Dyche, former warden of the Atlanta federal prison, has instituted a secret investigation of alleged trafficking in narcotics within the prison to further his efforts to place his political followers on the prison staff were made here last night by Chief Deputy Warden L. Motion Pictures of Lips Aid
the Deaf to Speak

By means of motion pictures of the lips of a person speaking, the deaf, children with defective speech, and foreigners are



greatly assisted in their efforts to talk correctly and to interpret sounds by lip-reading. A specially devised camera takes a series of "close-ups," the "model" pronouncing the words, taking great care to move his lips in the precise positions for forming the sounds. The pictures are shown with the words and symbols to accompany them, supplying a graphic "pattern" for the pupils to follow.

Concrete Railway Ties Have
Wooden Plugs for Spikes

Concrete railway ties, used on a section of a right of way in northwestern India, have proved to resist wear and weather equally as well as wooden ones, according to a report. It is believed their employment will result in great savings of lumber and labor, since they will not require replacing as frequently as the timber. The cement beam consists of two blocks tied together with steel straps. The rails are fastened on by means of spikes driven into treated-wood plugs set in the concrete.

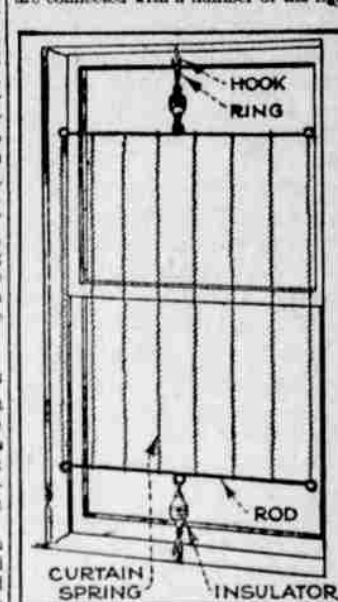

AMERICAN VICE
CONSUL INSANE

FESSENDEN, N. D., April 5.—There was little change today in the condition of George Henry Richardson Jr., American vice consul at Auckland, N. Z., who made several unsuccessful attempts to commit suicide here yesterday. Richardson, who was taken to the county jail here after a passenger train crew had reported irrational actions on his part, cut his wrists, throat and arms with glass from a broken electric light bulb. He is expected to recover. The man was still strapped to a bed today but was reported as quiet and apparently resting. His father, who lives in San Francisco is expected here Tuesday.

Curtain Springs Make Simple
Window Aerial

Various kinds of indoor aerials are advocated for buildings where any other type is impossible; one of the most effective is shown in the illustration. Two spreaders of heavy iron wire or light iron rod, a little shorter than the width of the window, are bent with an eye at each end, and one in the center. The two spreaders are connected with a number of the light



curtain springs that are widely used instead of curtain rods. The efficiency of the aerial depends to a great extent upon the number of springs used. The spreaders are suspended between the top and bottom of the window casing, insulators being used as shown. The springs are drawn up tightly so that they will not touch each other, and the aerial will not swing.
