BRIDGE DEFEATS OXFORD ROWERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW, England, April 5.—Cambridge University's variety eight crew today by defeating a heavier and more experienced crew in the seventy-five mile race from Putney to Mortlake. The light blues won by four and one half lengths. The rowers got away at 2:22 p. m. and a quarter mile.

Cambridge was ahead by a quarter length at the mile and a half, and at the two mile mark pulled during the third stroke of which the Cambridge crew had been reduced to four. It was David and George who were the main struggle and before the race was over the Cambridge crew had seemed to rest a much heavier crew of dark blue and a quarter mile before, while the light blues

had only one veteran in the boat. The easy victory of the Cambridge youngsters was won in fast time—the mark they made being only 12 seconds slower than the record of 18 minutes 29 seconds held by Oxford.

There was scarcely a member of the Cambridge eight who showed any signs of overstrain at the finish, while in the Oxford shell, the bow, numbers 2, 3, 4 and 6 and Stroke Meilen appeared to be distressed.

LAWN CONTEST PLANS COMPLETE

Prizes Offered for Improvements to Yards, Parkings, Lawns and Streets.

SCOUTS TO GIVE AID

Boys to Make Frequent Surveys of All Parts of City and Keep Record of Work Done.

The plans for the lawn project of the City Beautiful Commission have been completed by the Woman's Club committee, and are being submitted with the sincere hope that all will enter into the contest with great enthusiasm, thereby doing their part towards making the city more beautiful. The city has been divided into five divisions; the southeast section, the southwest section, northeast section and northwest section, and West Roseburg, using Jackson and Cass streets as the dividing lines. The following boy scouts will make frequent surveys and report to the committee. The southeast section, Maynard Bell, and Robert Oppie; southwest section, Russell Laughhead and Loren Johnson; northwest section, Stanley Kidder, Jr., Bill Knight, West Roseburg, Ross Bates; southwest section, George Webber, Wayne Riggs.

Three classes of prizes will be given to each section as follows:
New lawns and parkings, 1st prize, \$5.00; 2nd prize, one-half dozen rose bushes; 3rd prize, three rose bushes.

Improved lawns and parkings, 1st prize six rose bushes; 2nd prize, three rose bushes; 3rd prize, one rose bush.

Most attractive grounds, 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes will be ribbons.
The long streets running north, south, east and west, are put in another division, and two classes of prizes will be given in this division. The first is for the most beautiful street in Roseburg, and the other for the one showing the most improvement.

The streets to be included in this division are Main, Jackson (north and south), Rose, Stephens, Pine, Mill, Winchester, Douglas, Washington, Lane, Cass, Oak, Mosher, Court and Commercial. The judging of the lawns and streets will be the last week in August.

SPECULATION IS CAUSED BY MEETING

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PARIS, April 5.—Premier Poincaré's long conversation yesterday with the German Ambassador, Herr Von Seeck, caused much speculation.

It is understood to have been principally concerned with the renewal of the agreement between the German industrialists of the Ruhr and the occupation authorities which expires on the fifteenth of this month.

The impression has gained ground that the Germans intend to refuse a renewal which in the French view, would be tantamount to resumption of passive resistance. Another question to the fore in France as to German relations is the control of Germany's disarmament.

If a play is all powerful and absorbing it needs no upholstery with "magnificent" sets in the opinion of Thomas H. Ince. The veteran producer has daringly departed from all the conventions of screenland in his latest picture, a film version of "Anna Christie." Eugene O'Neill's successful stage drama. Instead of using the usual art backgrounds, Ince has staged some of the greatest scenes of his plan in the sordid atmosphere of pre-Victorian saloons! This picture, a First National release, will be shown at the Antlers theater on Sunday and Monday.

By far the most picturesque "saloon study" offered in the Ince production is the one on the Shanghai water front, a "Sailor's Rest" wedged in between Chinese shops where stolid Orientals offer their wares. Here it is that the foundation for "Anna's" tragedy lies for "Chris," the squarehead father, spending all his money on drink and Chinese toys, never can save enough to take him back to Sweden—and the first bonds of parental authority—are loosened until, unknowingly, he forces upon his little girl a fate worse than death.

David Robert Gladwill was born May 1, 1845 in Calloway county, Missouri. Died February 28, 1924, at the home of his son, W. D. Gladwill, Roseburg, Oregon, aged 78 years, 10 months, 27 days.

He was married in October 1868 to Miss Alice Augusta Koons. Their early married life was spent in Mexico, Missouri, from there they moved to Albany, N. Y., and later to Carroll county, Missouri, settling on a farm near Hale, where they lived until the death of his wife, June 24, 1897.

He and his wife had six children born four of whom survive. W. D. Gladwill of Roseburg, Oregon; Mrs. Mattie Coleman of Eugene, Oregon; Mrs. W. S. Deardon of Los Angeles, California; Byron Gladwill of Kansas City, Missouri. Besides 25 grandchildren and five great grand children, who survive him.

Mr. and Mrs. Gladwill united with the M. E. Church South, the same year of their marriage, and remained faithful and active members until death called them home. Mr. Gladwill served three years during the Civil War.

Well might it be said of him, "He fought a good fight, he finished his course; he kept the faith, henceforth there is laid up for him a crown of life." The body was accompanied by his son, W. D. Gladwill to the old home in Missouri. A good man is gone from us.
