TO INVESTIGATE BRIDGE ACTION

Governor Pierce Orders Attorney General to Investigate Acts of Multnomah County Commissioners

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, April 7.—Governor Pierce today ordered a grand jury investigation of alleged illegal acts of the Multnomah county commissioners and other officials and requested Attorney-General Van Winkle to take charge of the probe.

The attorney-general at once got in touch with John Collier and Lester W. Humphreys, Portland attorneys, and asked them to take direct charge of the investigation as representatives of his office. The attorneys fees to Collier and Humphreys are guaranteed, according to Governor Pierce, though in no specific amount, and will be paid by public subscription. All subscriptions will be published.

The governor's action was in response to the demands of various committees, he said, though he declined to mention any names other than that taxpayers' committee was one of them. J. N. Teal, W. B. Ayer, John Ainsworth and other men of that type are said to be members of this committee.

The governor's order to the attorney-general mentions no alleged illegal acts but is presumed to have been brought on directly by the Burnside bridge affair.

"It will go to the bottom of everything," said the Governor.

Governor Pierce conferred Saturday night in Portland with a large number of the citizens who have requested the investigation and a delegation waited upon Attorney-General Van Winkle in Salem yesterday. It was in these issues, it is said, that Collier and Humphreys were agreed upon to make the investigation.

SALEM, April 7.—Governor Pierce today refused to discuss his letter to the attorney-general ordering a grand jury investigation into the alleged "illegal acts of the Multnomah county commissioners and other officials," asked to elucidate upon his reference to "other officials," the governor refused to answer.

Attorney-General Van Winkle expressed the opinion that the reference to other officials was made merely in a general way to give the investigators blanket authority to carry their investigation as far as they deemed necessary.

Lifting two acres of land bodily out of the valleys of the Cumberland mountains and planting it in the foothills surrounding Hollywood, Calif., is literally what was done by the Paramount company producing "The Trail of the Lonesome Pine," a picture starring Mary Miles Minter, with Antonio Moreno, featured as leading man, which comes to the Majestic theatre tonight.

Picturesque in its resemblance to the actual thing, the scene was made for sequences of the photoplay mentioned. Two acres of land on the Lasky ranch were fenced in with long rail fences. Golden corn, stacked and appearing like sentinels guarding the little farm and house, wait to be hauled from the field.

A cabin home of three rooms, with several coon dogs, a couple of horses, scores of chickens and ducks, two donkeys and other common natives of the Cumberland barnyard, stand demurely in the center of the two acres.

SMALL VOLUME FARMING MAY CAUSE LOW PROFITS

Many Oregon farmers who fail to make money fall because their total volume of farm business is too small, according to cost production studies conducted by the state college extension service. Gross receipts are so light that overhead and other expenses eat up all the profits.

The average annual receipts of 281 dairy farms, as determined by farm management surveys in 1929-32 totaled only \$2863. Those were average size farms and the results fairly representative of that type of farming, says R. S. Besse of the extension service.

"Now from these gross receipts," Mr. Besse explains, "all cash expenses of production and operation and all interest on borrowed capital must be deducted. The balance represents the amount the farmer has left for interest on his investment and for his labor and the labor of his family."

"While these figures look a bit discouraging, there is very little about them to depress farmers. They represent averages, when all the facts are known about the individual incomes it is clear that many of the farmers were making nice profits, while others were losing money."

"Analysis of the individual individual records shows that while 90 of these dairymen had a gross income of less than \$2000 per year, 58 of them made from \$3000 to \$4,000 gross income, 36 made from \$4000 to \$5000 and 30 made gross incomes ranging from \$5000 to \$14,000 per year. The remainder, 67, fell into the class between \$2000 and \$3000."

BALFOUR PRAISES LABORS OF LEAGUE IN SAVING RUSSIA

(By Associated Press.)

LONDON, April 7.—The story of the recovery of Austria should convince the most skeptical and most cynical that the League of Nations is capable not only of great disinterested effort for a common world object, but that through it alone can the peace and prosperity of the world be guaranteed. The Earl of Balfour said recently in addressing the first meeting of the Anglo-Austrian society.

The society, which is composed of Englishmen and Austrians resident in London interested in the reconstruction of Austria, has grown out of the successful efforts of these people to float the Austrian loan in England. More particularly the society is interested in promoting good relations between England and Austria in the matters of art, science, commerce and education, and to help Vienna to re-assume the leadership in those arts which she formerly held.

Lord Balfour, as chairman of the finance committee of the league, which in November, 1922, investigated the possibilities of stabilizing the Austrian currency and reconstructing the country, is accredited with having drawn up the plan which within 15 months has made the country one of the most stable and prosperous on the continent.

He early declared that the league of nations had firmly fixed itself as a necessity. "By its capable carrying out of its Austrian policy with wisdom, with caution and with courage, the league has justified its existence once again," he said.

There were problems confronting the world today, the speaker declared, the solution of which was difficult; some others the solution of which seemed impossible. But those who are apt to be pessimistic ought to look at this great experiment which Austria and the League of Nations, acting together, had carried through, and feel that much could be done by human effort, human resolution, honest and genuine cooperation, and a belief that in the future mankind, properly and wisely led, might deal with situations which seemed quite hopeless.
