SEARCH ON FOR SLAYER OF GIRL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
REDDING, Calif., April 7.—Search continued today for the slayer of Oleava Hamlin, 15, whose body was found yesterday two miles west of Kennett, a mining town north of Redding. She had been stabbed, beaten and choked. A knife wound in the throat probably caused death. The only clue is a large pocket knife.

The girl lived with her father, a miner, in a cabin near the Mammoth mine. She went to Kennett Saturday for supplies. When she failed to return home that night a search was started which resulted in discovery of the body yesterday. Her slayer dragged the body about sixty feet and dropped it into a gulch.
