SHIPPING SHOWS
DECIDED INCREASE

There has been a decided increase in shipments of lumber being made through the Port of Umpqua in the past few weeks, says the Port Umpqua Courier. Last week more than a million feet of lumber went out for delivery to the southern part of California. This week the Bertie Hanlon was loaded at the Winchester Bay Lumber company dock and the latter part of the week a boat new to these waters was due in.

The Umpqua Mills and Timber company expected to load the Chohalia, steamer schooner, whose home port is Frisco.

The latter part of the week, the steamer, Admiral Nicholson, substituting for the Morning Star, which was to have opened the Bandon to Portland passenger and freight service, is due in. Jack Diehl is local agent for the line. This company plans to give ten day service for the ports between Bandon and Portland. From Portland the time required for the trip is approximately three days. Newport is the only stopping point between here and Portland. Other ports to be served are Coos Bay and Bandon.

MILL OUTPUT INCREASED
Output at the C. MacC. Johnson Lumber company's mill has increased to such an extent during the past few months with the improvements made that with present equipment it is no longer possible for the Johnson-Anderson Logging company's camp

at Three Mile to furnish logs in sufficient quantities, says the Port Umpqua Courier. As a result of that condition Nonda Anderson this week is in Portland arranging for the purchase of a two-speed yarder donkey engine.

Extensions being made at the camp include building of a mile and a half of railroad to tap the second half of the timber holding on which the cutting is being done. The timber on this section will not be cut for about a year. In doing this construction work, an additional crew—the driver crew—of ten men has been put on.

At the C. MacC. Johnson mill the work of bricking the new boilers was completed Thursday and it was announced that the new boilers will be in operation by the tenth of the month.
