BUSY SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL

Many Routine Matters Are Brought Up at Meeting Held Last Night.

PAVING IS CONSIDERED

Four Streets to Be Paved in Near Future—Improvement Bonds to Be Issued.

The city council engaged in another long, drawn-out session last night. Many matters of routine business were brought up for consideration and the meeting was not adjourned until a very late hour.

City Treasurer Thomas stated that sinking fund number 1 now contains approximately \$22,223, of which \$2,500 is in liberty bonds. He says that he has been made a good offer for these bonds, and requested permission to sell them and invest the money in improvement bonds bringing a higher rate of interest. He was authorized to take such action.

James Sawyers appeared with an amended petition for the paving of East Avenue. The residents of that street are asking for a somewhat different style of paving than has been laid on any other street. The street is quite narrow and it was first proposed to pave it for the full width. The resident, however, decided that this would encourage parking on each side, and with no sidewalk space would make it difficult for pedestrians.

It is now proposed to pave the street 19 feet wide with four-foot sidewalks, with low 4-inch, rounding curbs. The street would have no gutters, and instead of sloping from the center to the sides, would slope from the sides to the center, with the manhole in the middle of the street. The proposed plan has been approved and the specifications will be prepared on that basis.

Residents of Hamilton street petitioned the council to cause a sink hole near the Rose school to be filled. This hole resulted when excavations were made for a house which was never completed. The hole has never been filled in and during wet weather becomes full of stagnant water and is an eyesore and unhealthy. The matter was referred to the committee on health and police for action.

A petition was presented asking for the paving of Parrott street from Maple to Oak. The petition was referred back to the petitioners to endeavor to have the block between Maple and Lane added, as it is against the policy of the council to pave dead end streets, and insists that wherever possible the new pavement link up with old pavement at each end.

A remonstrance was received against the grading of Houck street. There are several large oak trees in Houck street and some of the residents want the trees removed and others want them left. The council refused to have the trees cut, and so some of the residents brought in a petition asking that the street be graded, for as a cut is needed it would force the removal of the trees. The petition, however, did not ask for the paving or improvement of the street, other than a cut. The remonstrators claim that the cut asked for in the original petition would not be sufficient to bring the street to its proper level and would destroy the surface so that without further improvement the street would be impassable in wet weather. The petition, which had been laid on the table from the previous meeting, was denied.

A letter was received from the Postal Telegraph Company stating that it would paint its poles in accordance with the city ordinance as soon as authority is received from the head office. Recorder Whipple informed the council that he had written to the company on several occasions and that little satisfaction had been established. Mayor Rice stated that the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company has been very prompt in complying with the city's request regarding the painting of poles, and that there was no reason why there should be any delay. He was authorized by the council to enforce the terms of the ordinance which provide a heavy fine for each day of delay, and unless the order is complied with at once, the mayor expects to assess such fine against the company.

A communication was received from the Public Service Commission, advising the council that the new schedule of rates asked for by The California Oregon Power Company had been granted and became effective April 1.

A request for changes in the assessment of Block A and Block K in Laurelwood was referred to the city engineer.

George W. Stokes of the fire marshal's office, appeared before the council and reported that the crew which is standardizing the fire apparatus connections throughout the state

would soon be ready to start work in Roseburg. Up until the present time all cities in Oregon have been buying fire equipment with various kinds of threads on the connections. Because of this fact there has been a great deal of difficulty wherever fire apparatus from one city was taken to another city to help in an emergency. In Roseburg the Pacific Coast standard has been used. This differs very slightly from the National standard which was adopted by the legislature. A crew of men from the fire marshal's office will be here in about two weeks and will go over all hydrants and hose connections and make them uniform, so that it will be possible to exchange apparatus with other towns in the future.

Councilman Powell reported that the assessment change asked for by Attorney Cordova should be denied. He also recommended that the Parrott street sewer petition be granted.

The regular reports of the street superintendent and city marshal were read.

Mayor Rice commended George Grinn, street superintendent, for the excellent manner in which that department is conducting its work. Mr. Grinn is giving better service, the mayor reported than any man who has previously served in this position. The action of the mayor in purchasing a carload of asphalt for street repair work was ratified.

It was reported to the council that an error had been made in the assessment of the cost of paving Court House Alley but as the time for filing remonstrances had passed no action was taken.

The engineer was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for the paving of Spruce street.

The council appropriated \$25 to be used by the Woman's Club in awarding prizes for the lawn and parking contest.

The ordinance providing for the construction of the Laurelwood sewer was passed.

An ordinance issuing \$46,439 worth of improvement bonds, was passed. The bonds, issued under the Hancock act, cover improvements on Cobb street Military St., Corey Avenue, First Ave., North, Flint St., Kane St., N. Rose St., Court House Alley, Alley Block 51, Flood St. and Rowe St.

Plans and specifications for the paving of four streets were presented by the city engineer. The streets to be paved are Glenn street, estimated cost, \$2,582.06; Lilburn street, \$2,338.29; Harvard Avenue, \$2,465.43; Haynes St. \$1,982.44.

NEW REVENUE BILL REPORTED

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The new revenue bill was reported favorably by the senate today by the finance committee.

It provides, as reported for a retroactive reduction of 25 per cent on 1923 income taxes which are payable this year; permanent revision of the income tax rates in accordance with the plan of Secretary Mellon; a special reduction of 25 per cent in taxes on earned incomes; and repeal of many of the miscellaneous and excise taxes.

The scope of tax reduction was narrowed, however, from that provided by the house bill, warning of a treasury deficit under its terms leaving forced restoration of some of the miscellaneous taxes stricken out during house consideration of the measure.

The measure was ordered reported on a strictly party vote, nine to seven. Democrats announced their opposition was based on the Mellon income rates schedule carried by the bill.

The committee will be called either tomorrow or Thursday to take up the soldiers' bonus bill, Chairman Smoot said. He predicted not more than three days will be required to get a report on the bill. The chairman does not expect to call the tax bill up for consideration in the senate before the middle of next week.

SHOPS CLOSED FOR AMERICAN DEAD

TIRANA, Albania, April 8.—All the shops were closed today out of respect to Robert Lewis Solesman and George B. DeLong, Americans slain by bandits on the road between Centuri and the capital Sunday.

The national assembly suspended its session for five minutes as a mark of respect and there was a popular manifestation of sympathy before the American legation.

BIRTH CONTROL BILL BEFORE COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The question of whether the circulation of birth control knowledge should be permitted was threshed over today by a senate committee.

Representative Vaile, republican, Colorado, urged a favorable report on the Cummins-Vaile bill. He contended that public morality was not more conspicuous in the United States now than 50 years ago, when the provisions of the law he seeks to have stricken from the statute books were inserted. The measure, he said, does not propose to teach "birth control" and "does not propose any new legislation."

"We propose to make lawful what was lawful prior to 1873 and what is legal in every other country of the world," he said.

SIX MONTHS OLD BABY IN JAIL

MEDFORD, April 8.—There is a six months old baby in the Jackson county jail, the daughter of Ruth Brown, paramour, of Milan Jones, brother of "Oregon" Jones escaped convict from the state prison at Salem. Jones is held for his alleged connection with the Blackwell Hill automobile holdup. The mother is held as the recipient of loot stolen in the holdup. Jones the mother and the baby were brought back a week ago from Los Angeles by Sheriff C. E. Terrill.

The baby's name is Virginia June, and she does not cry—a healthy, happy infant.

"What is her last name?" the mother was asked, "Jones or Brown?" "Brown—I guess," was the smiling reply.

"It must seem tough to have her in jail?" queried Sheriff Terrill.

"Virginia don't know whether she is in jail, or in Japan," answered the mother.

There is one dread in the life of Ruth Brown. She fears some welfare society will come and take her baby away.

Milan Jones will be given a preliminary hearing next Thursday. Ruth Brown will appear at the same time.

LAND GRANTS TO NAME OF FORD IN BE INVESTIGATED RUSSIAN TRIAL

Claim Great Northern Railroad Has Violated Contracts With Government.

CHARGES ARE DENIED

Representatives of Railroad Company Maintain That Charges Contained in Resolution Wrong.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, April 8.—A resolution to authorize investigation by a joint congressional committee of all land grants to the Northern Pacific Railway company was approved today by the house public lands committee. The resolution also would restrain the secretary of the interior from adjustment of any claims by the railroad until after March 4, 1927. Should congress have failed to act prior to that date the restraining order would be removed, unless court action were pending, in which case any adjustment would be delayed awaiting the court's decision.

As accepted by the house committee the resolution differs from one passed by the senate in that it sets a specific time limit for the investigation. Action by the committee was taken after hearings were held in regard to charges by the secretary of the interior and agriculture that the railroad had violated in numerous cases its contract with the government. Representatives of the department testified that the railroad had forfeited its right to additional grants and should be denied claims to three million acres of national forest lands in Idaho and Montana.

Representatives of the railroads have denied these charges.

MOSCOW, April 8.—The name of Henry Ford has been brought into the trial at Kiev of 18 persons charged with counter-revolutionary action, and espionage, the prosecution charging that the American automobile manufacturer several years ago, supplied the "rotting center" counter-revolutionary organization in Paris with which the defendants were alleged to have been connected, with a large sum of money. This money, it is charged, enabled the organization to continue its activities in Soviet Russia.

GOVERNMENT COURSE AS YET UNDECIDED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, April 8.—The government's future action in the evictions question, in connection with which it suffered a defeat in the house of commons yesterday is the main topic of political speculation in parliamentary circles and the press, but there is as yet, no indication of the course it proposes to take.

It is noteworthy that after the defeat of the government's evictions bill a similar measure introduced by Ernest Simon, liberal, passed its second reading without opposition. The Simon bill was almost identical with the government bill with the exception of the first clause, objections to which killed the latter. This clause had to do with the reimbursement of landlords whose tenants, through unemployment, were unable to pay rent.

The liberals now hope that the government will adopt the Simon bill and put it through.

Another government defeat involving no direct political consequences, came into the house last night, an amendment on a minor financial question being carried against it, 207 to 170.
