THE HUMANE MOVEMENT.

As "Be Kind to Animals Week" is being noticed from April 7 to 12, it is interesting to study the progress of the movement for humane treatment of animals. While the promotion of kindness to human beings dates far back into antiquity, it took a long time to stir the world's heart in regard to the sufferings of animals. The founder of the Christian religion recognized this sentiment in saying: "Which of you shall have an ox or an ass fallen into a pit, and will not straightway pull him out on a Sabbath day?" But public sentiment was slow to organize this feeling. The first society to protect animals was not formed until 1824, when the same was organized in England. The movement was not organized in America until 1866. Abuses in transportation of cattle seemed to wake people up. The first efforts of the humane societies were directed to promote legislation on this matter, and they offered a prize of \$5000 for the best model of a cattle car that should make possible the feeding, watering, and resting of animals while in transit. The efficacy of humane society work is seen in the improved attitude of children. The boys who used to stone frogs and birds and tie tin dippers to dogs' tails, are rarely heard of now. Good talk in the schools and elsewhere has made them feel kindly toward the animals, whom they are more inclined to look on as brothers. Many horse owners, however, are still niggardly or careless of their animals, and they drive poorly fed and overloaded beasts. In some cases it is mere thoughtlessness, and a word of remonstrance from a neighbor will correct this fault. In other cases nothing but a summons to court and suitable penalty will be a sufficient warning.

senate oil committee.
J. W. Baughn of Harlingen, Texas, formerly an oil operator of Oklahoma, testified that Jake L. Hamon, republican committeeman of Oklahoma, told him he had "signed the check" that resulted in the nomination of Warren G. Harding. This conversation took place after the Chicago convention, Baughn said. He quoted Hamon as saying that he would spend \$1,000,000 if necessary to put Oklahoma in the republican column in the election.

William H. Miller of Columbus, Ohio, testified that he assisted in Harding's pre-convention campaign, visiting the northwestern states. He first met Hamon at Harding headquarters at Indianapolis, before the convention and later saw him at the Chicago convention.

"I had no part in the collection or disbursement of funds," Miller said. J. B. French of Oklahoma City testified last Monday that Hamon had told him he had given \$25,000 to Miller to pay the headquarters expenses of the Harding committee at Chicago.

There was no discussion of oil lands or leases at either of his meetings with Hamon, Miller said. Hamon had told him at the Indianapolis meeting that he was for Lowden, he said, but had added that Mrs. Hamon was a distant relative of President Harding and was importing him to support Harding. He denied that Hamon had given him \$25,000 to pay the expenses of Harding headquarters at Chicago.

The committee adjourned until Friday because of the difficulty in securing the attendance of witnesses.

UMPQUA CHIEFS
PLAN CARNIVAL

Booster Club Meets Tonight to Discuss Plans for Big Three-Day Event.

CLUB ASKS SUPPORT

Will Need Help in Bringing Back Old Carnival—Schools and Civic Clubs Will Be Asked to Co-operate.

The Umpqua Chiefs are making a determined effort to revive the old Strawberry Carnival, which has afforded a great deal of pleasure for the townspeople in the past, and which has been abandoned for the last two years or more. Committees were at work today canvassing the city to get the opinion of the merchants in regard to the feasibility of staging a celebration this year.

A meeting of the Chiefs has been called for tonight at which time the matter will be taken up in detail and the final plans laid. Committees will be appointed to decide upon whether carnival companies will be allowed to take part in the three days of fun and to arrange other features for the spring event.

The dates of May 22, 23 and 24 have been tentatively set for the affair. These dates come on a week end and have been thought a good time for the carnival. The other civic clubs of the city will be asked to cooperate in putting over the thing in the event the Chiefs definitely adopt the idea tonight.

The carnivals have proved a real pleasure fest in the past and have failed to go over financially only because of lack of support. The old celebrations brought people here from all over the county and many good carnivals were held. It is only recently that the idea was dropped and many people are desirous of seeing it again adopted.

The uniforms of the braves will have arrived before the dates of the carnival and they will be decked out in regular regalia for the occasion.

The schools of the city will probably asked to take some part in the event and will be entered in the big parade on the first day. Full plans will be completed tonight and if the club affirms the staging of the celebration committees will lose no time in making preparations for they believe they can make one of the biggest good-time affairs of the year.
