STENOGRAPHER SHOTS AND KILLS AGED WOMAN

PORTLAND, April 10.—Mrs. Eva Bradley, 65, was shot and killed at her home here today by Miss Nora Hollis, 49, a stenographer told police she did the shooting when she appeared at the police station and surrendered.

"The devil was in the woman," said Miss Hollis when she told the police of the killing.

"Read this book," she added, proffering a pamphlet she had written.

The police were skeptical when Miss Hollis informed them that she had shot Mrs. Bradley, but when officers went to the address she gave, 166 East (twelfth) street, to investigate, they found the woman lying upon the floor of her apartment, with two bullet wounds in the back.

UNLAWFUL TO WEAR MASKS AND GOWNS

EBENSBURG, Pa., April 10.—Declaring it is unlawful in Pennsylvania for a body of men to assemble when dressed in gowns and masks, Judge John A. Evans has ordered the 25 men arrested in Johnstown in connection with the rioting of townspeople and visiting members of the Ku Klux Klan last Saturday at Lilly in which two men were killed, be held without bail for the June term of criminal court.

BLY OREGON HOTEL REDUCED TO ASHES

KLAMATH FALLS, April 10.—Leaping from the second story windows, guests of the Bly Hotel at Bly, Oregon, bareheaded with their lives as fire of unknown origin starting in the rear of the building at midnight swept quickly through the two story, 15-room frame building. The hotel was reduced to ashes with a loss estimated at \$4,500, partially covered by insurance. Three nearby residences also were destroyed. The hotel was owned by Marvin Gross and Mrs. C. W. Warren, of Bly, who plan to rebuild. No one suffered injury. No personal property was saved from the hotel.

INSANE YOUTH IS DROWNED IN RIVER

PORTLAND, April 10.—Otis Buck, 22, early today leaped into the Willamette river after escaping from police headquarters and running for several blocks in the waterfront district pursued by a policeman. His body disappeared in the river. The young man's parents, according to the police, declare the young man mentally irresponsible.

He was apprehended by the police on the streets at an early hour this morning and taken to police headquarters. A few minutes later he dashed out of the station with a patrolman in pursuit.

Buck, according to police, was released from the state hospital for the insane at Pendleton several months ago. Last Sunday night he was arrested here on a vagrancy charge and the following night arrested in Oregon City after he was alleged to have entered a house and engaged the occupant in a fight.

JOHNSON'S HOTEL ROOMS ARE VACATED

CHICAGO, April 10.—Hotel rooms in the presidential row, which have served as headquarters for Senator Hiram as Johnsons campaign will be available to new tenants next Monday.

Officers of the hotel expected the Johnson suite would be vacated today or tomorrow.

Although the Chicago offices have not been considered national headquarters of the campaign since Frank H. Hitchcock relinquished active general direction of the Johnson forces early in February, they have served as a clearing house for strategic plans for several midwestern states.

Files and papers from the hotel suite will be transferred to the law offices of Harold L. Iskes, Illinois manager for the California senator.

When Mr. Hitchcock withdrew from the Chicago quarters in February following Mr. Ickes' appointment as Illinois manager he emphasized that in the broader sense, the Johnson campaign would be constituted of a number of individual and virtually independent state contests, with only such general co-ordination as might be suggested by Senator Johnson.

Yesterday afternoon the little girl and her companions were playing along the north seventeenth street, where the street car track runs through a shallow cut. Apparently not seeing an approaching street car, she ran directly into the side of it and was crushed between the trucks of the car and the side of the cut. Her fingers were amputated under the wheels when she grasped the rails.

GOODING REQUESTS AN INVESTIGATION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, April 10.—Senator Gooding, republican, Idaho, today asked the senate to investigate charges made by the Pomona grange of Idaho that he and his friends were favored by the war finance corporation in loans to livestock interests.

Denying that there has been any excessive loans to his or allied interests in Idaho, Senator Gooding said he wanted a thorough inquiry into the subject. He declared his own firm, Crain and Gooding, a livestock concern, had obtained only \$60,000; F. W. Gooding and Sons, \$99,500 and T. H. Gooding and Sons only \$21,500, and that all of the money had been repaid.

Senator Gooding said the War Finance Corporation has done a lot of good in Idaho, but that not all of the farmers of the state received loans as they had not joined the organization of corporations necessary to obtain government aid.

"My own bank organized a corporation to purchase dairy cows for farmers in my county," Senator Gooding said. "We then obtained money from the War Finance Corporation to cover the loans made by the banks to our corporation. No such corporation was organized around Boise, the home of the Pomona Grange. Evidently that grange expected the government to make direct loans to the farmers, which, of course, it couldn't do."

A resolution presented by the Idaho senator asked for a full investigation of the activities of the war finance corporation and urged that Senator Wheeler, democrat, Montana, prosecutor of the Daugherty committee have charge of the inquiry.
