AN EXAMPLE OF CITIZENSHIP.

It was given out a few days ago that President Coolidge's two sons have applied for membership in the citizen's military camp to be held at Camp Devens in Massachusetts. Some people used to feel years ago that wars had to be fought by the plainer classes of people, and that young men of social position and culture could not be expected to get down and do the hard and dangerous work of fighting. This idea was recognized during the Civil War, by the so-called "rich man's exemption." Under the conscription act, any person drafted was allowed to furnish an acceptable substitute, or he could pay a sum not to exceed \$300 to furnish such substitute. Such a law was a discrimination against the poor man, and some of the men thus hired as substitutes were undesirable and an injury to any army. In the world war democratic sentiment had gone so far that all such favors were abolished, and the son of the rich man or the high official had to serve just like Tom, Dick or Harry. The result was to unify the people in support of the government, since the old charge that the rich and powerful were able to escape military service was avoided. It is to be hoped that during the coming summer a great number of young men from prominent families will recognize the obligation to support these camps, and will take this training, and will thereby help make it very popular. They will get much out of it in return for their time and effort. It will mean improved physical condition, more alertness and self command, more ability to take positions of leadership. They also help make the country more secure. There will be more disposition to respect the United States and avoid picking quarrels with this country, if there is a reasonable degree of military preparation.

Douglas county people are getting together for the purpose of looking after the interests of the many new people to visit Oregon during the present year. A hearty welcome will be extended to all. They will be made acquainted with our resources and many possibilities, and this information will be given in the most sincere and truthful way possible that not a single person making a home in this great county will have cause or reason for disappointment.

The state income tax got its first jolt in a decision rendered by Judge Bingham at Salem Wednesday, so far as the act applies to corporations, the measure being held invalid. We see no good reason for passing the "buck" to individuals if corporations are to be exempt from the state tax. The law is either right all the way through or dead at both ends.

It's an off day when some energetic and enthusiastic booster fails to call you for a night committee meeting to thresh out important problems for the welfare of Roseburg. There's lots of good work being accomplished for this old town after dark. While many of its citizens are snoozing away the live wires are operating overtime.

INCOME TAX UP IN AIR

SALEM, April 11.—Governor Pierce said today that the supporters of the state income tax have not yet decided on a policy relative to the act, which has been declared in the circuit court for Marion county, unconstitutional as far as it applies to all corporations.

"I talked with C. E. Spence, R. F. Irvine, A. K. McLaughlin of Albany, and others who helped put the law on the statute books," said the

governor, "and we have not decided what we are going to do. The only thing I can say is that we are not going to quit."

The governor said the decree of Judges Kelly and Bingham, if finally sustained, would not have the effect of invalidating the whole law but that it would ruin the act.

HONDURAN CAPITAL BOMBED BY PLANES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Air pilots of Honduran revolutionary forces have begun bombing raids of Tegucigalpa, the capital and killed a number of women and children.

Four bombs were dropped near the grounds where members of the American landing force from the cruiser Milwaukee, at Amapala were exercising, but dispatches to the navy department today from Rear Admiral Dayton made no mention of any casualties among the American naval force.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Rear Admiral Dayton said the aviators evidently had mistaken the American sailors for enemies.

Commander Cautley, in charge of the detachment at Tegucigalpa was instructed by Admiral Dayton to make vigorous protest to the de facto government and revolutionary leaders against continued bombing of the city, as endangering the American lives.

The report to the navy department said the aim was to bomb the jail at Tegucigalpa, but that the missiles landed on residences.

HIRAM WAGES WAR ON ALL CORRUPTION

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Declaring his purpose to rid the republican party of "corrupt and reactionary control," Senator Hiram Johnson of California, candidate for the republican presidential nomination said in a statement published today "that he is neither discouraged nor despairing." He makes no specific mention of the reports that his campaign is to be curtailed, at least in view of the recent primary returns favoring the nomination of President Coolidge. Senator Johnson's statement, issued after a number of conferences, with friends and supporters, asserts that he will "continue trying" to smash the "unholy alliance between crooked big business and 'crooked politics'" so that the republican party may be "revitalized and regenerated."

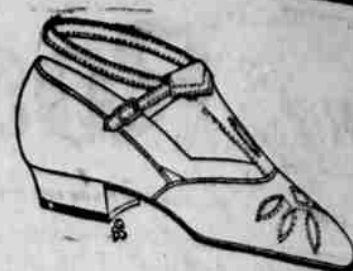
