and worry is, that there is something wrong with many of our young people today. The trend of the day is toward the restoration of religious training in the schools. At the National Education Association convention in 1915 a wealthy Californian offered a prize of \$1000.00 for the best paper on the subject under consideration. The \$1000.00 was awarded to Prof. Ruth of Berkeley, for his paper entitled, "Essentials of Religion in Education." There are many national organizations working toward the restoration of religious training in the schools. A few of these are the National Education Association, The Character De-

velopment League, the Bible in the Schools League, The Council of Churches. We have chaplains in the army, navy, and prisons; but God is not in our schools. The New England Primer, formerly much used, was 9-10 Bible quotations. Our primers of today studiously avoid this. Our national leaders were formerly from Harvard and Yale, when the Bible was taught in those colleges. "Righteousness exalteth a nation;" nearly all nations but France and U. S. have religion taught in the schools. In 1901 France removed the Bible from the course of study and in twenty years following crime increased there 80 per cent. About 50 or 60 years ago the study of the Bible was taken out of the schools of the U. S. Since that time crime has increased 400 per cent. Today the average holdup is a seventeen year old boy. It would not cost the state 1-10 as much to teach morals as it does to punish crime. Intellectual training does not make morals. An unmoral man is more dangerous educated, than not educated. History shows that the greatest nations fell at the height of their intellectual power. As education increases, crime increases, unless this education be accompanied by moral training. Some say, "Let the Sunday school train the young." In reply, there are 15 million boys and girls in the U. S. not in the Sunday school. There are 10,000 small towns west of the Mississippi where there has never been any preaching service. Bible characters interest the child. There are parts of the Bible, such as the Ten Commandments, the Golden Rule, the beatitudes and the Lord's prayer, which it is believed would be acceptable to Catholic, Protestant and Jew, for use in the school room. The teen age is the age that ideals are formed. Therefore it is important that the morals of the highest character be instilled into the young at this plastic period.

LATE BROCCOLI HARVEST IS ON

Growers Who Expected Nothing Are Now Reaping Fine Heads.

PRICES ARE EXCELLENT

Fields Which "Experts" Said Would Never Mature Are Giving Good Results in Many Sections.

Harry Winston, the heaviest broccoli grower in Douglas county is wearing a happy smile as he watches 35 men harvesting the broccoli from his 100 acre field. A few weeks ago, a so-called broccoli expert told Harry that he would be fortunate to get one head of broccoli off his patch, and that he had better buy some sheep and turn them in on the field. And as the huge trucks are carting away load after load of crated broccoli to be sold at prices which top season records for many years, Harry is having the laugh on the experts.

Growers who planted a certain late strain of broccoli and who went through the early part of the season with furrowed brows, and who were anxiously endeavoring to frame up some excuse to present to their bankers, are now wearing broad satisfied grins as the sharp knives shear their way along the tops of the crates filled with the delicious vegetable ready for the eastern market.

When the growers planted their fields last year they went into the industry on such a big scale that all sources of seed were soon exhausted. Many new strains were introduced, some of them being new strains which had never before been given a trial.

The regular season started the first of March and reached its peak about the middle of the month. Growers were busily engaged in harvesting their crops and looked with pity upon their neighbors, whose fields showed small, scattering undeveloped heads. The early market brought fairly good prices, ranging generally from \$1.10 to \$1.25 with some sales up to \$1.50.

The bulk of the crop was moved and still there were many growers whose fields showed nothing. Broccoli buyers, and so called experts went into the fields and examined them, only to return and declare "nothing doing." Harry Winston who had 100 acres of the new variety was told that he might get one good head off the entire patch. Another "expert" advised him that broccoli was excellent feed for sheep, and that by buying sheep and fattening them on broccoli he might be able to save himself from total loss.

A few of the despondent growers gave up. One or two leased out their land for other purposes, but the most of them, despondent and worried held on, hoping against hope that they might at least get a product good enough for canning. And then the crop started to mature, almost overnight it seemed that the small irregular heads shaped up into fine big heads, beautiful in shape and perfect in quality. The growers, who apparently lost everything began to take notice. The reluctantly abandoned plans for packing were hastily resurrected, and men were employed to take up the task which before had seemed so hopelessly remote.

Out in Harry Winston's field eighteen men are required to gather the heads as rapidly as they mature, and seventeen more are engaged in crating and hauling. From his 100 acres he will ship approximately 15,000 crates, somewhat less than had been originally expected, but almost up to the general average. Where the early growers sold for \$1.10 and up, he is receiving \$1.75 for number 1 crates and \$1.50 for number 2 heads, so that in spite of the fact that his crop is not completely up to what it should be, he will come out well financially.

Clay Smith, also of the Winston district is taking about 3,000 crates off of his 20 acre field, while Fred Winston and other growers are getting good results from their belated harvest.

It was feared that broccoli growers in the Umpqua Valley were due for a heavy loss. Although there was only a small damage from frost and bad weather, which played havoc in other sections, there appeared to be a great deal of loss from poor seed and growing conditions. It is true that there was considerable loss from poor seed. Many new varieties introduced did not turn out well, and some growers lost quite heavily. There was also some loss due to the fact that the new ground was put into use and did not prove practical for broccoli growing. Other conditions also entered, but on an average there was much better than a half crop, which with prices paid for broccoli gives a good harvest. The fact, however, that much of the acreage, which "experts" had so freely predicted was totally lost, is coming into bearing, and at prices brought about only by the late market, will add much to the industry, and will greatly reduce the loss percentage and will give a fine showing for the year.

ITINERANT GAMBLER KILLS POLICE CHIEF

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., April 14.—Chief of Police Oscar Sullivan was shot and killed here late last night and the police are hunting for Hubert Coates, who it is said emptied a .45 calibre automatic pistol into the body of the officer.

Coates is known as an itinerant gambler. Four bullets are said to have penetrated the body of the officer. Little is known of the cause of the trouble. One report is that Coates had been riding about the city in his automobile and that when Sullivan jumped out of a car near one of the large hotels and ordered him to stop, Coates opened fire on him.

Coates jumped into his car and sped away but was trailed for some distance out of the city. Sullivan is said to have given Coates orders not to gamble with visitors or he would be run out of town.

Sullivan had been chief of police here for about eight years and was about 50 years old. He is survived by a wife and one child.

JAPAN HEARS OF THE IMMIGRATION ACTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

TOKIO, April 14.—Sunday newspaper extras appraised Tokyo of passage by the house in Washington, of the Johnson Immigration bill. Officials and other well informed circles, however, accepted the vote as foregone conclusion and are hopefully waiting the senate action which is expected here to be the real test.

Comment on the action was withheld by the majority of the newspapers, the Kokumin alone publishing an editorial headed "mean nationalism" in which it expressed belief that the clause would be defeated in the senate or vetoed by President Coolidge.

GREEK PEOPLE VOTE FOR NEW REPUBLIC

ATHENS, April 14.—The Greek people have voted by a large majority for the establishment of a republican form of government to succeed the Gluckskburg dynasty, in complete returns in yesterday referendum showing a majority of 75 per cent in favor of the change.

LONDON, April 14.—A decree will be published today, says an agency dispatch from Athens, nominating Admiral Coundouriotis as president pro tem of Greece. The assembly will be divided into a senate and chamber of deputies and after the easter vacation will elect a president, who the dispatch says, will probably be Alex Zaimis, former premier, favored by Venizelos.

To insure domestic stability and peace, discussion of the constitution will be prohibited for five years, the dispatch continues.

ORDER TO SHOW CAUSE

In the County Court of the State of Oregon for Douglas County.

In the matter of the guardianship of the person and estate of

Donovan S. Denning, deceased.

The above cause coming on to be heard upon petition of Jeff Williams, the duly appointed, qualified and acting guardian of the person and estate of Donovan S. Denning a minor, for license to sell the real property described in the petition and belonging to said minor, and it appearing to the court that the father and mother of said minor are each dead, that real property belonging to said minor is wholly unimproved lands being timber lands and the same brings in no income whatever to said minor, but that the same is a constant expense on account of the annual taxes levied against said property, and that within a few years the taxes on said property would amount to more than the present value of said land; and that it will be to the best interest of said minor to sell said real property and to invest the proceeds in some interest bearing securities or some productive stock, as provided by statute.
