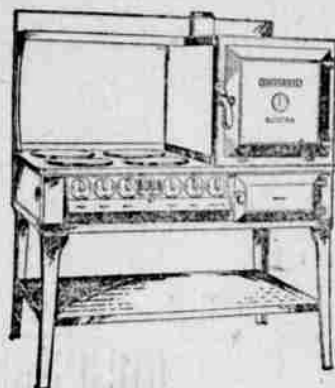

A. S. DUDLEY TALKS TO LOCAL KIWANIS

Roseburg has a wonderful opportunity to capitalize a sentiment in the staging of the much-talked-of Indian rendezvous late in July, according to A. S. Dudley, manager of the state Chamber of Commerce, who talked today at the Kiwanis luncheon. The valuable publicity which will accrue from the event will be worth thousands of dollars to the Umpqua Valley he told the Kiwanians and the event comes at a time when the state will be flooded with tourists. He pledged the cooperation of the state chamber and the chambers of commerce in other cities in the state. He suggested that some good name be selected for the pageant, such as "The Last Stand of the Indian." Twenty-one tribes will participate in the production in the event the Roseburg and Douglas county citizens decide to go ahead with the proposition. Mr. Dudley, who formerly lived in Sacramento, California, recalled a similar production which was staged there. It was called the "Days of '49" and an old time mining village was constructed to properly typify the historical feature. The women of the city wore calico whooped skirts for weeks, the men went without shaving and many other features were used to secure publicity for the occasion. As a result Sacramento received a million dollars worth of front page newspaper advertising gratis. He declared that Roseburg stands in a fair way to "follow suit" and should the Indian pageant be staged he predicted that the highway at this point would be jammed with sightseers.

Today's Kiwanis luncheon was a very successful one and the violin numbers by Wayne Ackers were greatly enjoyed. Bill Holstein in introducing Mr. Dudley stated that the Indian rendezvous would in no way interfere with the plans for the Strawberry carnival to be staged late in May. NEW RECORD SET BY S. P. WORKMEN

Old Turntable Removed and New One Installed in Short Space of Time.

OFFICIALS ARE PRESENT

Only One Hour and Forty-Six Minutes Required for Installation—Former Record Over 4 Hours.

A crew of 46 Southern Pacific workmen today broke all world records in the removal of a turntable and the installation of a complete new one, when they tore out the old equipment in the local yards, and replaced one, when they tore out the old equipment in one hour and forty six minutes. The best previous record was made at San Luis Obispo where the time required was four hours and thirty minutes.

The results of the work done today prove conclusively the value of perfect organization and system.

At 10:14 this morning an engine was turned about on the old turntable. Before the old table had stopped moving, it appeared, huge cranes were lifting it out of its pit and swinging it off to one side.

The new turntable had been assembled outside of the pit, and scarcely was the old machinery out of the way until two locomotives dragged the new table into position. Huge hooks were fastened into cable loops, and with no lost time or motion, the cranes lifted the new turntable into place and put it on the pivot.

Men were everywhere, each one attending to his own particular job. The new turntable is forty feet longer than the old and as the pit has been dug for the new one for several weeks, extension tracks on heavy supports were used while the old table was operated. These sections of track were picked up bodily by the sweelers and lifted out of the pit. Electricians connected up the motors, and ran wires from the turntable to a nearby pole. Just one hour and forty-six minutes after the old turntable had switched an engine end for end, the same engine was wheeled around again on the new apparatus.

The work was done under the direction of M. G. Kirkpatrick, H. C. Kling and L. Hitchcock, and practically all of the members of the crew are local men and have been working on this division for considerable time.

The new turntable is 90 feet in length, and weighs 214,000 pounds. It is electrically operated, and is to be used to handle the huge mountain type locomotives which are soon to be put in use on the southern part of the Portland division. Roseburg will be the north terminal for these huge engines, which will be used in the freight hauls from California to this city.

The preparations for this record making installation have been under way for a long time. The old pit was enlarged several weeks ago, and the concrete walls and foundations for the new equipment constructed. All of this was done without interfering with traffic in any way. The old tracks were kept in use by blocking them up so that there was no hindrance to the switching of engines.

A huge crowd gathered to watch the spectacular task which was so successfully terminated. There were also many Southern Pacific officials present and every phase of the work was checked, while pictures were taken every few minutes. The crews beat all previous records by a wide margin and were highly commended. Traffic was not halted while the task was being done, as the old turntable was out and the new one in between the schedules of any trains operating in and out of the city.

PLANES ARE STOPPED BY BAD WEATHER

SEWARD, Alaska, April 15.—Although the weather for today westward from here looked doubtful and it had been predicted that four United States army planes which arrived Sunday on a trip around the earth would remain until tomorrow, Major Frederick L. Martin, their commander, later said he might go today. The time set for departure unless the weather should absolutely forbid was 4 o'clock this morning. This will be 9 o'clock in San Francisco.
