CAUSE OF AGRICULTURAL DISTRESS.

An Iowa county agent described the real cause of most of the agricultural distress, as follows: Most of us have been so busy watching the up grade movement of the high prices of land that we have forgotten almost all the fundamental principles that underlie all farm value. While we want and hope that our land will be high priced, we do not want it to be so high priced that it will not bring fair returns. The value of the produce from our land is the thing of supreme importance to every farmer and every land owner. A very considerable bit of serious thought must be given to the carrying on of production in the business of farming. Haphazard methods of farming, waste land, poor seed, inferior stock, all must go by the board if we are going to succeed in this new and large venture of high priced land. The methods of our fathers and grandfathers can not possibly be used for successful results. We must use our most modern methods and must discover and plan new things if our success is to be maintained. The scrub must be relegated to the scrap heap the same as the old horsepower threshing machine and the old reaper. This is no idea that has been hatched in a pipe dream or in idealism but in cold facts that stare us in the face. It is for us to go to work and plan out for ourselves the things that are going to put the best stock and the best equipment on our farms and to make them produce interest on their valuation.

The house of representatives is taking active measures to prevent the use of habit-forming drugs. The committee on ways and means has reported a bill to forbid the importation of opium to be used in the manufacture of heroin. Heroin is considered the most dangerous of all habit-forming drugs. The United States public health service, the army, the navy, and the United States Veterans Bureau have forbidden its use, and the American Medical Association has condemned it as a useless drug from the medical standpoint. This bill, in connection with the Harrison act, will be effective in preventing addicts from obtaining it. The only source remaining will be from smuggling and a vigorous fight will be continued on that. The house has also appropriated \$10,000 for the International Convention to be held this summer at which there is reason to believe that a world-wide fight will be agreed upon against all habit-forming drugs and against heroin especially.

GOV. AL SMITH TO BE A CANDIDATE

ALBANY, N. Y., April 16.—Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York today stands before the nation as a receptive candidate for the democratic presidential nomination, a candidate who announced himself as willing to accept the honor after the democratic state convention meeting here yesterday, had loudly acclaimed him, as a type of public official needed to fill the position.

Breaking his silence on the possibility of becoming a presidential candidate, Governor Smith, in an address before the convention, declared he would be "honored beyond the power of expression to lead the forces of the party in the next campaign." If the necessary votes could be obtained at the democratic national convention in New York next June.

No doubt of the support New York democrats would give him remained in the minds of spectators after the governor had made this declaration.

JAKE HAMON'S WIDOW HAS BEEN SUBPOENAED

CHICAGO, April 16.—Mrs. Geo. Hamon Rohr, widow of Jake L. Hamon, slain Oklahoma politician, was served last night with a subpoena to appear before the Brookhart-Wheeler senate investigating committee. She declared she would not go to Washington under any circumstances.

Any papers relating to her late husband's political campaign probably were burned up months ago," she said. "I'm a good democrat and never was given any of the republican secrets Mr. Hamon was supposed to possess," Mrs. Rohr added.

L. W. Dickson, veteran telegraph operator, who was in charge of the late Senator Bois Penrose's private wire between Philadelphia and Chicago during the 1920 republican convention here also was served with a summons.

The subpoena for Dixon was said to have referred to the fact that Dixon handled a leased wire from the Waukegan, Ill., court room during the trial and acquittal two years ago of Governor Len Small. There was no explanation of the reference to the Waukegan case.

DEMOCRATS TO HOLD WILSON AS MODEL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, April 16.—A movement has been launched by democrats who were close to President Wilson to "fasten the Woodrow Wilson tradition on the party" at the forthcoming national convention.

At a banquet of the Woodrow Wilson democracy last night it was resolved to maintain headquarters during the convention here and to invite similar action in other cities to urge the insertion in the democratic platform of a plank declaring for American participation in the league of nations with or without reservations.

Judge John W. Wescott of Camden, N. J., who nominated Wilson at the Baltimore convention was the principal speaker.

"Let us," he said, "press forward and reincarnate Woodrow Wilson. As Abe Lincoln has for 30 years been the dominant tradition of the republican party so now should Woodrow Wilson be made for the democrats."

"The politicians are going to be scared, white by the reaction of 1920. They will say the league issue was buried then and anyone who is for it hereafter is doomed to defeat. The question is:

"Can we impregnate them with a little intelligence?"

"Everybody is for the league now, even the Germans and the French and the English. Everybody is for it but republican politicians. It is the great opportunity for the world, for the democratic party and for the country."
