NOT A BAD IDEA.

Today a lady who believes in the city beautiful program called the News-Review office up and asked why it would not be a good step for the city council to invoke a law governing the erection of buildings in the city that interfere and are a disadvantage to other buildings. She thought, and the idea is quite right, that some provision should be made whereby a home already established and beautified would not be subject to other building in too close proximity obliterating view and giving an irregular appearance to any particular block in the city. While there is no ordinance in Roseburg governing a matter of this kind, many cities do have laws dealing with the subject at hand and much good has resulted therefrom, without working any hardship on those contemplating the erection of a new home or public building. At any rate, if people generally would have a little more consideration for their neighbor when building a new home on adjoining property it would add greatly to the appearance of any city. BOOTLEGGERS HAVE
MET THEIR WATERLOO

MEDFORD, April 17.—According to local police the hoof and mouth quarantine of the California line has practically put an end to bootlegging traffic in southern Oregon. Nearly all the bootleggers heretofore have come from the south and now the professionals have dropped out entirely, the police declare. Yesterday evening Pete Blanchi of Weed was stopped at the line and during the search and fumigation process the state officers discovered six bottles of home made wine.

One of the state dry agents now stationed permanently at the quarantine station was summoned and Blanchi was brought to justice court here where he pleaded guilty and was released after paying a \$200 fine. According to the police six cars headed for Oregon when informed they would be searched turned around and abandoned their trips.

JACKSON COUNTY
AGENT TO ASSIST

MEDFORD, Ore., April 17.—C. C. Cate, county agent here, who was appointed assistant in the hoof and mouth quarantine work yesterday by State Veterinarian W. H. Lytle announced today that he had conferred with Southern Pacific officials here in an effort to have all hobo's traveling on trains from California to be fumigated before entering Oregon. Mr. Cate said hobo's are a real menace as they frequent barns and hay stacks where the germs of the dread disease are most frequently found. Local Southern Pacific officials are taking up the matter with San Francisco headquarters.

NEWBERG RANCHER
KILLED BY SHOTGUN

NEWBERG, April 17.—A. E. Westcott, who resides on a ranch five miles northwest of here, was instantly killed this morning by a shot from a shotgun. A son, working in the barn, heard a shot and a few minutes later another son found his father's body with the head nearly blown off. It was lying behind a fence and the discharged gun was on the other side. Relatives think he was killed accidentally while trying to climb the fence.

A few months ago Mr. Westcott mysteriously disappeared. His car was found in the Willamette river and a few days later he turned up at home, but was unable to recall where he had been or what manner of mishap had sent his machine into the river.

The coroner's jury will convene Friday morning to investigate the death.

EXCHANGE OF VIEWS
ON GERMANY'S REPLY

PARIS, April 17.—The reparations commission engaged this morning in an unofficial exchange of views concerning the attitude to be adopted following receipt of Germany's reply accepting the experts' reports as a practical basis for solution of the reparations problem. The commission is meeting in plenary session this afternoon, when it is expected its official decision will be taken. In reparations circles it is believed the commission will immediately refer the reports to the interested government.

The inclusion of the unofficial session, Louis Barthou, president of the commission said:
"Solution of the reparations problems appears to be in a fair way of realization, there are excellent reasons to be optimistic, although the difficulties as yet are from being solved."

CHICAGO, April 17.—A payroll tax of five percent in the payroll of manufacturers and business men has been suggested by George Myercoed, former president of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association, to Senator Smoot, in lieu of sales tax. This Mr. Myercoed's letter, made public today, could be accomplished easily and without an army of government employees to compute the tax.

"If the national payroll was \$50,000,000, a five per cent tax would realize \$1,500,000,000," the letter stated.

SENATOR JOHNSON IN
NEW JERSEY CAMPAIGN

NEWARK, N. J., April 17.—Senator Johnson of California has entered the New Jersey campaign for republican national convention delegate with an assertion that the cause of present conditions at Washington is the "recrudescence of the unholy alliance between crooked big business and crooked politics."

In a speech at Newark last night the senator also characterized the recent speeches of Senator Pepper and Secretary Hughes as lacking even "conventional indignation" at what has been disclosed in Washington.

President Coolidge was contrasted with Theodore Roosevelt, who, Senator Johnson said "would have settled the whole oil scandal in 48 hours."

Senator Johnson said Secretary Mellon was the dominant factor in the republican party, and that therefore he had been the presidential nominee. He will speak in Jersey City and Hoboken tonight.

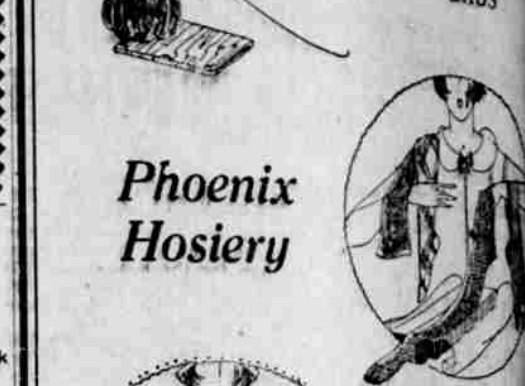
