Notice of appeal immediately was
given by the state and following
consultation of counsel it was in-
dicated that they expected to have the
necessary steps perfected for appeal
within two weeks and would urge
the supreme court to advance the
cause on the calendar for an early
decision.

Under the stipulation it was
agreed as to facts that the company
conducts no business within the
state of Oregon, except that it main-
tains an office in this state for its
secretary and holds formal meetings
of its board of directors in the state;
that the company does all of its
commercial transactions outside the
state and that its entire taxable in-
come from 1923 accrued from in-
vestments or commercial transac-
tions outside the state. It declared
dividends aggregating \$14,000 in
1923 no part of which was derived
from business in Oregon.

Arguments of counsel were brief
when the cause came on its merits
before the court today. Assistant
Attorney-General Liljeqvist contend-
ing that even if the section invali-
dated by the court in its order on the
demurrer was discriminatory, it was
not such a discrimination as is for-
bidden by the constitution of the
United States. He declared if the
court adhered to its decision he felt
it should be the duty of the court
to strike out the clause in question
altogether. This clause is a proviso
clause and it was admitted should it
be stricken from the act the effect
will be to put corporations back on
the list to pay the same progressive
income tax as is paid by individuals.

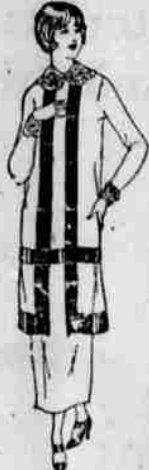
