MACEDONIAN OFFICIAL SUICIDES AS SACRIFICE

SOFIA, Bulgaria, April 17.—Choosing the American consulate as his place of sacrifice, Nikola Guenoff, a former high Macedonian official today committed suicide that his estate might go to the Macedonian cause. Guenoff had been desirous of turning over his entire fortune to the Macedonian organization but found he was unable to do so under the Bulgarian laws, unless he died on foreign soil. The estate of a person dying in Bulgaria without legal heirs is confiscated by the state.

The former official entered the consulate and asked a few questions, the answer to which confirmed his understanding of the law. Then shouting, "This is American soil," he drew a revolver and fired a shot into his brain.

Fifty thousand leva and \$4,000 in currency were found on his body together with a will leaving it all to the Macedonian cause.

OX-TEAM TOURISTS ARRIVE IN MEDFORD

MEDFORD, April 17.—Twenty-two hours ahead of their schedule, thanks to radio advice on road conditions, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Berrang, who left Westchester, Conn., in the ox-drawn covered wagon December 1st, 1920, arrived at the outskirts of Medford at nine o'clock this morning and were met by a delegation from the Medford chamber of commerce.

Their official entry into the place of their destination will be made at 1:30 this afternoon, when, accompanied by a band and large number of citizens, Mayor Gaddis will present the couple with the keys of the city.

Equipped with radio, Mr. Berrang learned while crossing the Siikiyu mountains that he could take a short cut and avoid the pavement into Medford, which brought him to this city nearly a day ahead of the schedule of approximately 1550 days for the transcontinental trip.

BUILT-IN TANKS BIG GARAGE AID

Among Other Advantages,
Provide Means of Lessening Fire Risk.

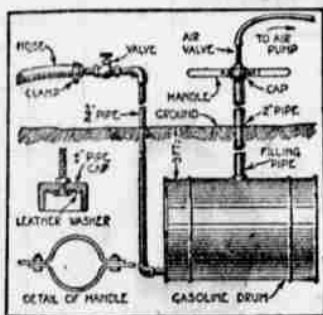
Nearly every owner of a car has looked with envious eyes at various kinds of gasoline storage tanks and wished he had the advantages they provide in the way of lessening fire risk, making possible the purchase of gasoline in quantity at lower cost, and furnishing a convenient method of filling the car while in the garage.

Very little now can be told about these tanks or the method of installing them, but it is possible to provide one for less expense than would be imagined. Any car owner can put in a tank at a cost of only a few dollars for material if he will give his own time in making the installation.

Inexpensive Materials.

The materials required are a 55-gallon oil tank, obtainable at a cost of about \$2; about five feet of 2-inch wrought iron pipe; approximately eight feet of three-quarters-inch iron pipe; one three-quarters-inch pipe nipple; one 2-inch pipe cap; one three-quarters-inch globe valve; two three-quarters-inch pipe elbows; four feet of flexible metal tubing, or fabric tubing, 1 inch inside diameter; and one air valve, such as is used with an inner tube.

A threading die for the three-quarters-inch pipe to cut the standard 14

threads an inch and a die to cut the 2-inch pipe with 14 standard threads are used in making the connections.

After fitting the pipe as shown and cementing the threads with pipe dope or shellac, install the tank three feet under ground at the left side of the entrance of the garage, if your car has a rear tank. For a car with a cowl tank, a location about six feet from the opposite end of the garage is more desirable.

Operated by Air.

The operation of the tank is by means of air, and merely involves the connecting of the air pump with the valve and the opening of the outlet valve. A fixed type of pump, with short barrel and lever, can be used to advantage not only as a gasoline pump, but also as a serviceable tire pump. Even if a new pump is purchased, the cost for materials should not be more than \$10.

This device makes it a simple matter to pump gasoline into the auto tank while cleaning or tuning up the car.—G. A. Luera in the Popular Science Monthly.

Change in Size of Tire Hurts Odometer Accuracy

One frequently hears the suggestion that a change of tire size makes a very serious difference in the accuracy of the speedometer, and more particularly of that shown by the odometer. As a matter of fact, there is a difference, but it amounts to very little when short distances are considered. For instance, a difference of half an inch in diameter in a 34-inch tire makes a difference in odometer reading of 80 feet to the mile. When a permanent change of tire size is made it is important to have the recording instrument adjusted to meet it.

Large Washer Helps in Transferring Oil

The tipping over of the funnel while filling the gasoline tank or pouring oil into engine bases through breather pipes results with loss of oil unless the funnel is held with one hand, in which instance the person pouring is under a handicap. A simple modification to the funnel consists in soldering a large washer over the spout. With the washer secured to the funnel it will rest upright on the gas tank opening or on the breather pipes, permitting the use of both hands for tipping the oil can.

Notched Rotor Is Used in Battery Ignition

In battery ignition systems there is usually employed a notched rotor against which presses the latch or trips per, with short springs attached. When this latch becomes worn the entire system will fail to operate properly, and it is a wise precaution to carry a spare latch in the tool box. It is not difficult to remove and replace this latch, which fits in but one way, so that there is no danger of placing it wrong.

Leaking water pipes may be temporarily repaired by binding around several layers of string well soaked in thick oil.

FARM NEWS

The tariff was originated as a sort of insurance against the competition of aliens—to raise their products to the price of our higher standard country, or to keep them out entirely. In a way it was a sort of "bonus" to the farmers and manufacturers of this country.

All the industries of our country, except agriculture, are prosperous, and all pay good wages. This condition is very largely due to unjust favoritism of the tariff duties. Manufactured articles are very largely protected, and what are not are protected by combination strength, while more than three and a quarter billions of dollars of agricultural products are brought in here to add to the "surplus" this country produces; to break down further the home prices of this surplus; to break down the wage scale of farmers; and to force thousands more off the farms.

If the protective tariff system is to prevail in this nation then it should be impartial and just, that all industries be on the same level and the dollar of the farmer be worth as much as the dollar of the manufacturer. If tariff schedules are to protect those who cannot compete with alien producers, then let these schedules be so adjusted that three and a quarter billions of dollars worth of European and Asiatic products shall not be dumped onto the farmers of a country who are already buried under deflation.

Deflation, foreign importations, high freight and express rates, mounting taxation and the middle interests are all against the farming industry, and the result is that it is forced to a different basis than the other business interests of the country. While other industries have protected themselves and boosted and maintained their prices in keeping with conditions, agriculture today pays 65 per cent more for what it is forced to buy than it did before the war. This condition forces an unequal exchange value for the farmer's dollar. His is a mighty dear dollar to get and a very cheap one to buy with.

Yet in the face of conditions that are daily forcing men from the farms, we import \$36,000,000 of dairy products. In the face of the desperate condition of the cattle-men we import \$5,663,000 of meats. In the face of the hazardous situation, we import \$24,000,000 of grains and grain preparations in one year.

The average annual income of the farm, according to statistics is now less than \$500 per year, and the \$500 is below par in the markets of the nation. It is not "calamity howling" to state these conditions, but rather to forestall future further calamity that is certain to result to other industries of our country if this unjust two-standard system continues. Any hard-headed business head will admit this will be the result.

Censored Radios.

All this discussion of the monopolization of radio passes lightly over one important element in the situation. Already we have a virtual censorship by all the broadcasting companies over the expression of opinion. For instance, some time ago W. J. Burns broadcasted a sweeping attack on those he was pleased to call radicals and reds, which contained many untruths. The American Telegraph & Telephone Company refused under any circumstances to allow a man of national reputation to broadcast a reply. This sort of thing tends to confirm the hold of powerful interests over the national mind. It adds the control of the spoken word to the control of the written word now exercised by a commercialized press.

The remedy for the general confusion in regard to the use of radio is likely to be government ownership and control of the telephone companies. Such means of communication no more than the Post Office ought to be left indefinitely in private hands, but even government control will not automatically remedy censorship of speech unless there is a public opinion which will demand freedom. Broadcasting ought no more to be censored by the government than are the mails. Secretary Hoover showed sound judgment when he declared: "We cannot allow any single person or group to place themselves in position where they can censor the material which shall be broadcast to the public, nor do I believe that the

government should ever be placed in the position of censoring this material."

How to Save

The Philippine Islands

The probability of the law, enacted in 1916 stated that as it has always been, the people of the United States withdraw their sovereignty from the Philippines and to recognize independence as soon as a government can be established. On December 8, 1920, President Taft said: "The people of the Philippines have succeeded in obtaining a stable government in accordance with the provisions of the act of the Congress in 1906 and have thus fulfilled the condition set by the Congress as a condition of granting independence to the islands."
