Churches of City Make Elabo-
rate Preparations for
Special Programs.

MUSIC IS OFFERED

Leading Choirs of the City to
Present Resurrection Theme
in Song—Fine Pro-
grams Announced.

The Easter time is one of the most
sacred of the year in Christian na-
tions, and to the many churches it is
a time when the resurrection story is
given new life and meaning through
attractive presentation. In Roseburg
this Easter period is to be observed
in practically every church by fitting
programs and ceremonies, and there
is no doubt but that the congrega-
tions will be swelled to many times

tend the various services.

Observance of this Christian holi-
day takes different form in each

on the one great theme of the Risen
Christ. The choirs have been work-

depict the story of the resurrection

HUMAN BLOODSTAINS ON TRAPPER'S SLED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
BEND, April 18.—That blood-
stains on a sled found in the Little
Lava Lake region where three
trappers disappeared were of hu-
man blood was declared by Dr. Geo.
Vandeventer, who completed tests to-
day.

Belief that the trappers, Dewey
Morris, Ed Nichols, and Roy Wil-
son did not leave their cabin for
some other part of their trap line
is based on the fact that the men's
overcoats, caps, jackets, and three
rifles, two shotguns, most of their
traps and one revolver were found
in the cabin. If the three men were
killed, officials believe the bodies
were sunk in Little Lava Lake, said
to be too deep to drag successfully.

In January a man passed through
La Pine on horseback and inquired
for trapping grounds in the Cas-
cades. Tracks believed to be those
of a horse were found near the Lit-
tle Lava Lake cabin.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 18.—
Commenting on press reports stat-
ing that hundreds of auto tourists

Wallace of the Federal department
of agriculture issued a statement
here today declaring Arizona's ac-
tion to be an "extraordinary extreme
measure."
