THAW CASE ADJOURNS UNTIL NEXT MONDAY

PHILADELPHIA, April 18.—The trial to determine the sanity of Harry K. Thaw having been adjourned until Monday, lawyers on both sides of the case are devoting their time to strengthening their positions for the final moves in the proceedings. Thaw who was on the witness stand yesterday for a brief period was back in the Pennsylvania hospital for mental and nervous diseases. In West Philadelphia today, but may ask permission to visit his mother, who is staying at a hotel. Mrs. Thaw, who is 82 years of age, is standing the strain of the trial very well, members of her party said. Whether she will take the stand in behalf of her son, will, it is said, depend upon further developments. She is prepared to testify against her former husband in behalf of her son, Russell William Thaw who, she claims, has an anticipatory interest in Thaw's estate.

COUNTY PRIZES FOR BEST ESSAYS

Local Post of American Legion Augments Awards Offered by State.

RULES ARE ANNOUNCED

County Chairman Sends Letters to All of High School Principals Throughout the County.

Considerable interest is being shown in the essay contest arranged by the American Legion, Department of Oregon. Liberal prizes are offered by the state for the best essay on the subject of "Pacetime Patriotism," and Umpqua post has authorized the Americanization committee, which is conducting the contest in the county to distribute \$30 additional to winners in the county, regardless of whether or not these essays win state prizes.

Attorney Carl Wimberly, chairman of the committee, has sent out the following letter, which explains the contest in detail, to every high school principal in the county:

Dear Sir:

Some time ago I sent to you, through County School Superintendent Brown, the rules and regulations for the essay contest now being conducted by The American Legion, Department of Oregon. There are three prizes offered by the State Department of the essay is "Pacetime Patriotism."

There are three prizes offered by the State Department as follows:

First prize, \$200.00; second prize, \$100.00; third prize, \$50.00. At its last meeting the Local Post authorized me to offer county prizes as follows: First prize, \$15.00; second prize, \$10.00; third prize, \$5.00.

The rules provide that each essay shall be from four hundred to six hundred words in length, written on one side of the paper only, leaving a margin of one inch on each side of the paper. The subject matter, spelling, penmanship, neatness and age of the contestant will be considered in judging the essays. All essays must be completed and delivered to the teacher of the grade where the contestant is enrolled by May 1st, 1924. They will be submitted to the principal of the high school on or before May 10th, 1924.

The principal of each high school receiving such essays is required to forward them to the County Board of Judges, through me, on or before June 1st, 1924. They will then be passed upon by the County Board, who will award the county prizes and forward the best essay submitted to the Chairman of the State Department. The State Department will make the awards of the state prizes not later than August 1st, 1924.

All students enrolled in the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades of the public schools of Oregon are eligible to enter the contest.

At the end of each essay the following pledge must be written: "I hereby pledge my word of honor that I have written this essay myself I am _____ years of age."

DROP IN FOOD PRICES IN MARCH

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Wholesale and retail food prices dropped in March as compared with February. Department of labor figures made public today, showed the index for wholesale prices of 401 commodities was 150 for March against 152 for February.

A four per cent drop in farm products prices as a whole for March from the preceding month was attributed to declines in cotton, cottonseed, eggs, hides, wheat, oats, rye, potatoes and tobacco. The labor department report also dis-

Retail food price statistics made public by the department of commerce showed an average decline of two per cent for the month, due largely to the drop in egg quotations.

Decreases were given as follows: Eggs 20 per cent; butter four per cent; sirloin steak, rib roast, chuck roast, pork chops, canned corn, and sugar each one per cent.

The average family expenditures for food dropped four per cent from February 15 to March 15 in New York, three per cent in Boston, Cleveland, Detroit, Memphis, Philadelphia, Denver, Kansas City, and St. Louis, and one per cent in Dallas, Houston, San Francisco and Seattle.

NEW ORLEANS, April 18.—The injured in the severe wind and hail storm which swept over sections of the city last night wrecking a score of residences and damaging others, had increased to 50 early today.
