FOREST PROTECTION.

People living in highly populous regions or sections where there is little woodland, may say they are not interested in forest protection, hence have not been concerned about Forest Protection Week, observed April 20-26. Yet it is a subject that closely affects the daily life of the whole American people. When people build a house and have to use any wooden material, they are forced to pay a higher price than would be necessary if the forests of this country had been carefully and scientifically conserved.

Also people who live in rented houses commonly pay higher rents on account of the increased cost of building and repairs that has come about through the depletion of the supply of wooden materials.

The campaign for preservation of the forests is to some extent like locking the stable door after the horse is stolen. Still in spite of deplorable waste, there are many forests left, though they are still being depleted rapidly. The remainder of these resources must be husbanded with jealous care.

The average citizen can help on the cause of forest protection in several ways.

1.—He can help form public sentiment in favor of scientific forestry and conservation. If he writes for the newspapers or if he talks in public gatherings, let him not forget to mention forest protection as one of the big national issues.

2.—When he goes into forest lands on automobile trips, camping or fishing parties, etc., let him observe the most scrupulous care about camp fires, matches, cigar ends, etc. Treat those forests as if they were his own property.

3.—He can support movements in his own locality for setting out forest trees. The movement for town forests in this country is rapidly spreading and almost every community ought to be setting aside lands for tree planting purposes.

The country extends its best wishes to the players of the major and minor baseball leagues which are beginning their season's work. They are exponents of a form of sport and skill which the country greatly admires. On the side of ambition and effort to win, it would be hard to improve their work. If the average man put as much energy and thought into his daily work as most of these ball players put into the effort to improve their play and think out winning combinations, American industry would go ahead fast. There is something in the American temperament that loves a winner and hates a quitter. American physical and mental energy gets a splendid demonstration on its professional ball fields. Now if these splendid specimens of physical manhood will maintain standards of clean play and gentlemanly conduct on the same high plane, these baseball fields will be a center of splendid influence over the boys that are coming along, who look to the ball players as their greatest heroes.

To get an attractive town, you must have well kept homes. The first thing to be done about many homes is to attend to simple jobs of repairs that have been allowed to go neglected. It is astonishing how much injury to the appearance of a place some little condition of disrepair will produce. A fence with a few posts missing, or one which leans over to one side, conveys a suggestion of deterioration. Just straighten up and repair the gaps in that fence, and you have improved your place much as a good drill master improves a company of slouching soldiers. Tumble-down sheds, chicken coops, etc., ruin the appearance of many homes. The removal of such a decrepit structure would add more to the value of many places than the cost of a new one to take its place. The first step toward brightening up the home town is more hammer and nail work in the back yards.

High school students should have eight hours sleep, says a report issued from a Parent-Teachers association of Ann Arbor, Michigan. It urges parents to limit the number of organizations to which their young folks belong, and insist that entertainments of the school organizations come Friday or Saturday nights, so as not to interfere with home study. Young America, however, expects to lead a full social life nowadays. They are not always satisfied to settle down under the evening lamp five nights a week. But the boys should be reminded that late hours and good athletic work do not go together. Also it can be suggested to the girls, that abundant sleep and beauty are closely related to each other.

Two more trains have been cancelled on the Southern Pacific lines. Traveling by train fails to furnish the necessary thrills demanded by the public in this day and age. FRENCH DISTURBED
BY ENGLISH ATTITUDE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PARIS, April 19.—French official circles are considerably disturbed by the attitude of the British press toward the proposed reparations settlement. It is deduced from the general run of the British comment that Premier MacDonald will refuse to agree with France on a system of pledges to be taken in case Germany defaults in the execution of the experts' plan.

"Without an agreement in advance on the ways and means of obliging the Germans to carry out the terms of the arrangement," said a spokesman for the foreign office today, "Germany would be the only country sure of getting any benefit from the experts' project."

There was no use he added of France the most interested creditor of Germany, to give up a sure thing, no matter how small, for so uncertain an eventuality as Germany's paying reparations without being obliged to do so.

The French government it was explained is heartily in favor of the experts' plan, although it realizes that all the initial benefit is for Germany.

REVOLUTION QUELLED

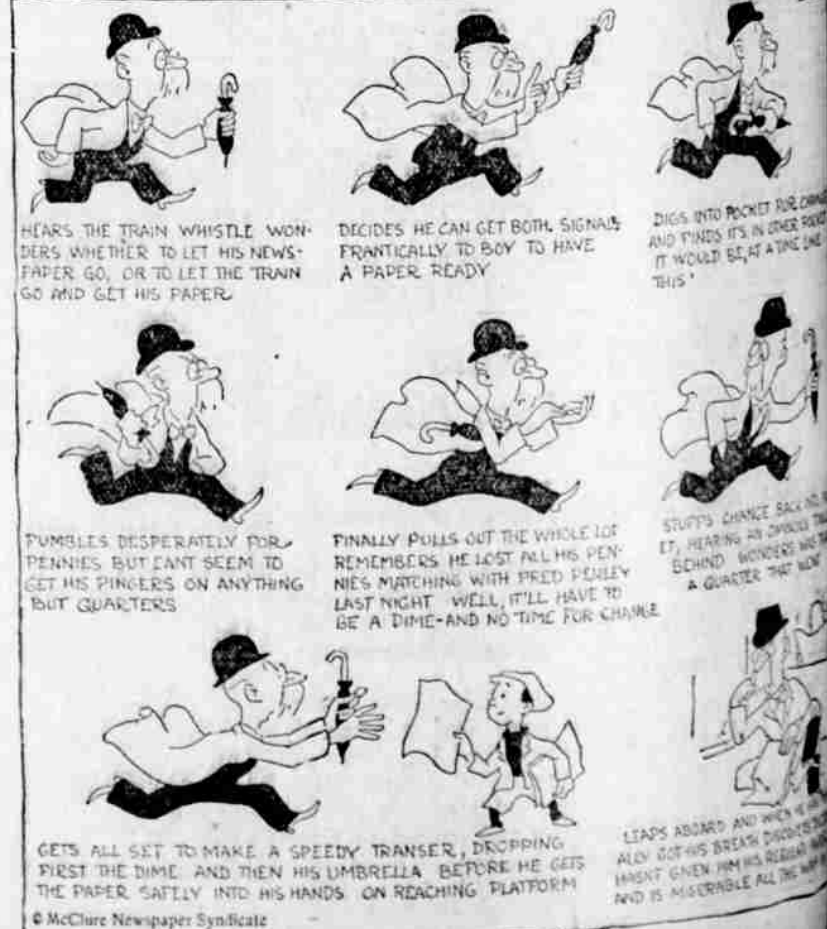
