BEST WEEK FOR DODGE BROTHERS

Deliveries to Buyers Exceed All Records; First Quarter of 1924

Air Sets New Mark.

Sales Have Shown Steady Increase From Time Production of New Types of Cars Reached Large Proportions.

Dodge Brothers have again established a new record for retail deliveries.

During the week ending April 5th, 5,694 cars were placed in the hands of buyers by Dodge Brothers dealers. This exceeded the best previous week's deliveries by more than 100 cars. The former record was made the week of May 7th, 1923.

In making these figures public, Dodge Brothers emphasize the fact that they represent actual retail deliveries to users, not factory production. 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## GOVERNMENT TO SELL TIMBER
