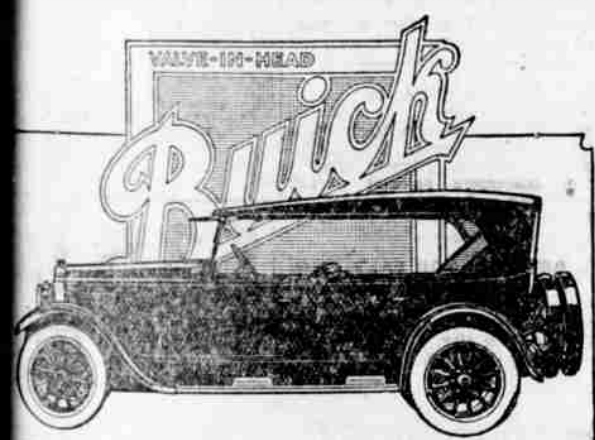

King's Valley postoffice, was about \$200 in merchandise and money, \$20 of which was in stamps and money taken from the postoffice. Two men participated in the robbery, and the authorities are today seeking the second man.

When Ward was arrested in the home of his wife in Milwaukee the officers found several pair of new shoes, some of them being worn by his children.

Mr. Graham this morning positively identified the shoes as some of those stolen from his store and Sheriff Orr believes that further search of the Ward home will reveal others of the stolen articles.

Ward was arrested by Sheriff Orr on a charge of having killed some calves belonging to S. B. Barker, a farmer living in Spring valley in Polk county. At the time of his arrest a slaughtered veal was found in his home and Sheriff Orr says that it had since been determined that the meat was from an animal stolen in Clackamas county.

Ward is now wanted by the postal authorities and local officers in Polk, Marion, Benton and Clackamas counties.

Ward served 18 months in the penitentiary on a charge of manslaughter for killing the city marshal at Sweethome. He escaped from the prison once and was found in hiding in a house near Shaw.
