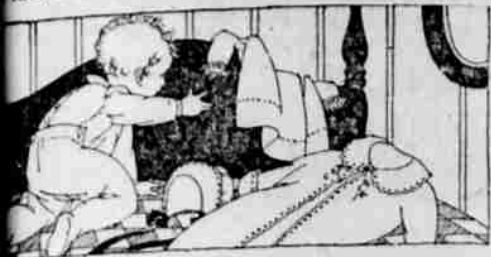

DENIES CHARGES AGAINST HAMON

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

TULSA, Okla., April 22.—Frederick
L. Thornton, certified public account-
ant, who made an audit of the estate
of the late Jake L. Hamon, republic-
an national committeeman from
Oklahoma before and after his death,
denied last night that Hamon contrib-
uted \$1,000,000 toward the nomination
of Warren G. Harding. He said Ham-
on's campaign contributions in 1920
did not exceed \$100,000.

Thornton left last night for Wash-
ington in response to a request from
the senate public lands committee to
appear before it and tell what he
knows regarding the "business and
political ventures of Hamon."

TRANSIENT KILLED IN BOARDING TRAIN

PENDLETON, April 22.—A man
whose name is thought to be Ban
Shea, a transient, was killed here yes-
terday afternoon about 4 o'clock when
he attempted to board a freight train
east of town. The man fell across the
rails under the car wheels and was cut
in two. A coroner's inquest will be
held this morning and attempt will be
made to locate relatives.

RECLAMATION LAW CHANGE PROPOSED

WASHINGTON, April 22.—A bill de-
signed to relieve distress among
farmers on reclamation projects in
the west along lines recommended by
the special advisory commission which
investigated conditions was introduced
by Chairman Smith of the house
irrigation committee. Sweeping
changes in the reclamation law are
proposed.

RIVALRY KEEN FOR CHAIRMAN'S POST

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, April 22.—Rivalry for
the post of temporary chairman and
keynote spokesman for the national
democratic convention has become so
keen that the subcommittee on con-
vention arrangements meeting today
to name the man was reported to have
decided to postpone action until a
later date.

Cordell Hull, chairman of the na-
tional committee, declared the prob-
ability of a delay in the choice arose
from the fact that only seven states
had held democratic primaries, so that
the political situation for the party,
considered nationally, still was unde-
fined. There were reports, however,
of an attempt by Norman E. Mack of
Buffalo, to persuade the subcommit-
tee to name the convention tempo-
rary chairman later today.

The name of Senator Walsh of Mon-
tana, today was added to the list of
possible appointees for temporary
chairman. Up to now the most promi-
nently mentioned in this connection
have been Representative Garrett of
Tennessee, Arthur Harrison of Mis-
sissippi, Homer B. Cummings of Con-
necticut, Thomas R. Marshall, former
vice-president and Senator Robinson
of Arkansas.

FORMER CONGRESSMAN DIES VERY SUDDENLY

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 22.—J.
Sloot Hasset, 50 Elmira, N. Y., former
congressman of the United States,
died here last night soon after coming
ashore from the steamship Empress
of Russia following a visit to the far
east. He became ill soon after land-
ing here.

PRINCE OF WALES BACK IN ENGLAND

LONDON, April 22.—Fully recover-
ed from his steeple chasing accident
and looking well and hearty, the
Prince of Wales returned to England
last evening, crossing from France
to Folkestone as one of a crowd of
holiday makers on the regular channel
boat.

was given a rousing cheer when he
left the boat and entered the train.

East African Elephant Herds Growing Larger

The elephant is a very useful ani-
mal both for draft purposes and for
ivory. A few years ago 70,000 were
slaughtered annually for their tusks,
so that it seemed as though there was
a good chance of the big animal's be-
coming extinct. Wise laws, however,
have checked the destruction so that
the number is increasing. The war
gave the elephants their chance and
the British authorities in East Africa
have also protected them. South of
Zambesi the elephant is virtually ex-
tinct and the Cape market for ivory
has ceased to exist.

At present Mozambique is the cen-
ter of the ivory trade. Oddly enough,
the Portuguese, through whose hands
it comes, send nearly all the ivory
across to Bombay, where it is sorted
and cut and dispatched to the Eu-
ropean markets. The world's supply
of real elephant ivory is now about 250
tons a year.—Scientific American.

Report Was Erroneous

A caller at the New York city
 morgue the other day asked to see the
body of a man found in the Harlem
river. "It's not me," he said to the
mortician in charge, as reported in a
daily paper. "What do you mean?"
the official asked. "I mean," was the
answer, "that the report that my body
was found in the river is an error. My
acquaintances have been running away
from me for a week thinking I'm my
own ghost." It seems that the body
was that of a friend of the caller, and
the latter's name written on papers
found in the dead man's pockets re-
sulted in the mixup.

toes until he left the community. The
burglar sang as he entered the apart-
ment of the assistant city treasurer,
and the mistress, thinking he was a

didn't fit, and then entered another
apartment on the next floor, singing
all the while and when he had finished
his job left just as leisurely.
