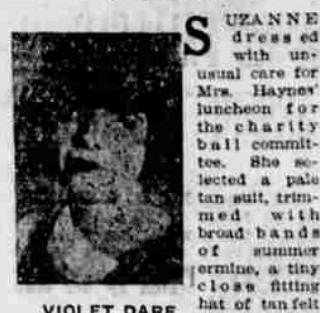

CITY COUNCIL HEARS ROUTINE MATTERS

The city council engaged in a lengthy session last night, transacting a great deal of important business.

A written protest was received from R. A. McCalley, a resident of South Mill street, who says that he has five telephone and light wire poles in front of his 60 foot lot. He says he would like to improve his lawn and parking, but with this array of poles and several guy wires he cannot make any improvement. The street committee was instructed to make an investigation.

J. V. Casey petitioned the council to divide the assessment on a lot in Laurewood Addition, and the engineer was instructed to make the desired change.

An invitation was received from the New Astoria committee, inviting the Roseburg council and citizens of the city to a celebration to be held on July 3, 4 and 5, marking the rebuilding of the city of Astoria.

A message was read from Mayor Gaddis of Medford, asking Roseburg to use her influence in persuading the state highway commission to send a man to Washington, D. C., to get Oregon's share of the surplus road machinery which the government has left over from its war supplies.

It was reported that the paving of Block 51 and North Pine street have been committed and that the contractor is entitled to final payments.

A remonstrance against the Flint street sewer assessment was over-ruled and the ordinance levying the assessment adopted.

A contract for the construction of a sewer in Laurewood was let to J. V. Casey for \$3,341.70.

The plans and specifications for the improvement of Chapman street at the approximate cost of \$4,517.38, and Madrone Avenue at an approximate cost of \$6,729.37, were adopted.

The recorder was instructed to give notice of intention to pave Commercial street between Jackson and West First.

Mayor Rice was instructed to employ a man to cut weeds and grass on vacant lots and to assess the cost in the form of liens against the property.

TRAFFIC VIOLATORS IN JUSTICE COURT

Russell Malcolm was fined \$25 and costs and his license taken up for a period of sixty days when he entered a plea of guilty in the justice court this morning to a charge of speeding.

The speeder was appearing for a second time to a speeding charge and has answered guilty both times. He was apprehended this time when following the fire truck to the fire on Winchester street and was severely reprimanded by Justice Jones, who emphasized that this practice was becoming dangerous and that it would be dealt with in a severe manner hereafter. E. E. Leas of Sutherland also appeared in the court and answered a complaint filed against Ralph Stearns charging the improper use of a dealer's license. He stood trial, but was convicted of the charge and paid a fine of \$10 and costs.

TULIP BALL IS DECIDED SUCCESS

A large crowd of dancers gathered at the Armory last night to dance to the strains of the Legion Blue Devils orchestra, and to enjoy the entertainment provided by the Legion Auxiliary. The Tulip Ball was a pronounced success, and the auxiliary realized a fair sized sum to add to their fund for the care of ex-soldiers and their families. The card rooms upstairs were filled with card players and the dance floor was crowded until a late hour. The armory was prettily decorated with tulips, greenery and artistic refreshment booths were placed in each corner.
