OPEN SEASON FOR DEER NOT PLEASING.

Much complaint is being made in reference to the recent change in the deer season. Especially is this the case with the majority of farmers throughout this county. They say that the open season, as now proposed, will eliminate a big majority of them from participating in the annual sport of hunting deer owing to the fact that it comes at a time which is the busiest period of the season for the farmers, September 10 to October 31. This is practically the midst of the prune season when everyone is busy, besides there are other important crops coming on at this time which requires the attention of the farmer and fruit grower. They do not object to the shortening of the season, but do think a mistake has been made in setting the date so late in the season. Many persons would much prefer that the season be from August 15 to September 15, instead of September 10 to October 31, as has now been declared by state game officials. The running season for bucks in this county has been known to occur, many hunters state, before the close of the season which is October 31, making their meat useless, whereas if the season was opened in August and closed during the month of September it would not only be better protection for the deer in this county, but would also give the rural hunters better service. Douglas county is the best game county in the state. It should be properly protected in the most intelligent way, but many hunters are of the opinion that the law as recently set down by the game commission does not provide as good protection as the old schedule for open season. They claim that when the running season for bucks is on that the animals are easy prey for hunters, as the deer are moving about more rapidly in the woods and are less alarmed at the presence of hunters, thus affording their slaughter in greater numbers.

Those who are conversant with game conditions in this county think a mistake has been made in setting the open season from September 10 to October 31.

ENTERS INTO A REAL BUSINESS PROPOSITION.

The Student Body Association of the Roseburg High school yesterday took favorable action looking toward the purchase of 17 acres of land in West Roseburg, which comprises the Laurelwood grove, the athletic field and a part of the Bellows tract. It is going to be the plan of the student body to purchase the entire tract, using it for athletic purposes. The venture is a most commendable one and shows a genuine, business-like program that is sure to redound to the good of the schools of this city. Instead of spending their surplus money in various channels that does not bring about any permanent results, as has been the method in the past, these progressive students, some 400 strong, are going to enter into a contract to purchase this fine tract of land. They have inaugurated a movement that will stand forever as a monument to their excellent business judgment and will be carried down through the years to come as a fine example of a well organized and public spirited set of boys and girls who had a vision of the future and were willing to forego many pleasures that the student body might lay a foundation of great importance to those who will follow in their present school work. The plan is an ideal one. It is worthy of the fullest support of the people of Roseburg. Boys and girls should be encouraged in ventures of this kind. It is a fine training for their future to assume some real responsibility. It places a responsibility upon them that will train them for fine examples of real, progressive business men and women of the future. Their task is not a big one, with full cooperation at hand from every individual student, but it will mean much to the schools of this city when once carried out. It is the first concrete step taken by any body of public school pupils in the state for a real constructive program of such magnitude. The Student Body Association is certainly to be commended for their decision in the matter at hand.

Secretary Hoover has called a conference of representatives of eight associations connected with automobile, insurance, and other business interests, to see if something can not be done on a ration wide scale to reduce the number of highway accidents. Strict examination of applicants for automobile licenses reduces the number of daredevils somewhat, but the most reckless driver may be able to show excellent skill when his driving abilities are being tested. What is needed is such strict enforcement that speeders will be removed from the roads for periods sufficient to cultivate their caution.

TOURISTS TURN FROM ARIZONA

Likelihood of Second Attempt to Rush Past Blockade Is Remote.

ARE STRUCK BY STORM

Terrific Wind and Sand Storm Strikes Party of Tourists Held at Knob Siding—Four New Cases.

YUMA, Arizona, April 23.—Likelihood of a recurrence of the situation which arose last week when several hundred frantic motorists stormed the California-Arizona state line bridge here in defiance of Governor Hunt's foot and mouth embargo appeared remote today as the new cavalcade of eastbound tourists which last Sunday began forming at Knob Siding, 14 miles west of here, showed signs of weakening.
Yesterday and last night the determined caravan of 14 motor parties demanding fumigation and admission to Arizona melted away under the blistering sun to an uncomfortable group of a half a dozen. These bitter-enders were visited by Dr. E. L. Stam, Arizona quarantine supervisor, who announced on his return here that he had persuaded them to abandon the idea of motoring through Arizona. They planned to turn back toward the coast today, he said.

YUMA, Arizona, April 23.—The occupants of seven cars, held at Knob Siding in the desert west of here, by Arizona's foot and mouth quarantine, shivered and shook last night through the worst wind and sand storm of the season. This morning the storm was still raging.
Dr. E. L. Stam, Arizona quarantine officer, is expecting orders hourly to set up a quarantine station at the Arizona end of the bridge.

MERCED, April 23.—Four new cases of foot and mouth disease were reported in this area last night.

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 23.—All raw fruits and vegetables with the exception of citrus fruits from the counties in California infected with the foot and mouth epidemic, will be prohibited entrance into this state, under one of the provisions of a revised quarantine order to be issued shortly by the state department of agriculture, director E. L. French announced today. Products from uninfected counties may still be admitted after fumigation and it is inspected.

SACRAMENTO, April 23.—Governor Richardson today cleared away all doubt concerning his attitude toward federal intervention in the foot and mouth disease situation in California by a telegram to Henry C. Wallace, secretary of agriculture, requesting his department to assume full control.

FINISH ARGUMENT IN CANNERY CASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, April 23.—Oral arguments were concluded today in the court of appeals in the case brought by the California Cooperative canneries to have set aside the consent decree under which the packers agreed to confine their activities exclusively to the meat packing industry.

Armour and company and Swift and company, during the oral presentation, joined with the canneries in contending that the decree was invalid and should be set aside. They took the position that although they had joined in signing it and Swift and company had complied with its terms, the decree was void and could not be enforced. The two packing concerns insisted that the decree would prevent them from continuing in lawful lines of business and denied that the conditions which it sought to change were illegal.

The National Wholesale Grocers Association of the United States and the American Wholesale Grocers Association joined the government in urging that the terms of the consent decree be enforced.

COMMITTEE HEARS HINTS OF LETTER IN MEXICO SOON

WASHINGTON, April 23.—A hint of a mysterious letter about land permits said to have been written by Solicitor Booth of the interior department to Senator Wheeler's Montana law firm, was heard today on one count and not guilty on 14 other counts of an indictment charging misuse of the mails.
W. T. Earnest, W. S. Atkins and George White, co-defendants, were found not guilty on all counts.

Senator Sterling of South Dakota, a republican member of the committee said he had been told of such a letter and expected to produce it before the investigation was ended. He declined to reveal the source of his information or say who prepared a memorandum with the aid of Beaulieu, a western attorney, who said he also had "heard of such a letter."

Beaulieu, the only witness at today's hearing, testified he had been chief of counsel for Gordon Campbell, the Montana oil man indicted with Senator Wheeler, but never heard of the senator's acting for Campbell in the land cases. On the contrary, he said, Wheeler had told him he declined specifically to have anything to do with any of Campbell's litigation except in the Montana state courts.

CONVENTION ON IN LITTLE ROCK

LITTLE ROCK, April 23.—The democratic central committee met here today to select the state's delegation to the national convention and to determine whether the delegation will be governed by the unit rule in voting for the presidential and vice-presidential nominees. It appeared certain today the Arkansas delegation would be instructed to support Senator Joseph T. Robinson for president. The committee was scheduled to take action in regard to the status of the farmer-labor league in the state political organization which has designated itself as the "progressive wing" of the democratic party in Arkansas.

TILDEN REFUSES TO PLAY FOR U. S.

NEW YORK, April 23.—William T. Tilden, national tennis champion, who resigned from the Davis Cup and Olympic committee of the tennis association, which he alleged, referred to him as an "evil influence" because of his writings, has been invited to meet with the Davis cup committee Friday "to talk things over."

In a letter Julian C. Myrick, chairman of the Davis cup committee expressed surprise at the possibility that an American tennis champion would refuse to represent his country in international competition when called upon.

"You have been invited to play for your country as an American champion and it never crossed the minds of the committee that you would refuse or even hesitate," the letter reads. "You are eligible to represent this country in the contests mentioned."

PHILADELPHIA, April 23.—William T. Tilden, national tennis champion, today declined the invitation of Julian C. Myrick, chairman of the American Davis cup committee to discuss his recent resignation from the Davis cup and Olympic teams at a conference in New York on Friday.

Mr. Tilden stated that he had a previous engagement to play in exhibition games in the south.

Calling attention to the dispute over his status as an amateur because of his activity in writing articles on tennis, Mr. Tilden stated that he would not have offered his services for this year to the executive committee of the United States Lawn Tennis Association had he been aware of the technical wording of the rule on amateurs adopted March 15, 1924 by the Amateur Rule committee of that body.

PEACE EXPECTED IN MEXICO SOON

MEXICO CITY, April 23.—The recent succession of victories by the government troops and surrenders by rebel leaders have advanced the situation so that full peace in the republic is possible within two or three weeks according to General Serrano, secretary of war.
Only a few rebel bands remain scattered over the country, all lacking the proper materials for warfare and the majority of their chieftains have applied for amnesty, he declared.

PAINT-UP WEEK TO START ON MAY 5

At a meeting of the city beautiful commission held last night at the city hall, it was decided to set aside the week of May 5, as "Paint-Up Week," and during that time an effort will be made to encourage the property owners of the city to improve their buildings by painting. A particular effort will be made to improve the look of the business district and the homes along the highway, by having store fronts painted, hydrants and posts painted, and other improvement work done.

The city is preparing to cooperate in the movement by painting the city hall and all of its buildings. The entrance to the city hall has already been improved and presents a much better appearance than formerly. The Knights of Pythias lodge made a complaint regarding the appearance of property surrounding their building. Property across the street and at the old Empire barn was mentioned and the commission will endeavor to have these lots cleaned up. The commission received the reports of the various committees. Steps will be taken to obtain information on tree planting, and it is hoped that a large number of new shade trees will be set out during the coming fall and winter.

It is planned to improve the appearance of the highway by planting climber roses over the banks at the north approach to the city, and along the walls of the cut south of town.
