SMALL STILL FOUND NEAR RAY HOMESTEAD

A small still was discovered near Glendale and brought to Roseburg today by Deputy Sheriff Branham, which is believed to belong to Chas. Ray. No formal charge had been filed against Ray up to three o'clock today, but officers in charge of the case alleged that there is little doubt but the still belongs to the man. There were no evidences that the still had been in use within a few days, as it was entirely empty. Ray was, however, charged with assault and battery on two counts, and held for appearance under \$50 bail for each charge. The suspected man lives near Glendale, and is probably 55 or 60 years of age.

MPS NEARLY HALT CASE SECOND TIME

ATLANTA, April 23.—Mumps, some weeks ago caused postponement of the trial of J. H. Overmire, appraiser of the state commission of Bend, when he became afflicted with the disease on the eve of the opening trial, came near ending a second postponement today when it was learned that H. H. Dearmond, one of the defense attorneys, was ill of the trouble. Federal Judge Overmire, refused to allow a continuance on that account and examination of witnesses was resumed. Overmire and Charles Ryan, Charles H. and Charles Haines, Bend state dealers, are charged with the mumps to defraud in connection with alleged false appraisal property offered for bonus.

WOMEN PRESENT HUGE PETITION

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Comprising 12 great rolls, the petition of 35,000 Iowa women for American entry into the world court was presented today to Chairman Lodge of the senate foreign relations committee by Mrs. P. J. Mills of the Iowa federation of Women's clubs. Mrs. Mills told Senator Lodge that state viewed with dismay the long delay of the proposal in the committee.

BELGIUM ACCEPTS EXPERTS' REPORT

BRUSSELS, April 23.—Belgium's reply to the reparation commission's

communication with regard to the expert's reports is a full and complete acceptance of the report, according to the semi-official Independence Belge. The newspaper adds that Premier Poincaré and Premier Thoms and Paul Hymans, head of the Belgian representation on the commission, will meet soon to discuss the reparations question.

BURSUM PENSION BILL IS PASSED

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Proponents of the Bursum bill increasing pensions for Civil war and Spanish American war veterans, having won their fight in congress, carried their contest today to the White House where the bill awaits action by President Coolidge. National officers of the grand army of the republic and Spanish war veterans, called at the White House to ask the president to sign the bill. Mr. Coolidge did not commit himself.

All of the tables and linen, silver and appointments of Y Not Eat dining room are practically new, having been purchased from wholesalers when the place was opened a few months ago, and Mr. Warner will make such improvements and additions as are necessary for maintaining a first class grill.
