GREAT BRITISH EXHIBIT OPENED

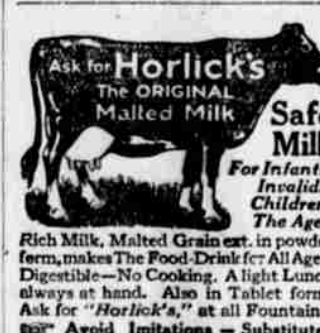
WEMBLEY, April 23.—The British empire exhibition covering 220 acres and including displays from every part of the British commonwealth, was opened today by King George, to continue until September as the mecca of thousands from overseas as well as the millions of the United Kingdom.

The exhibition was formally turned over to the King by the Prince of Wales as president at a colorful ceremony in the huge athletic stadium, starred with all the pagantry which surrounds the public activities of British royalty. The address of the king and the prince, picked up by radio, were heard by more persons than have ever before listened at one time to the words of a British sovereign and his heir apparent.

Hundreds of thousands throughout the British Isles heard their ruler's voice for the first time. In London loud speakers had been set up in the public squares.

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CULVER'S STORE BURGLARIZED

Guns and Cash Taken and Cash Register Wrecked in Robbery Last Night.

ENTERED THE SKYLIGHT

Robbers Evidently Let Themselves Down Through Top of the Building by Means of Rope.

Some time late last night, probably later than midnight, the Culver store on Jackson street was entered and robbed. Besides damaging the cash register and destroying valuable papers the robbers took small change amounting over eight dollars and two automatic pistols valued at over fifty dollars.

The entrance was made to the store through the skylight. The robber, or robbers, removed one panel of the glass from the skylight after gaining the roof from the rear of the building, and let themselves down through the main part of the building by means of a rope which was found this morning on the roof. Both the front and rear doors of the building were untouched after the robbery the glass was replaced.

Securing a small axe from one of the cases, the robbers evidently removed the cash register from the top of the safe and placed it upon the floor behind a counter where they proceeded to break open the side of the till which was locked and in which the small change was kept. They also opened the safe and removed all the papers in it, scattering them about upon the floor. The safe is an old one and is not kept locked and no valuables, outside of papers, are kept in it. Finger prints of the robber showed plainly on the door and are being preserved for a fingerprint expert. A very risky chance was taken when the culprits removed a small container of dynamite caps which were kept in the safe. These caps are very explosive and must be handled carefully in order to avoid an explosion, one of them having enough power to blow off a hand or otherwise injure a person severely. The explosion of the whole box would have done considerable damage to the store besides probably fatally injuring the robbers.

The two guns, one a \$2.20 Colts automatic and the other a 30 Luger, were taken from the display case in the front window of the store, which is immediately in view of the street. They are very expensive guns and the burglars showed exceptional taste for firearms in picking them out. They also probably took ammunition for them from the case near the counter. Officers are not determined whether or not to place the blame for the crime upon local "talent" or not. Some are led to believe that some person or persons in Roseburg are operating in the city, three business houses having been broken into during the past two weeks. Grimm's Bakery on Sheridan and Cleo Brenner's confectionary have both been robbed of small amounts this month and the officers are casting their suspicions on some Roseburg culprit.

THIRTY KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK

BERNE, Switzerland, April 23.—Thirty persons are reported to have been killed and 50 injured when the Zurich and Milan Expresses collided near Bollinzona this morning. Twenty one bodies have been removed from the wreckage, most of them so badly burned that identification was impossible.
