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CHEMISTS HEAR COOLIDGE TALK

Says Government Owes Debt to Scientists and Chemists of United States.

PROBLEMS ARE SOLVED

Speaker Says Helium Gas Is Most Valuable Asset to Future of Commercial Aviation in U. S.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—President Coolidge, speaking at the White House today to members of the American Chemical Society, declared the government fittingly "should acknowledge the debt that is due to the scientists and chemists who are devoting their lives to the search for truth."

"Yours is the profession of opportunity," the president told the chemists, who he greeted from the south portico of the White House. "Many problems are still unsolved. If the future can be gauged by the measure of progress in the past, your contributions to the health, wealth and happiness of the world will be of surpassing value to the American people. Our material progress demands upon the acquisition of knowledge and upon the wise and beneficial use of knowledge depends our permanent progress and prosperity."

"Modern life has been extremely complicated. We are enjoying comforts and advantages undreamed of a generation ago. These have come through the knowledge and work of the chemical profession. Industry is learning to apply the knowledge of the chemist in its processes. Each step by which the products of the soil, the forest and the air are converted into commodities of every day life requires the expert assistance of the chemist and the chemical engineer. Whenever nature's bounty is in danger of exhaustion the chemist has sought for a substitute. The conquest of disease has made progress as a result of your efforts. Wherever we look the work of the chemist has raised the level of our civilization and has increased the productive capacity of the nation. Waste materials, formerly cast aside, are now being utilized."

WASHINGTON, April 25.—The value of helium in future commercial aviation as well as for use in the lighter than air war craft was outlined to the Petroleum Chemistry division of the American Chemical Society today by Dr. Richard B. Moore of New York. Declaring the Diknude, Zr-2 and Roma disasters would not have occurred had helium instead of hydrogen been used to lift them, Dr. Moore described recent developments in the production and recovery of this non-inflammable gas, and pointing out that the United States controls practically all of the known supply, he spoke vigorously against any proposal for its exportation.

BREWERIES ALLOWED TO MAKE BEER SAYS LETTER TO MELLON

(Associated Press Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 24.—A letter sent to Secretary of the Treasury Mellon charging that under Attorney-General Daugherty's brewery laws were permitted to make real beer, was made public today by Orville S. Pollard, counsel for the anti-saloon league of New York.

Mr. Pollard's letter requested Mr. Mellon to obtain a ruling from Attorney-General Stone on the seizure of breweries.

"Information has been received to the effect that under an unofficial ruling by former Attorney-General Daugherty, law-violating breweries were deemed to be wholly within the jurisdiction of the department of justice," the letter declared. "The prohibition officers stated they were powerless under the ruling to seize a brewery operating on a commercial scale; they were informed that any action contemplating seizure on their part would be deemed a breach of comity by the department of justice."

"It is apparent that the breweries know of this departmental ruling because it is a matter of common report that many of them continue to sell beer of high alcoholic content in spite of the fact that the agents of the prohibition unit know of their violations of the law."

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Gaston B. Means, former investigator of the department of justice and war witness before the senate Daugherty investigation, reported to the com-
