NATIONAL MUSIC WEEK MAY 4-11

Special Programs Being Arranged Throughout City to Observe Occasion.

CONCERTS WILL START

One of Main Features of the Week Will Be Opening of Band's Concert Season Thursday.

National Music Week is to be observed throughout the country from May 4 to May 19, and in Roseburg a number of interesting programs are to be offered. The week has been set aside in an effort to stimulate a greater interest in music and to encourage the love of music and the appreciation of its growing importance in the life of each individual and community.

The churches of the city will provide special musical programs through choir and orchestras on May 4, and the sermons presented in the pulpits will be relative to the need and effect of music.

On Monday May 5, the Roseburg Music Club will throw its regular meeting open to the public. It is expected that an especially fine program will be presented and the public will be privileged to hear some of the best talent that can be obtained for the occasion.

On Tuesday the Kiwanians will take up the subject of music at their regular noon luncheon program.

On Wednesday evening it is planned to hold a public meeting at the armory, in which a community sing will be one of the special features. Local musicians will be presented in a pleasing program at that time.

On Thursday the Rotarians will hold their regular luncheon and speakers will present the subject there. On Thursday evening, if weather permits, the Douglas County Concert Band will appear in the first of its regular summer concerts and will play at the bandstand at the courthouse yard. In the event the concert cannot be held out of doors a public concert at the armory or some public hall may be offered.

On Friday there will be an assembly in the high school at 10 o'clock where a special musical program will be offered, and at 8 o'clock the glee clubs of the high school and the various grade students will give a program at the high school auditorium.

On Saturday, May 10, arrangements are being made to give programs in the lobbies of the Terminal, Umpqua and Grand Hotels.

The theatres and schools of the city are arranging for musical programs each day of the week.

OHIO MAN WILL BE TEMPORARY CHAIRMAN

(Associated Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, April 26.—Selection of Representative Theodore Burton of Ohio as temporary chairman of the republican national convention was indicated after a political conference today at the White House.

The formal selection will be made at the meeting of the arrangements sub-committee Wednesday in Cleveland.

Chairman Adams expressed the belief after his conference today with the president that the selection of Mr. Burton would be satisfactory to all groups within the party. A selection is yet to be made for permanent chairman.

Mr. Burton was agreed upon after managers of President Coolidge's campaign and representatives of the republican national committee had considered more than a dozen names, including those of Secretary Hughes, Representative Longworth of Ohio, and Senator Borah of Idaho.

STATE TREASURER MEYERS IN CITY

Jefferson Meyers, Portland banker, recently appointed by Governor Pierce to fill out the unexpired term of State Treasurer Hoff who died a short time ago, arrived in Roseburg last night and will remain over Sunday to attend the dedication of the R. A. Booth highway bridge at Winehester. Mr. Meyers as state treasurer is a member of the board of control and having never had the opportunity of visiting the Oregon Soldiers Home which comes under the jurisdiction of the board of control, came to Roseburg a day early in order to visit the institution before the inspection to be made by Governor Pierce and the secretary of state who are to be here tomorrow.

Mr. Meyers rode from Salem to Roseburg with Judge and Mrs. John McCourt, who spent the night here.
