BOOSTERS TAKE CITY BY STORM

will succeed," said Mr. Dunn, "and that is by proper coordination. We must work together in unit and send the tourists into every section of Oregon to see the beauties and possibilities of this great state."

Following his talk the morning session ended with a general discussion from the floor. Delegates from many clubs participated.

"Captain Kidd" Taylor of Coos Bay led off the discussion and made several fine suggestions which will undoubtedly be acted upon by the resolutions committee. Mr. Taylor told of the showing the Pirates made last year during their visit to the Pendleton Roundup and the amount of good which resulted from their pilgrimage.

He suggested that each booster organization should send a delegate to all of the other clubs in the state to give information on their particular section. In this way it will be possible to obtain data on every part of Oregon and will enable the boosters to disseminate the information in good shape.

L. Chaddock, representing the Vancouver Prunarians, told of Vancouver's interest in Oregon. He stressed his point by stating that Vancouver considered, petitioning congress to dig a canal around their city in order that the Columbia River could surround them and they could be a part of Oregon. He was applauded loudly on this point. Mr. Chaddock said that Oregon should issue a good-size booklet to all visitors instead of the little two page leaflets now distributed at the different tourist camps in the state.

Professor Irving Vining, president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, made a short talk just before noon. As he is the principal speaker at the afternoon session he spoke very briefly.

During the morning session, the gathering sang several snappy songs.

The last speaker of the morning session was L. D. Felsheim of Mandan. Mr. Felsheim is representing the boosters of the city, who realizing the necessity of such a club have just organized but have not yet found a suitable name. Bandon boasts of its fine beach and during the course of his fine remarks he said, "Coos Bay claims the ocean but they have to cross our beach to get to it."

Lead by the Copco truck carrying the Crater Club orchestra and followed by the Crater gang singing some song which mentioned a Mr. Chaddock the boosters paraded to the South Methodist church. The Umpqua Chiefs were all dolled out in their spunkin' new uniforms and presented a great appearance.

At the church the boosters were feasted on Douglas county chicken and other Umpqua Valley products. Songs, yells, etc., provided the pep at the banquet session and it was one of the liveliest hours of the day.

At the fine dinner served at the M. E. church at noon fully 150 persons were present and two hours were profitably spent listening to representatives of every booster organization present portraying the virtues of his particular section. There was much merriment and a real whole-souled gathering was the result. The spirit that had prevailed throughout the meeting, good will toward all, and in the words of Professor Irving Vining, president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, the natives who first crossed the plains to Oregon behind the ox team, given over to sleep by the lullaby of the cloven hoof animals, had not forgotten their first lessons and were still spreading the virtues of this grand old state.

Although the afternoon session was scheduled to start at 2 o'clock the meeting was not yet under way at press time. Prof. Irving Vining, president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce was the principal speaker of the afternoon.

Tonight the boosters and their wives will be entertained at a big public dance at the armory. All of Roseburg should attend this affair and give the visitors a royal welcome.

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GOLD DIVER DROWNED AT GOLD RAY DAM

MEDFORD, April 28.—Guy Kirkpatrick was drowned at Gold Ray dam, and Loyal Burkhardt encountered a thrilling escape from death this morning, while dredging for gold with diving suits on the bottom of Rogue River. Burkhardt, a one armed man, saved himself by cutting off the lead-soled shoes he wore, with a knife. Kirkpatrick was suffocated when his air hose became twisted.

Both the men came to this section from Long Beach, California.

As soon as Burkhardt reached the surface he ran two miles to the California Oregon Power company plant and a telephone message was sent to this city for help. Fire Chief Elliott and three men rushed to the scene and assisted in the hunt for Kirkpatrick's body.

Coroner Perl is in charge of the search. Details of the accident which occurred at 11 o'clock this morning are lacking.

ALLEGED WHITE SLAYER BOUND OVER

Roy Richardson, alleged white slayer who has been held here for several days in jail, and Betty Benton and Ethel Martin, were bound over to the federal court yesterday following a hearing before U. S. Commissioner C. F. Hopkins. Richardson's bonds were fixed at \$2,000 and those of the girls at \$1,000 each. They were taken to Portland by Deputy U. S. Marshal Johnson and wife.

A warrant has been issued by the commissioner for the arrest of Earl Driscoll, claimed to have been Richardson's companion in bringing the girls from California.

**PURDY WILSON
PASSES AWAY**

Purdy Wilson, a well known resident of Riddle, passed away at his home in that city this morning about 5 o'clock. He had been in poor health for the past two or three years but became worse the last two weeks.

Mr. Wilson has been one of the most prosperous farmers in that country for a number of years and leaves many friends to mourn his death. He was about 59 years of age at the time of his death.

The deceased is survived by his wife and eight children, Austin, Easter, Marjorie, and Margaret of Riddle; Carl of Silverton, Dr. Deway Wilson of Marshfield, John, who is attending the Northwest Dental college in Portland, and Alta of Portland. He also leaves a brother John Wilson of Pendleton.

The funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at Riddle.

DRIVERS SUBJECTED TO BOOZE DETECTOR

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26.—(A. P.)—Motorists charged with intoxication have caused numerous deaths in this vicinity recently, and in the campaign against reckless driving Dr. O. W. Ginsburg, an X-ray specialist has offered the police a "booze detector."

The machine, according to Dr. Ginsburg, has been known to physicians for some time and is called the metabular. It is a simple apparatus that determines the quantity of oxygen consumed by a patient. When a man is drunk, and how to prove it, has long been a problem in courts.

This is Dr. Ginsburg's explanation of how to apply the metabular to the question of intoxication.

"It is known to medical science that a person under the influence of liquor consumes far greater quantities of oxygen than he does normally. This is natural, for alcohol is a great heat producer and calls for great quantities of oxygen to equalize the consumption of heat. All that is necessary to determine the degree of intoxication is to find out the heat production going on in the body by the intake of oxygen. The metabular does this. The suspect is fed pure oxygen through a nozzle. The machine registers how much is taken into the system. Comparison with the normal intake, which can be made when the suspect is sober, will establish beyond doubt whether he was under the influence of liquor at the time of his arrest."

The city authorities have under consideration Dr. Ginsburg's plan to install metabular at all police stations.

It formerly was the custom here for drivers suspected of intoxication to be taken to the emergency hospital, where they were examined by a physician, who signed a certificate expressing his opinion of their condition. At present, however, the police take such a prisoner direct to the headquarters, where, if he is held to show evidence of drunkenness, he is booked on a charge of driving while intoxicated, a felony. Neither method has proved satisfactory in checking the evil, according to police officials. They point out that often men too far gone in liquor to drive safely are able to appear sober when subjected to medical examination and also that the opinion of policemen usually is discounted when the cases are brought up in court.

BIG SHIPMENT OF CATTLE IS MADE

Thirty-two carloads of cattle, including 1100 head of stock, left the stockyard at Dillard this morning for transportation to the Port Klamath ranges. The cattle are owned by S. C. Miller, Al Kent and Sam Smith, and the shipment is one of the largest to be made from this part of the economy. The train goes by the way of Weed, Cal., and special care is being taken to insure the stock against any possibility of infection with little hoof and mouth disease which is sweeping that state. The shipment will be accompanied by two special Southern Pacific inspectors and one inspector from the federal offices in addition to the regular crew of men required in shipping the cattle. Absolute guarantee against infection is to be made possible by neither feeding nor watering the animals with other than Oregon feed and water.

THREE BANDITS ROB BIG JEWELRY STORE

NEW YORK, April 28.—Three bandits early today bound and gagged Charles Jersey in his office and jewelry establishment, and escaped with diamonds and platinum mountings valued at \$150,000.

One wallet stolen, it was stated, contained diamonds worth \$75,000. Platinum mountings, pieces of jewelry and 100 ounces of platinum valued at \$108 an ounce also were taken.

The robbery occurred on the seventh floor of an office building.
