FARM REMINDERS

(O. A. C. Experiment station)
In using barnyard manure in Oregon where a corn crop is to be grown the addition of a phosphate fertilizer gives a marked increase in yield, according to experiment station results. Barnyard manure low in the plant food element phosphorus. The phosphorus is added at the rate of 20 pounds of superphosphate to each ton of manure.

Oregon breeders of pure bred sheep are marking their lambs with ear tags this month before they are too large to identify. Properly kept breeding records save much time in making out the registration papers. Permanent and regularly devised breeding records can be obtained from any good farm record book, according to H. D. Scudder, professor of farm management at the college.

Clover planted after the middle of April is usually sown alone or planted with dwarf Essex rape. If the clover is sown with spring grain after the middle of April there is usually a poor stand as the grain dries out the seed too much. Clover sown alone on a firm, well prepared seed bed makes a good stand. Where sheep or hog pasture is needed clover and rape may be sown together.

Roseburg Steam LAUNDRY KIDS

Top dressings of cynosurus on the meadow at this time will greatly increase the coming hay crop. Broadcast at the rate of 100 pounds per acre is the usual application. It is often advisable to have a strip untreated in order to compare the benefits of the cynosurus application.

FORESTS BECOMING DRY.
Unless there are some heavy rains in the near future it will probably be necessary to put out forest protection crews earlier than usual, according to George Bonebrake, deputy forest supervisor. Already the forests are becoming dry and in some sections fires are being reported. The forest service will put out its trails and maintenance crews within a few weeks, and possibly will have to put out its fire-fighters two or three weeks earlier than usual, unless the dry spell is broken.
