WOMAN AND SON IN SUICIDE PACT

PORTLAND, April 28.—The bodies of Mrs. May Post, 67, and her son, George S. Post, 33, were found with their throats slashed, in their home here early this morning by two other sons, Kenneth W. Post and Walter K. Post, when they returned from a trip to Oregon City.

Two notes were found in the house addressed to Kenneth Post. One read as follows:

The other note, unsigned, read as follows:

"Kenneth: Take these certificates and transfer them the first thing in the morning. You folks will need it."

Mrs. Post had been very despondent since the death of her husband last February.

Enclosed with one of the notes were several postal certificates which were taken in charge by the coroner.
