He had only mentioned her name. Senator Stanfield said, in suggesting how the committee might run down some of the sensational stories told it about Hamon by Al Jennings and others.

There was a dead silence and the committee chairman, finding that no senator wanted to ask a question, told the witness that her further presence would not be required.

Immediately Mrs. Hamon had taken her departure, committee members indulged in another row over admission to the record of one of the group of telegrams bearing on the oil deal story.

Referring to the recent testimony of H. W. Ballard of Los Angeles, in which he stated that Harry Chandler and William Randolph Hearst could give information about a "conspiracy" to control the republican national campaign in 1920, Senator Stanfield announced that he had telegraphed the substance of Ballard's statement to Chandler and Hearst and had their replies. The replies deny any knowledge of the matter and have been published.

Senator Walsh and Adams, democrat, Colorado, objected to placing in record a telegram which Senator Stanfield asserted showed Ballard had a police record. They insisted if witnesses were to be called to impeach Ballard the members of the committee should have a chance to examine them and should not accept hearsay evidence.

It was decided finally to admit to the records the telegrams sent Chandler and Hearst and their replies, but to exclude those referring to Ballard.

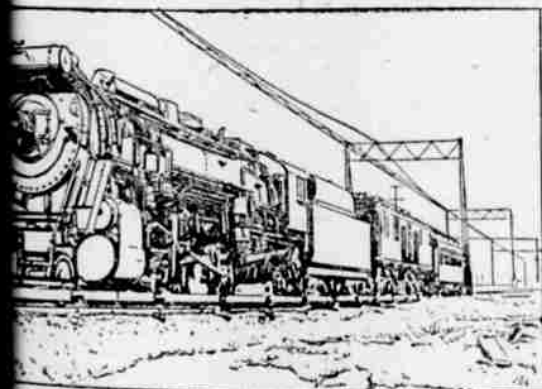

Numbered by Women

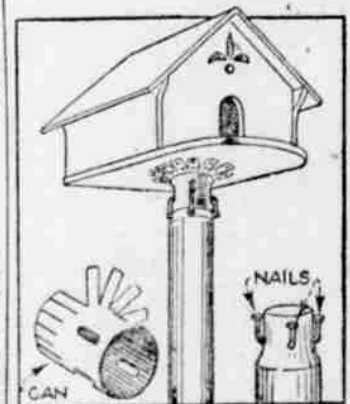

"Soap Holes" of Cowboy Days Become Valuable Clay

"Soap holes," once thought by cattle ranchers of the West to be dangerous mines of worthless slime, have become mines of mineral clay of great commercial value. Bentonite, as the substance taken from the deposits is called, has been made into an ingredient to give body and weight to paper and to aid in the mixing of wall plaster and putty. Soap makers experimenting with it are said to have found it possessed of good cleaning qualities and beneficial to the skin. Many of the clays and muds are used by beauty parlor operators with it as a base. In the raw state it lies near the surface. Since it absorbs almost seven times its volume of water, it forms a soft, slippery mass where the deposits are in low ground.

Detachable Bird Houses

It is becoming quite the fashion for country, suburban, and even city dwellers to provide small bird houses in yards and parks. They are usually mounted on poles or in trees, and as they are securely fastened, it is not an easy matter to remove them when it is desired to paint, repair, or clean them, which is occasionally necessary. A method of mounting a bird house so that it can readily be detached is shown in the drawing. The top of the supporting post is trimmed down to fit loosely inside a No. 2 fruit can, which is cut and slotted as shown. The can is nailed to the underside of the bird house and slipped over the end of the pole. Nails are then driven into the slots and bent downward at right angles as shown, so that the can will not slip off. When removing the bird house the nails



are turned to the position shown in the lower detail, when the can may easily be released by an upward pull. (Decomposition caused by contact of the cream with metallic surfaces in the churn produces an iron lactate that causes the "fishy" taste frequently detected in butter, government experts have discovered.)

AVIATOR KILLED

SAN DIEGO, April 29.—Lieutenant E. A. Musk, aviator attached to the North Island naval station here, was killed shortly after 11 a. m. when the plane he was flying fell 1200 feet into the bay.
Musk was flying in formation with several other naval aviators when his plane collided with a machine piloted by Lieutenant O. A. Weller. One wing of Musk's machine was partially crumpled causing the plane to fall end over end into the bay.
Weller succeeded in righting his plane after the collision and landed safely at the North Island landing field. Musk's home was in Colorado.
