STOCK MEN TO HOLD MEETING SATURDAY

Stock breeders of cattle, sheep and swine have decided to hold a county-wide meeting to hold a Saturday, May 3rd, at the county court house. Two meetings will be held, as follows: one at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and an evening session called for 8 o'clock p. m.

Many important matters are up for discussion in the interests of the industry. Dr. W. H. Lytle of the Livestock Sanitary Board has promised to be present and discuss the disease situation.

Professor E. L. Potter will speak upon the livestock situation in the State of Oregon. Stockmen in the county will be interested in what Professor Potter has to say regarding this matter, as every stockman is entitled to know from time to time just what factors are bearing upon the industry for success or failure.

Carl B. Neal, Supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest will speak upon the service his department can render the stockmen of the county.

Moving pictures relative to the stock industry will be shown in the evening.

County Agent Cooney states that records of the office would surprise the average person of the importance of the industry in this county. Dairying in this county amounts to three-fourths of a million dollars yearly. Mr. Cooney says this demonstrates the possibilities of the dairy stock which amount to more than the annual production figure. Beef stock have a value of one million dollars. Sheep and goats rival the dairy cow in points of production, which we find to be three hundred thousand dollars. The animals are valued at \$1,226,000. Swine are valued at \$200,000. The surprising figures are to be found in connection with the horse industry. Horses and mules are considered by the average person to be on the wane and not classed as a dominant factor in agriculture. This is a decided mistake as facts show that the iron horse has not banished his counterpart in the flesh. Horses and mules in the county are valued at \$645,000. In rounding up stock values it is found that the livestock industry stands well at the top of any other type of agriculture in the county. The total figure for livestock can be read with pleasure by the average stockman, as it is found to be \$4,745,000. This figure represents the combined value of all the fruits, nuts, vegetables, hay and forage and all threshed grains now raised in the county.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

Editor News-Review: At Glendale, California, a suburb of Los Angeles, an Easter morning service was held on top of a sand dune rising 1400 feet above sea level, and known as Laurel Park terrace. (Laurel Park is a beautiful cemetery) at the top of this so called mountain the city has erected a stand pipe 80 feet high on top of this was placed for the occasion an illuminated cross fifty feet high. Adjoining the stand pipe an amphitheatre was erected to accommodate 200,000 people, made up of a choir of one hundred church choirs, and the Glendale municipal orchestra of fifty pieces, including a number of horns. I am a little ahead of my story. At four a. m. the populace was awakened by blasts from trumpets stationed on top of the various look-out towers at the fire departments. By 4:30 we were in an auto headed for the park. Reaching the foot of the mountain we were required to leave our car, take a check from one of the Boy Scouts in charge and begin the climb to the park. There is no brush up the hill and nothing better than sand for a footing. The ascent is quite as steep as that on Mt. Nobo. We were not alone. This mountain stands up like a singular loaf and on every side were literally thousands making the climb. Once up and we were among the ones to arrive early. We secured a seat on the platform, quite near the speakers. Away off to the east there arises two peaks much higher than the one we were on. The sun was due to peak over the crest at 5:14, and was on time to the dot. Just as the first rays began to show through the mist, there arose, a long way from us, and between us and the sun, four figures robed in white and wearing wings, each bearing a long trumpet, and looking for all world as if they were suspended in mid air. They blew a blast on the trumpets, and then the orchestra struck up Jerusalem, the Holy City, the grandest music I ever heard. This number over the choir accompanied by the string and wind instruments, sent the anthem "He Is Not Here. He Has Arrived." I wish that every citizen of Roseburg could have heard that song. It is beyond description. This was followed by a solo, by Mandala Joffrey, a grand opera singer. "Show Me Where They Have Laid My Ancestor?" Then William Harris, a retired tragedian, a man I should judge to be about eighty, shaking with his pale, stood erect and read Van Dyke's poem entitled "To The God of the Mountains and Forests," known as the most beautiful prayer ever uttered by man. The dear old fellow has lost none of his vigor along this line, for he was simply a gruff old man as he stood before the great audience and repeated the very long poem without a break or a halt. It was well worth the hard climb to reach the top of the hill to hear and see this man. A minister

from Los Angeles delivered a ten minute service. He took to heart the choir rendered another anthem, and a sextet composed of four ladies and two men sang the "Holy City." The entire assembly joined in the familiar church song "He Walked with Me and He Talked with the benediction was pronounced and we began to trek down the hill through the sand. In front of the stand was an amplifier, so that the faintest whisper could be heard all through the crowd which was estimated to number quite 50,000 people. More than 5,000 auto identification cards were used by the Boy Scouts. During all this service every voice was hushed, there was just one interruption. At the end of the first orchestra number, one brother clapped his hands vigorously. He was soon aware that he was not at a movie and slid from the platform and hid himself in the throng, no doubt ashamed of the part he had taken.

At the same time that this service was held a like service was in progress in the Hollywood bowl, where more than 60,000 persons filled the great amphitheatre. It was an experience that comes to one but once in a life time, and one never to be forgotten.

I have just returned from a trip to Marshfield, the road is good and the scenery is, in many places magnificent; though somewhat marred by the frequent logging camps along the road. Of course I realize that logging camps are a necessity but is it necessary to burn all the shrubbery along the roads? In ever so many places brush fires were burning only a few feet from the highway.

Just now the woods are starred with dog woods, and in a couple of weeks the hillsides will be veiled in a violet haze of wild lilac blossoms. It seems a shame to destroy all these lovely trees and shrubs. If the logging crews are allowed to burn brush indiscriminately it will only be short time until, instead of the present loveliness, there will be only blackened stumps and charred roots. The evergreens and many flowering shrubs of Oregon are of great scenic value and it seems to me that steps should be taken, at once, to preserve these natural beauties. To a native Oregonian no transplanted palms can ever, or should ever, take the place of our native flora.

Cannot one of the many organizations in Roseburg endeavor to arouse a little public sentiment in behalf of our roadside shrubs and trees? It is true that most of the logging camps are in Coos county but perhaps if Douglas takes the lead Coos will follow suit. Thank you!

WHITE PRESTIGE IN CHINA LOWERED

PEKING, April 26.—Two recent incidents, one involving an assault upon a foreigner and the other an alleged invasion of ceded rights, following as they do upon a long succession of more serious events growing out of the prevalence of banditry, have served to accentuate a widespread consciousness among foreigners residing in north China that the special consideration formerly enjoyed by them at the hands of Chinese, both officials and civilians, is definitely waning.

Various reasons for such "loss of prestige," as it usually is called, have been advanced by old residents in the country. The favorite one is the loss by several nations of previously enjoyed rights of extra-territoriality. By some it is said to be due to growing enlightenment on western methods as a result of an increasing number of foreign educated Chinese engaged in governmental, military and economic affairs. Others attribute it to belief on the part of the Chinese that foreign nations under prevailing disturbed conditions are in no mood to maintain their former privileged status by force.

The first of the incidents in question, and one which aroused tremendous indignation in British circles in Peking, occurred recently when K. E. Howell, British trade manager, employed by the Peking-Mukden railway at Peking, was savagely attacked because of a controversy over the attaching of a special military car to the regular train from Peking. After protesting that it was contrary to regulations, and while in the act of

conceding of the demand under menace of violence, Bessel was knocked down by armed soldiers. While unable to defend himself he was kicked by the man, described by him as an officer, in charge of the car.

The more recent occurrence was the disregard, wittingly or otherwise, by Feng Yu-hsiang, the Christian general and commander of the Peking garrison, of traffic regulations in the Legation Quarter and the striking and disarming of a Chinese policeman employed by the foreign administration of the legation reservation.

The regulations call for a dimming of motor lights and moderation of speed. General Feng, en route to dine with Dr. Jacob Gould Schurman, American minister, passed through the main thoroughfare at high speed and with glaring lights. He resented being stopped. Outriders on the foot-board of the motor car hustled the offending policeman out of the way and struck him when he resisted.

General Feng himself got out of the car and took the baton away from the policeman. He is said to be an old offender, having been previously cautioned about speeding in the legation precincts. The administration of the quarter is considering what steps to take to enforce their regulations.
