INSPECTION OF SOLDIERS HOME

State Board of Control Well
Pleased With Conditions
at Institution.

YARDS ARE IMPROVED

State Gardener Making Im-
provements to Lawns and
Flower Beds—Alter-
ations Under Way.

The policy adopted by the state board of control in maintaining a high standard of efficiency at the Oregon State Soldiers' Home, will be continued, according to Secretary of State Sam Koser who spent Sunday and Monday in Roseburg. On Sunday Governor Pierce, Secretary Koser and State Treasurer Jefferson Meyers, constituting the state board of control visited the institution and made a thorough inspection.

Mr. Koser states that the board has been endeavoring during the past few years to bring the home to the same high plane as the other state institutions. To that end many improvements have been made in recent years. One of the first was the construction of the hospital building, which is one of the finest hospitals owned by the state. Then there has been the new kitchen and mess hall, the fine big heating plant, and now the new irrigation and fire system which is being put into use.

This pumping plant has been completely installed, but is being altered somewhat in order to give greater efficiency and enlarge the capacity of the equipment.

In addition to the construction and new installation enumerated, the board has provided many minor improvements in and about the buildings and grounds.

The state's own gardener is now busy beautifying the yards and grounds, and the grounds surrounding the home are soon to be very beautiful and attractive. This is made possible through the irrigation plant which provides ample water to keep up the lawns and flower gardens.

Mr. Koser stated that it has always been his aim and desire in serving as a member of the board of control to do everything possible to provide for the comfort and health of the veterans. The home, he says, should be given more attention by the people of Roseburg and vicinity.

"I have no doubt," he said, "that this institution is the same as those in Salem. The people of your city probably know where the Soldiers' Home is located, and know that there are some veterans there, but when it comes to visiting the place, I expect that there are a very small number who have ever made any kind of inspection, or who have even walked through the grounds except at long and infrequent intervals."

"If our citizens would give more attention to these state institutions we would be able to accomplish much more. Our funds in the state are limited; we have very little to spend each year on the various departments which must be maintained, and this must be distributed on as equitable a basis as possible. We try to keep them all up to the highest possible standard but of course this is difficult with the funds available."

"Many criticisms come to our ears. Many people who have some fancied grievances pour out their troubles to the board, and we find that generally these complaints come from persons who perhaps have only barely visited the institution of which they speak."

"We would like very much to have the people of the state give more attention to the way these places are managed, and then help us by offering suggestions and constructive criticism which will aid in increasing efficiency."

Mr. Koser spoke very highly of Judge Riddle, commandant of the home, and praised his management.
