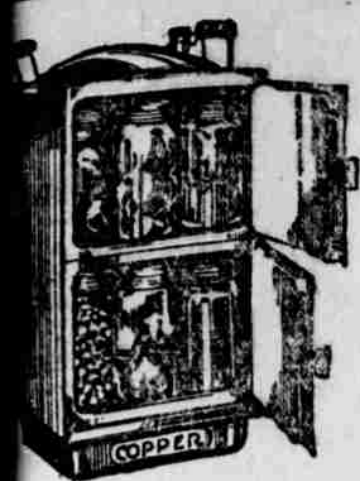

As shown above the sixth and seventh grades of the Fullerton school under Mrs. Edith Falbe had perfect records the past month, not a boy or girl being absent nor tardy during the 30 days. There are 35 pupils in this room. No other room in the past five years has achieved this record.

One hundred and thirty-two pupils were enrolled at Fullerton during the past month, the building as a whole having 181 days of absence and only one tardiness. They have established a record which will be very difficult to equal or ever to excel.

Snow Is Not Deep—

According to Col. C. G. Thompson, the depth of snow at Crater Lake National Park was seven feet and nine inches at the lodge. A depth of four feet and six inches was recorded at Anna Springs. No snow is reported at elevations under 4000 feet. These figures are based on a report issued Friday of last week. Supt. Thompson states that a force of men will leave for the lake on May 5th, and will immediately begin the work of blasting snow from the road that circles the rim of the crater and will carry on other road work and duties preparatory to opening that famous resort for the 1924 season.—Ashland Tidings.
