HUGE LOCOMOTIVE REACHES ROSEBURG

One of the new decapods, the huge mountain type locomotives put into use between Roseburg and points in California, was driven to Roseburg today. This monster locomotive, is bigger than any other engine in the west except those of its own class, and has almost twice the pulling power of the locomotives which have formerly been in use. The big mogul is 98 feet long, and has ten drive wheels, five on each side. The drivers are 63 inches in diameter, the cylinders have a 27 1/2 inch bore and 33 inch stroke, and the weight of the engine on the drivers (not over-all) is 273,900 pounds.

The engine was brought to Roseburg by H. F. Ogden, engineer, and S. A. Fretwell, fireman. It left this afternoon pulling a southbound freight made up of 65 cars. The ordinary engine hauls 30 or 35 cars. W. H. Davis, engineer, and L. S. McCarty, fireman, were in the cab on the trip south.

Nineteen of these engines will be in operation south of Roseburg within the next 30 days. This city is as far north as the big engines will go, and in order to handle them in the yards here it was necessary to install a new electric turntable, as the old one was not large enough to do the work.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, April 26.—(Delayed)—After 52 hours imprisonment in a snow shed on Keg Creek, which empties into Turnagain arm, west of here, R. K. Shanklin was rescued last night. He had entered the shed when he heard a snow slide coming. The slide blocked all exit from the shed. Mr. Shanklin left here Sunday to visit friends and when he did not arrive they went in search of him. When they saw the shed at the edge of the slide they began to dig for him. Mr. Shanklin did not appear seriously harmed though he was suffering from hunger and exposure.

WINE CELLAR OF FRENCHMAN LOCKED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MEDFORD, May 1.—The wine cellar of August Petard, owner of a grape vineyard on the hill west of Jacksonville, was padlocked this afternoon by Sheriff C. E. Terrill after a conference with County Prohibition Enforcement Agent Sam B. Sandefur, and the court will decide the right of the aged Frenchman and his family to retain the vintage, consisting of 600 gallons of wine and fifty quarts of bottled wine, cobwebbed and grimy with age.

Action for confiscation will be launched in the circuit court.

The finer legal phases of the prohibition law, are said to be involved in the case, as regards the right to have alcoholic beverages, upon the claim that the same was made before the prohibition law became effective.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The case against Representative Harold Knutson of Minnesota, under charges growing out of an auto ride with Le Roy M. Hull, government clerk, was given to the jury late today in Arlington county, Virginia, court.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Representative Harold Knutson, Minnesota, finished his direct testimony in Arlington county, Virginia, court where he is under charges as a result of his arrest with Le Roy M. Hull several weeks ago on a country road. His cross-examination by County Attorney Gloth was so severe that it was difficult to say a word was maintained in the court room.

Knutson described his arrest and his incarceration in jail for a night without opportunity to procure bail or talk to friends and denied that he sought to bribe officers to secure release.

Gloth in opening the cross-examination asked the witness if he himself as prosecutor had not told Knutson of the serious charge placed against him and advised him to get attorneys. Knutson agreed that the prosecutor had had some such conversation with him on the morning after his arrest.
