TWIN WICKED CITIES OF BIBLICAL LORE LIE UNDER RED SEA

(By Associated Press.)

ST. LOUIS, May 1.—Evidence of the existence of a Canaanite civilization of the early bronze age, dating about the twentieth century B. C., has been found by the Xenia expedition in a tour of the Dead Sea region of Palestine. Dr. Melvin G. Kyle, head of the party, said in a letter received here.

Dr. Kyle, who is president of Xenia Seminary here, declared his explorations also had tended to confirm the judgment of earlier investigators that the two cities of Sodom and Gomorrah, which, according to Biblical accounts, were destroyed by fire and brimstone, are buried beneath the Dead Sea beyond the power of men to discover them.

Pottery found in the graves opened by Arab treasure hunters in the region, Dr. Kyle's letter said, shows conclusively the existence of the early Canaanite civilization. He characterized it as a "pre-Moabite civilization," pointing out that "Lot was the father of Moab."

"This is a necessary first link in the evidence we desire," the letter continued, "for the Bible represents just such civilization as being here in the days of Sodom and Gomorrah. Moreover, there follows just here one of those expressive silences in Bible history."

"The destruction of the Cities of the Plain put out that civilization as suddenly and complete as one snuffs out a candle. Never again is any mention made or hint given or implied of a civilization in this plain after the hard destroyed Sodom and Gomorrah. This is exactly what our researches have revealed. Thus, what seemed a negative evidence becomes a positive evidence on the subject. The next civilization that appears is by the time, which comes more than 2,000 years later."

Although suggestions have been made that divers be sent down into the Dead Sea to recover something from the two cities beneath its surface, Dr. Kyle scents the idea, declaring the rushing waters of small rivers have brought down alluvial deposits that have been filling the bottom of the sea, making the work of divers exceedingly difficult, if not impossible.

DRILLING FOR OIL IN SUB-ZERO CLIME IS DIFFICULT WORK

(By Associated Press.)

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—Of all the difficult jobs of drilling for oil undertaken by the Standard Oil Company of California in this country and in foreign lands, the hardest ever attempted is the well being sunk back of Portage Bay, Alaska. It was explained recently at the company's executive offices here.

The crew drilling in Alaska has encountered innumerable difficulties during the year that operations have been under way. The holes have been driven through solid rock, a sandstone formation so hard that at times it has turned the edge of the steel and required repairs in the drill. Inch by inch the unyielding substance has been pierced. Some days the progress was not more than five or six feet.

The end of the year in March, found the hole 1,492 feet deep, with the sandstone persisting.

There can be no chance for oil until the rock is pierced. The company's geologists, on whose recommendation the spot was selected for drilling, declared it was the longest stretch of hard formation that they ever had encountered.

Frequent delays have been caused by the exceptional severity of the winter. Temperatures of 24 below zero have been encountered. Often it was necessary to thaw out the pipe lines to the boilers.

The company of drillers, sent from San Francisco, reached Alaska in the summer of 1922, carrying all the equipment for drilling and making a camp. Portage Bay, where the party landed, is a wilderness without a settlement. The place selected for the well was 17 miles inland. To haul the apparatus it was necessary to build a road crossing two mountain ranges and several miles of swampy ground. So difficult was the task that actual drilling could not be started until the following March.

The region, which has been subjected to something of a stampede because of the hope that oil would be struck, is known as the Cold Bay Oil District, though the oil still is hypothetical. The little town of Kanatak has sprung up not far from the Standard Oil Company's operations.

Owing to the severity of the winter, the Californians were without mail from October to January. With a high-powered wireless station near the drilling rig, however, the men were in constant communication with the outside world. Broadcast programs are picked up there from points as distant as San Francisco.

The Alaskan operations are part of the general quest for new oil fields which has taken the company's geologists and drillers into

STREAMS MAY RUN DRY THIS SUMMER

 Survey of Conditions in Forest
 Show Very Little Snow
 Fell During Winter.

PEAKS ARE CLEAR

 Black Rock Lookout at Elevation of 6,000 Feet Has
 Only One Foot of
 Snow at Cabin.

The Umpqua Valley may expect its streams and rivers to reach low water records during the coming summer, according to Forest Supervisor Carl B. Neal, who has been making an investigation of snow conditions in the Cascade range where the North Umpqua and other streams head. The streams and rivers to reach low water largely fed by melting snows, and each year there is usually sufficient snow in the upper levels to keep the streams flowing during the summer. This year, however, snow is lacking, and the streams which carry much water during the summer are already at low levels.

At the Black Rock ranger station, situated at an elevation of 6,000 feet, there is one foot of snow at the cabin and 100 feet away the ground is clear. Last year at this time the snow was up to the eaves of the lookout cabin and did not fall below that level until after the first of July.

In and around the Diamond Lake district the snow usually lies at a level of four or five feet even until the early part of the summer, but at the present time there are only a few patches of snow to the south and west of the lake, while the north and east are clear. It is believed that an auto truck can be driven to Diamond Lake at the present time, a feat which in any former year was impossible. A report on the condition of the road is expected within the next few days.

Above the 6,500 foot level there seems to be some snow, but below that altitude there is practically no snow, where in ordinary years the snowfall often reaches several feet down to altitudes of 4,500 feet or sometimes even less.

The conditions over the Umpqua forest are said to be quite general over the entire Cascade range. It is not likely that any heavy snows will fall between now and the first of July, and consequently it is expected that many streams will run dry during the summer and the rivers will be much lower than for many seasons past.

The forest service is expecting its first season to start earlier than usual, unless the weather turns off into summer rains, as many people predict. The maintenance crews are going out now and are starting road and trail work. As weather conditions permit the crews will be enlarged and increased until the first of July when the entire force is expected to be in the field.

In the event of continued dry weather, however, it will be necessary to put out the protection men earlier than July 1. Forests are already drying out and several fires have been reported in various sections of the state. Efforts are being made to have slashings burned at once, and a number of slashings have been set out. Usually slashings will not burn well at this time of the year, but this season they are burning nicely, according to all reports.
