EX-CONVICT HELD FOR BURGLARY COOLIDGE FAMILY GETS MAY BASKET

Man Alleged to Have Robbed Culver's Store Is in County Jail.

CONFESSES TO CRIME

Returns Guns and \$5 Gold Piece Which Was Cause of Confession—Served 2 Terms in Pen.

F. W. Bauer, alias F. Rensenger, alias Resma, was brought here last night from Medford following his arrest there on a charge of robbing the Culver Hardware store in this city. A Remington .22 calibre rifle, and two revolvers stolen from the store were found in his possession. Finger prints and photographs were taken today as means of identification. Bauer at first denied the robbery, but later confessed the crime. He served one term from Hillsboro for larceny, and was also sent up for two years from Albany on a burglary charge. He was one of those who figured in the break of ten prisoners from the Lane county jail recently, having been held there on a burglary charge.

 MEDFORD, May 1.—A touch of sentiment resulted in the alleged confession of F. W. Bauer, who admitted, according to officers, that he was one of the first ten prisoners to escape from the Lane county jail at Eugene a month ago and the burglary of a Roseburg store shortly afterwards. Bauer is alleged to have declared he took among other coins from the cash register of the Roseburg store a five dollar gold piece, valued as a keepsake. Bauer stoutly maintained his innocence for a time, but weakened when told of the proprietor's interest in the gold piece. The keepsake was found on his person, and he confessed, the officers allege.

According to the authorities Bauer was a walking arsenal and was first suspected of being a robber when for Milan Jones and his brother "Oregon" now thought to be hiding in the southern Oregon hills after their escape from the Jackson county jail and the state prison at Salem.

Bauer had two revolvers, and a rifle, with 200 rounds of ammunition for the pistols and 500 rounds for the rifle. Investigations later indicated, according to officers, that Bauer had no connection with the Jones brothers.
