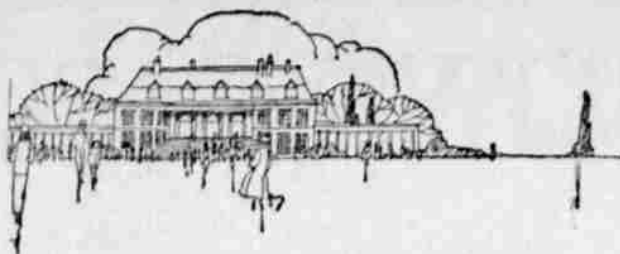

DEMPSEY AND WILLS TO FIGHT SEPT. 6

NEW YORK, May 1.—Tex Rickard today announced he had matched Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills for a world's heavyweight championship fight at Boyle's Thirty Acres, Jersey City in September 6. So far as Wills is concerned the match is contingent upon a victory over either Quinton Romero, Chilean heavyweight, or Erminio Spalla, Italian holder of the European heavyweight title, sometime in June at the Jersey bowl, Rickard said. Wills already has signed for both contests and the promoter said he had obtained agreement of Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, to the title match with the negro. Rickard also announced that he had definitely abandoned all further negotiations with Luis Filpo, following the latter's rejection of the promoter's latest bid for his services and insistence that he will retire from the ring. Rickard has instructed Juan Homs, his Buenos Aires agent, to return to this country.

LOS ANGELES, May 1.—Jack Kearns, manager for Jack Dempsey, world's champion heavyweight pugilist, when informed of dispatches from New York that Tex Rickard had announced arrangements complete for a fight between Dempsey and Harry Wills September 6, declared that this "is news to me, I have made no such arrangements with Rickard."

Kearns added however, "If Rickard wished to talk about arrangements for such a fight I shall be willing to meet him."

3,000 IRON WORKERS OUT ON BIG STRIKE

NEW YORK, May 1.—More than 3,000 iron workers went out on strike today, demanding a closed shop and a wage of \$12 for an eight hour day instead of \$10.50. Charles Murphy, business agent of the Manhattan local of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers said all Union construction in Manhattan, Brooklyn and northern New Jersey was at a standstill. The strike marred what was expected to

be a May Day of complete industrial peace. Regardless of the comparative quiet, the police took the usual precautions. Extra guards were detailed to public buildings and churches.

SALMON SEASON IS OPENED AT NOON

ASTORIA, May 1.—The 1924 salmon season here will open at noon today. The forecast indicates that there will be fewer gillnet boats operating than in former years due to the restrictions of the Oregon law, strictly enforced this year for the first time, which prevents any but citizens of the United States from obtaining fishing licenses.

The law is being tested in the courts but a decision is not expected before the open of the season. The outlook is considered good for an early run of fish in the river, the catches found in confiscated nets of law violators having been found unusually good.

Portland, of course, has the largest delegation, with Roseburg and Eugene now tied for second place.
