## APPLEBLOSSOM DAY TODAY IN WENATCHEE

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) WENATCHEE, Wash., May 2.—Ideal weather prevailed here today for the formal opening of the fifth annual apple blossom festival.

At 8:30 o'clock this morning, H. B. Fulse, private secretary to Governor Hart placed the official crown upon the brow of Queen Roseana (Miss Rowena Murra of Wenatchee) at the coronation ceremony. Another feature of the forenoon program was an industrial parade with more than 100 floats entered. Over 3,000 school children marched.

This afternoon the new Chelan county court house erected at a cost of \$350,000 was to be dedicated, Mr. Fulse giving the dedicatory address.

Another event of the afternoon program is the district track meet in which high school teams will compete.

## MISS RANKIN WOULD MAKE WAR UNLAWFUL

WASHINGTON, May 2.—Miss Janette Rankin who was the first woman representative to congress spoke today before the international congress of the Women's International League for peace and freedom in favor of a new international order in which war would be unlawful.

"There is a simple and understandable plan for political action—to proclaim war the crime that it is," she said.

Miss Rankin said that the Imperialists, militarists and profiteers, under present conditions, are within the law when they work for war, while the masses of the people are violating the law when they work for peace.

## VISIT OF FRENCH OFFICIAL INTERESTS

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) PARIS, May 2.—The approaching visit to Tokio of M. Merlin, governor of the French colony of Indo China, which caused some speculation in London, is primarily for the purpose of expressing in person the condolences of France over the earthquake disaster and of laying the cornerstone of the new French embassy in the Japanese capital, it was said, at the foreign office today.

The foreign office said there was no possibility, as suggested by the British press, of an agreement under which Indo-China would be colonized by Japanese.

## REVOLTERS IN CUBA CAUSING TROUBLE

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) HAVANA, Cuba, May 2.—The government today had 500 troops around Cienfuegos near the chief center of the anti-Zayas movement. Its warships were patrolling the coasts and some of the morning papers declare that President Zayas has sent an urgent request for airplanes to be used against the revolt. The latest word from government officials was that the outbreak was quiet everywhere except around Trinidad and Cienfuegos, and on the south coast of Santa Clara province, where it was asserted that not more than 50 to 60 men are in revolt.

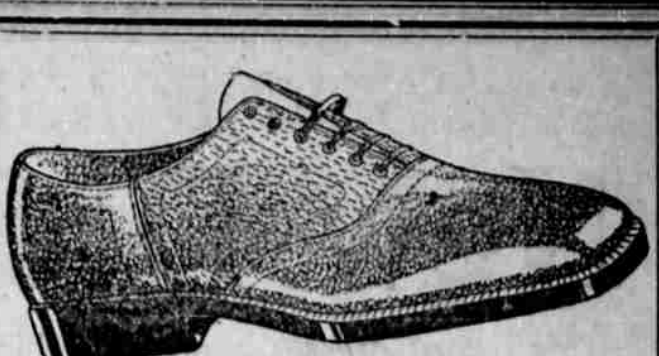
