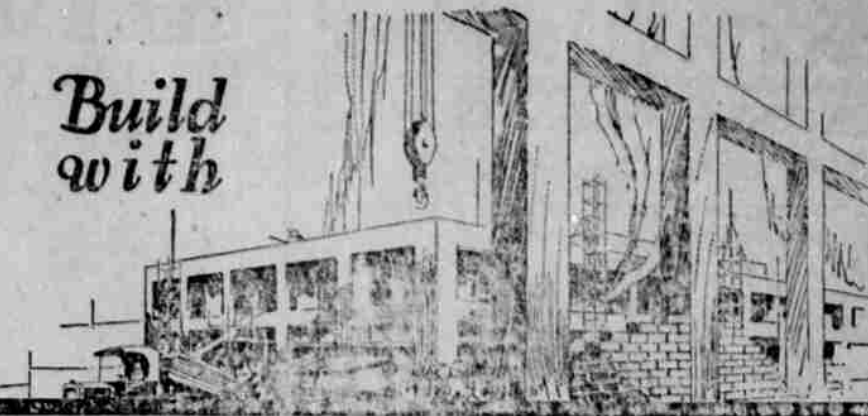

BLAIR COAN MAY BE CITED FOR CONTEMPT

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Contempt proceedings against Blair Coan, one of the star witnesses in the senate's investigation of Senator Wheeler were suggested in the senate today by Senator Walsh of Montana, prosecutor of the oil committee.

The proposal was based on reports that Coan had claimed to have uncovered evidence in Montana warranting Senator Walsh's indictment. The senator read a telegram from Coan denying he had made such a statement, but added:

"I have the statement of several newspaper men that he did make such a statement."

In his testimony before the Wheeler committee several days ago, Coan declared he had been sent to Montana by the republican National committee to investigate not only Senator Wheeler, but "another senator also." He was not permitted to put the name of the second senator into the record. The statements referred to today by Senator Walsh are said to have been made privately after he left the stand.

"This is a perfectly plain and flagrant contempt of the senate," said Senator Walsh, "not only on his part, but by everyone responsible for his actions. It was calculated to intimidate senators in their work on the investigating committee."

"Any action by senators on this side of the chamber might not be attributed. I fear, to motives to preserve the dignity and honor of this body. I trust such action may be taken by senators on the other (republican) side of the chamber."

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 3.—Fire fighters are being dispatched by the forestry office to check the new spread of the Lewis Riverburn fire which is now spreading toward reforested areas with renewed force. Fred E. Pape, supervisor of forestry today.

The new danger zone is in northeast Clarke county north of Canyon Creek. Mr. Pape was informed and lack of water in the region makes it necessary to fell snags to prevent spread of the fire. The ground is wet and unless a heavy wind comes up the fire can be kept under control, Mr. Pape believes.
