FRENCH AVIATOR MAY FLY AROUND WORLD

LONDON, May 5.—Keen interest was aroused today by the news that Lieutenant Pelletier Doleys, the French aviator, had arrived at Calcutta on his flight from Paris to Tokyo. The English press is inclined to believe that Lieutenant Doleys may continue his flight around the world, in competition with the British and American fliers, although at the start of his journey it was announced he would fly only as far as Tokyo.

Sirar MacLaren, the British round the world flier, is at Paris, more than 1,000 miles behind Doleys, awaiting arrival of a new engine for his plane.

U. S. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEETING

CLEVELAND, May 5.—Immigration and the European readjustment expected to grow out of the Dawes report were the principal topics for the annual convention of the United States chamber of commerce which began a four day session here today.

A suggestion for the continuance of the present immigration law for a period of five years was expected to be approved by the convention.

FORD'S OFFER FOR SHOALS IS FAVORED

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Arguments favoring acceptance of Henry Ford's bid for Muscle Shoals were made today by W. G. Waldo, engineer employed by the Tennessee River Improvement Association, before the senate agriculture committee.

Waldo denied there was a shortage of water power for industrial purposes in the southeast and contended that Muscle Shoals should be used primarily for fertilizer manufacture and not power distribution. "The record that nitrogen fertilizers can be supplied to the farmers at five cents per pound, ammonia, instead of 20 to 25 cents that they now pay," Waldo said, "and that half price fertilizer is a very reasonable expectation under the Ford offer."

"Contrary to the general impression, the useful continuance power available at Muscle Shoals is not 850,000 horsepower or one million horsepower after both dams number two and three have been completed and fully equipped and supplemented with 120,000 horsepower of steam power plants. Muscle Shoals in reality constituted but a very small fraction of the power resources of that section."

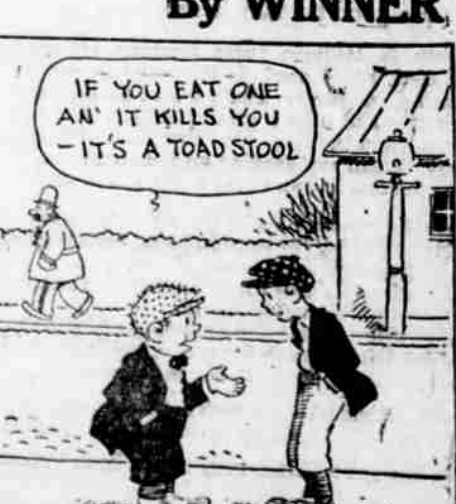
