HOOSIER STATE HAS PRIMARY ELECTION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

INDIANAPOLIS, May 6.—Indiana's state-wide primary election, which has afforded Hoosier political strategists an opportunity to use their famous talents in progress today with the voters balloting for a wide field of candidates. State, congressional and county nominees are to be selected by both parties and republicans may expect a preference for either president Coolidge or Senator Johnson of California as their party's presidential nominee. No presidential candidates appear on the democratic ballots.

Fourteen candidates are in the gubernatorial contest—eight democrats and six republicans. The Indiana primary law requires a majority of all votes cast in order that a candidate be declared the party's nominee. Failure of any candidate to receive a majority leaves selection of a candidate to the state convention.

On the republican side, Ed Jackson, present secretary of state expects the Ku Klux Klan support while Samuel Lewis Shanks, mayor of Indianapolis, an outspoken Klan opponent, hopes for the support of the anti-klanmen.

Candidates for seven of Indiana's 13 congressional seats are unopposed for nomination. Each party will nominate 25 state senators and one hundred representatives.

CZECHO-SLOVAKIA TO GET OREGON TROUT

NEW YORK, May 6.—Rainbow trout eggs laid in Oregon will hatch in Czechoslovakia if all goes well with a state of 5,000 a gift from the United States to the Central European republic, aboard the Pittsburgh which sails today.

The eggs will be in the care of a special steward. The container, a box three feet square and five feet deep is specially constructed to maintain a temperature of 22 to 28 degrees Fahrenheit.

At Hamburg a special courier will receive the box and carry it to Prague where the eggs will be placed in a hatchery to be eventually used in stocking mountain streams where natural conditions correspond to their native habitat.

FILIPINOS WISH TO GOVERN SELVES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The Philippine independence mission laid its case before the Washington government today.

Manuel Quezon, president of the Philippine senate and head of the mission told the committee that the Filipinos felt they were entitled to immediate and absolute independence.

"We confidently hope," he said, "that this congress will act on this question. From our point of view a solemn covenant exists between the United States and the Philippines wherein the islands were promised independence as soon as a stable government was established. We now have a stable government and feel that it is time for the United States to make good on its part of the agreement."

Quezon said the mission did not wish to insist on the enactment of any particular measure, but expressed preference for a resolution along the lines of that proposed by Representative Cooper, republican, Wisconsin, which would give immediate independence.

Commenting on the Fairfield bill which would provide for a plebiscite in 30 years, Quezon expressed the opinion that such a vote would be too far distant to prove acceptable to the Filipinos.
