## TO CONDUCT HOME IMPROVEMENT SCHOOL

An innovation in the line of home economics works will take place this week on two occasions when it is planned to conduct for the first time in this county two schools on the subject of home improvement.

The schools will be held in the county this week. In both instances the subject of the efficient kitchen will be taken up and discussed. The farm women who attend these schools will be given an opportunity to submit their kitchen problems and every possible aid will be given them in an effort to correct unfavorable conditions.

Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, state home demonstration agent, will be in charge of the work, and will be in position to submit illustrations of many different phases of kitchen equipment, and also give interesting talks on many useful and labor saving devices which are within the reach of every farm home.

One of these schools will be held on Wednesday, May 7, at Brockway for the benefit of the women in that community, also Olalla, Looking Glass, Happy Valley, Greens and Glenary sections, and it is hoped they will all be present and take part in the work.

The second school will be held at the home of Mrs. O. Martin in West Roseburg and all of the women in the Melrose, Edenbower and Sycamore Valley are invited to be present and take advantage of the instruction given.

Both of these will be all day schools and it will be necessary for the women to provide themselves with a lunch. The women are also asked to bring pencils and note paper for their own use in making memoranda of the work they wish to carry out in their own homes.

## OBITUARY

Another pioneer has bowed to the will of God. Chas. McGee, the subject of this sketch was one of Douglas county's early and respected citizens. He was a native of Missouri, born in Ray county, September 5, 1848, and died near Oakland April 29, 1924 at the age of seventy-five years, seven months and twenty-four days. He is survived by one brother, Wm. McGee of Seattle and seventeen nieces and nephews who mourn his demise. He was of the rank and file of the early pioneers having crossed the plains by ox team in company with his parents during the summer of 1863 arriving at Oakland that fall. They purchased and settled on the R. A. Forest donation land claim six miles west of Oakland on the Calipoolia creek in October of the same year, where he has almost continuously resided till death summoned him to a better home. He was united in marriage to Miss Mary N. Rice on September 1st, 1870, who preceded him to the grave a number of years ago. To this union there was no issue. But a sad fate made them truly the good Samaritans. His sister Mrs. Maggie McGee Wilcox and her husband Chas. Wilcox both having been called to the great beyond leaving behind two small children, Robert and George an infant of only six months. These children found a welcome home with Uncle Charley and Aunt Nannie, as they were familiarly known, and have grown to manhood and become useful citizens under their affectionate care and guidance.

George still resides on the old home and has faithfully cared for his uncle since the death of Mrs. McGee, he having lived with him most of the time.

Uncle Charley possessed an amiable disposition, scrupulously honest. His word was his bond and the floral offerings and the large concourse of people that followed his remains to their last resting place in the Masonic Cemetery at Oakland was evidence of their love and appreciation for the many kindnesses received at his hand. Surely in the spirit of the pioneer in the purest sense of the word at his home the latch string hung outside the door. He was a progressive man, always interested in the affairs of his country and served our county very creditably as county commissioner for a number of years. It will be remembered that during his administration the first steel bridge across the Umpqua River at Winchester was built, as was many other notable improvements accomplished. Uncle Charley was a conscientious Christian having united with the Christian church many years ago, and was baptized by the Rev. A. D. Shagges, November, 1899. He lived a consistent Christian and died in full faith in the atoning blood of Christ. He was a patriotic citizen, an ideal companion, a loving brother, an excellent neighbor, living peacefully with all men and was perfectly reconciled to his fate, expressing his willingness to go in his own language (said) "It is no difference when I go. I know that I am going into the hands of a just and righteous Saviour and redeemer." A good man, the noblest work of God, his life is worthy of emulation. In our memory will he live for many years.

## FARM REMINDERS

Losses among cattle men and farmers of Oregon due to weed poisoning is heavy in some sections of the state. Experiment station bulletin No. 87 on the "Principal Stock Poisoning Plants of Oregon" has been issued recently. It is an illustrative bulletin designed to aid stockmen in recognizing and eradicating poisonous plants. Protective measures where eradication is difficult or impossible are explained. W. E. Lawrence, associate professor of plant ecology, author of the bulletin, has spent several years studying stock poisoning in all parts of the state.

Where clover or alfalfa seed is to be planted alone it may often be sowed with a grain drill through the grain seed attachment. One of the best ways of doing this is to loosen the pressure springs on the disks so they will not go too deep in the ground. It is better if the land itself is thoroughly rolled previous to sowing. A double disk drill is better than any other common type used in Oregon, since it does not penetrate so deeply or leave the land furrowed. Sowing with the drill the college station finds it is dangerous on loose mellow soil as the seed will be planted too deep.

A generous acreage of corn for summer green feed and silage will help carry Oregon stock through and save considerable hay. Good legume hay will be in demand this summer, the experiment station expects, unless conditions change materially.
